More New Zealanders are volunteering

Over half of New Zealanders (53.0%) volunteer – an increase of 2.3% since 2021 (50.7%) – and are volunteering an average of 18.1 hours over the previous four weeks (15.9 hours in 2021). Volunteering New Zealand has obtained these previously unreleased figures from StatsNZ.

<u>Volunteering New Zealand Chief Executive Michelle Kitney</u> said, "The increase in volunteer participation is great news. However, the figures show that people are choosing to give their time more directly to other people. Organisations may continue to face challenges with volunteer availability."

The age group with the highest rates of volunteering (59.3%) are those aged 45 to 64, while 54.1% of people aged 65 and above volunteer.

June is NZ Volunteer Appreciation month. Let's get Lions noticed by celebrating the impact of volunteering in our communities. **Volunteer Impact Day 7th June.**

LCIF (Lions Clubs International Fund)

Report to Lions District 202D Cabinet

LCIF continues to be our amazing Lions Trust that consistently delivers humanitarian aid and assistance that is world renowned. That it continues to be so is due to the many thousands of Clubs and individuals who contribute and make a difference, including clubs in 202D.

World-wide: LCIF awarded 2023 - 2024:

• 268 grants, totalling more than NZ\$20 million

More and more grants are being used on **Disaster Relief** due to major weather events or major natural disasters such as earthquakes. Flooding is also becoming a major factor.

NZ \$270 million in Disaster Relief funds.

2024 / 2025 Lions Year: District 202D:

So far in this Lions Year, 36 % of Clubs (2 clubs) in 202D have made a donation or Grant to LCIF. Many Clubs have their major fundraising in the next 2 months so we do ask that members remember the work LCIF is doing, and has done around NZ and for our District, as well as what it continues to do around the world and consider a donation to LCIF.

LCIF still holds US \$169,424 (NZ\$310,000.00) which was 'tagged' from donations made during Cyclone Gabrielle. At the recent MD Convention it was reported that there are a number of Lions Projects that have submitted applications for this funding.

Within our own district, the application made by Toko Lions (and including Stratford, Kaponga & Eltham Clubs) for the Tutaki Youth Trust van was successful and the project has been completed. Thank you to everyone involved.

As usual the Convention was to start on Friday evening but this year, being ANZAC Day, it was different. A contingent of Lions plus special Lions guests, joined many of the New Plymouth citizens young and old for the Dawn Parade at 6am. It was chilly but clear as we as Lions marched with others including the pipe band, police and services to the Cenotaph for the service and laying of wreaths, with one representing New Zealand and Australian Lions. I can still hear the bugler playing the Last Post and Revere as the sun rose.



CONVENTION OPENING FRIDAY NIGHT

The official start of the Convention followed on Friday evening. Our MC was previous MP and Opunake Club President Lion Shane Ardern who got proceedings underway as the Official Party were lead in by our Council Chairman Tobi Hipp and his wife Lion Susi. His Worship the Mayor for New Plymouth District, Neil Holdom shared his background as a family living in South Taranaki where there were several Lions Clubs. He also recognised many Lions projects in our New Plymouth District before welcomed us all and officially opening the Convention.

Megan's address was followed by the presentation of flags representing not only the countries with Lions in the South Pacific but also our larger Lions family of countries including the USA and our World President's country Brazil. All the colour and fanfare was overlooked by a selection of photos from around New Zealand and the music of 'Celebrate' on the digital screen above.



Following on with the ANZAC Theme, our Guest Speaker was Australian Special Forces Veteran Brendon Nichols who spoke of his two Tours of Duty in Afghanistan as part of a specialist unit operating in isolated locations. He then went on to describe the mental health impact these missions had on himself and his colleagues with several resorting to suicide. This was a very sobering and brave presentation from someone still battling with the mental health issues aligned with this type of warfare.

On a much lighter note but still appropriate for ANZAC Day, the ANZAC Tribute Choir of New Plymouth Pakeke Lions sang, with the help of the audience, several First and Second World War favourites to draw the Friday formalities to a close before we all enjoyed a light supper.

The core part of our Convention is the Saturday Business Session. This included Key Note addresses by our leaders and special guests, opportunities to present awards, the actual AGM of Multiple District 202 where committee reports are presented, Special Guests are invited to speak and Remits to vote on by delegates.

MC Shane Arden lightened things up before recognising our major sponsors including Fonterra, Dunlop Insurances and Craigs Investment Partners. Council Chair Tobi announced the Vice Governors choice of Council Chairman for 2025/26 being PDG Pam Harvey from Amberley in District 202E.

International Director Graeme Wilson shared his experiences from his first year in office, his representation on the Finance Committee, the diverse range of Countries visited and the Lions he has met plus the challenges of getting your luggage to the same place you have flown too. Our second address was from Past International Director Tony Benbow. Tony, from Australia, is now seeking election as a candidate for 3rd Vice International President to be voted on by delegates at the International Convention in Orlando this July.

After morning tea, presentations of awards included a Melvin Jones Fellowship to our Multiple District Treasurer Stephen Bennett for 12 years of service to the MD. He is retiring to become District Governor for District 202K. He must be really passionate about Lions! Past Council Chairman Murray Pringle received an International Presidential Medal for his work while chairing the Lions Clubs NZ Charitable Trust and the Lions Council Advisory Board.

Other presentations included more on Membership from CC Tobi, a colourful display and report from Past CC Megan England on the newly launched Lions Cancer Bus, Australian Council Chairman David Horne and his focus on training Hearing Dogs. I hope his address reengages us with Hearing Dog training in our 202D District. However, the highlight of the presentations was from Child Mobility Foundation (CMF), with a visit by teenager Olivia on her tricycle and accompanied by her parents Pip and Fraser. SATURDAY EVENING DINNER & DANCE






