Focus on Global Service (GST)

t is pleasing to see the many service initiatives taken by clubs over the past few months since Lions were able to resume normal activities. Many of these projects have been small but do have a positive impact on our communities.

The GST Coordinators from our seven Districts meet monthly via Zoom to discuss common issues at both national and local levels. Following our December meeting I sent clubs, through Cabinet Secretary Jim Pine, some information arising from the meeting:

- The Lions Public Relations and Communications Calendar. The calendar sets out the key "events" within the Lions year. It is particularly helpful to clubs when planning the years activities. (see pages 4 & 5)
- Templates developed by District 202 L providing service initiatives that clubs could consider when planning the year's activities.
- An update was provided to the meeting on the recent review of insurances at a national level. The importance of Health and Safety Plans being prepared for club activities was emphasised. In most cases these do not need to be extensive. Whilst our insurance arrangements cover Lions at work on projects etc they do not cover any fines that may arise from a successful court conviction arising from any mishap. There are ready-made templates for projects and activities on the Lions Clubs New Zealand website www.lionsclubs.org.nz/ members/resources. An example included from the Rotorua East Lions Club demonstrates a simple but effective plan. It is also important that clubs have a designated Health and Safety Officer. Details of insurances can also be viewed on the New Zealand website.



Identifying Leaders so Leadership Can be Developed

There are a few traps to identifying leaders:

- 1. Too often we only look at the volunteers with the loudest voices, the ones that are self-confident and are good at self-promoting. Often the quiet workers that get on with things can prove to be your best asset.
- 2. We don't actually as a club/district think about what kind of leaders we want, so that we will know when we see them.
- 3. The attitude that we are desperate and anyone will do has fast become the norm. Instead we need to identify, plan, upskill and change the attitude; leadership is an honour and we need to treat it as such.
- 4. We expect leaders to jump into new roles with no upskilling, orientation or guidelines. Research has proven to identify leaders that you can develop, that way you know that they will know and understand the role. Leaders that come from other leadership roles are few and far between, and also come with the agenda of their past experience that can be a plus or a minus.

So how do we identify leaders?

The fixed mind-set of members can be our biggest challenge

 That leadership is innate, you either have it or you don't. Research has proved that only 30% of leadership; is innate. Your members are your rocket fuel that propel your focus on, often quietly without fuss, these are the promising leaders. The mind-set that if only we could find the right volunteers holds us back, if we could just focus on talent development we would see the leaders.

However, your people are what really help you grow and sustain consistent results. They are the raw material – the rocket fuel – that propels your mission forward.

Identifying Leaders (cont'd)

"A holistic approach to optimizing human capital, which enables an organization to drive short- and long-term results by building culture, engagement, capability, and capacity through integrated talent acquisition, development, and deployment processes that are aligned to business goals."

- 2. As with any crisis, COVID-19 has fostered resourcefulness, creativity, and activism in unexpected places. What are we doing to identify who these people were in Lions and what are we doing to foster that leadership talent?
- 3. 3. Observe their character and work ethic. Has anyone been tasked to actively do this within your district? First they need to know what they are looking for, what is wanted by the club/district "They are not motivated by power, wealth, status, fame or approval. They are, instead, intrinsically motivated and humble enough to always do the right thing." Marcel Schwantes (an internationally-recognized leadership expert)
- 4. Provide opportunities for leadership skills to emerge. Do we upskill our clubs to do this, do they know what to look for?

"You approach challenges and failures as opportunities to grow," Schwantes wrote. "You're curious and seek to expand your knowledge and horizons. If you have a growth mindset ... you believe you can actually get better at something, even though that growth is currently visible only in your mind." True leaders seek to improve themselves and their work ethics. They accept challenges as opportunities to grow, and they're eager to learn new skills.

- 5. Ask around. The old adage did we actually ask around? "Avoid asking leading questions like, 'Do you think Dave makes a good leader?' Ask people who they think would make a good future leader."
- Skills we should be looking for: Communication skills, Relationship building, Reliability, good Time Management.

Brainstormed Ideas:

- 1. Ensure that you sit down with potential leaders one to one and show them their options and pathways they can follow. Discuss roles with them fully, ensure they understand the commitment and responsibilities they are making.
- 2. Create "Living Leaders lists" ensuring that those identified are shown the possible paths they could follow and work with them to identify what areas they might like some upskilling in. Show them the paths that they might like to take to do this. Encourage them to identify a mentor to support them.
- 3. Succession planning needs to be at the forefront right from club level on.
- 4. Ensure that our attitude towards identifying leaders is positive and correct.
- 5. Use your own people to identify potential leaders. Watch projects and watch those who are driving the success projects through.


As with previous training days there will be transport options.

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Ōhau Village Update

ollowing the devastating fire at the Ōhau Village on 4 October 2020, District 202J have set up a fund, coordinated by the Lake Tekapo and Waiareka Valley Lions Clubs and their respective Zone Chairmen. The purpose of the fund is to support the people of the village in their recovery from the destruction their village has experienced.

The fire indiscriminately destroyed approximately half of the one hundred dwellings in the village. This was due to the windblown embers from the mainly wilding trees in the path of the fire, catching on some buildings and not on others, coupled with brave work by volunteer firefights to save houses.



Following the fire there were approximately fifty scenes such as this in the village. The people whose houses survived feel the loss their neighbours have experienced and are left with a village that is going to take a long time to recover.

It became evident soon after the fire that if Lions were to make a contribution to the village recovery the best course of action was to work with the village residents to establish a project that will have long-term benefits to them. Many of the homes are owned as holiday homes so there is just a small residential population in Lake Ōhau Village. We have been able to establish a relationship with people who have affiliations with the Ōhau Conservation Trust and with the residents and ratepayers association.

Early discussions with the small group identified three projects that were possibilities for a Lions project. From those three the residents and Lions chose a project to develop a plant nursery, with a shade house and watering facilities, which would allow the villagers to grow on plants that had been propagated off–site for them. This would allow plants, suitable for the environment, to be made available to those reestablishing their properties as well as to be planted in reserves in the village, and in areas adjacent to the village and lake by the Ōhau Conservation Trust. The other two projects looked at were the enhancement of the fire siren which was so important in allowing all the villagers and visitors to evacuate successfully, and the replacement of the street lights with light bollards to give a clear night sky view.

A recent meeting gave us an opportunity to expand on ideas and establish the next steps. These include:

- Discussing the proposal with a wider group of Village property owners
- Gaining permission from the Waitaki District Council to use a part of the Village reserve land to put the shade house and allowing access to a water supply
- Drawing concept plans for the shade house
- Pricing the materials for the shade house
- Staging the project to include other community amenities such as picnic tables and some play equipment

Ōhau Village Update (cont'd)

 Making decisions about the process for raising plants from seeds and growing these plants on to the stage where they can be planted out.

The group working on the project is meeting again in February. A number of our questions will be able to be answered by then and the next steps planned. The Lions Clubs of Waiareka Valley and Lake Tekapo are committed to this project, financially, physically and in support of the Village property owners.

At the time of writing the District 202J Charitable Trust had approximately \$16,000 in the Ōhau account. This is very encouraging to both the Village residents and the Lions driving the project for the project as a whole to be realised. Efforts are being made, including making use of club members labour and milling timber on-site, to keep costs to a minimum. Remember too that this is a District project coordinated by Waiareka Valley and Lake Tekapo Lions Clubs.

We see this as a long-term project which, if funds permit, could mean that we also purchase the first lot of small plants to begin the project. We don't discount the fact that the other projects may be included if sufficient funds are available, including funds from organisations outside of Lions.

CIF was founded in 1968 as the charitable arm of LCI to assist Lions with humanitarian projects. LCIF is your foundation and your support will continue to improve lives around the world.

In our District in the first half of our Lions year less than a third of clubs have made donations to LCIF. Donating to LCIF provides the funding so necessary to help those in need as catastrophes happen.

As an example, in November and December LCIF provided emergency grants totaling US\$235,000. These funds went to help provide relief for the following:

 29th December - a 6.4 earthquake hit Croatia, and an emergency grant was given to respond to urgent needs of the victims We cannot predict where the next disaster will be, or when, but Lions can be prepared by making donations to LCIF with the tag "disaster relief". Yes, we want to support our own communities but because we are an International organisation, we have our obligations to support the worldwide work of LCIF.

My challenge to you is, that ALL clubs in the District will make a commitment to donate to LCIF in this current Lions year.

ccounts for mid-year Multiple and District dues will soon be sent out. Cabinet strongly encourages all clubs to be prepared to pay these dues via internet banking. Even though banking transactions by traditional methods will not be outlawed by default until a later date (but before year-end dues accounts become payable) this would be an ideal time to get internet banking set up and embedded in before it becomes a last-minute issue. All the banks have very good staff to help customers to adapt to the new banking needs, and they need to be approached direct so that they know what areas you need help with.

It is suggested that you firstly obtain that advice from your bank in person and not rely on Google or your neighbours until you have had that initial bank input.

Even though the banks have said that there is a specific date on the changes, there are differences between banks, and it may well be that earlier dates may have to be used. We do not wish to be returning cheques to payers, but the day will come when we do not have a choice.

Convention Voting.....

- Clubs must be financial to vote all annual dues must have been paid in full at least 15 days before the start of Convention. Clubs & voting delegates must be in good standing.
- Voting delegates must be accredited by the close off time on the morning of the Business Session (27 March 2021).
- The standard club constitution states:

"... club shall be entitled to send its full quota of delegates to all such conventions and have power to pay the necessary expenses of such delegates attending such conventions. This club shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district ... to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in this club, or major fraction thereof, of this club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held... The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members."

- Therefore as at 1 February 2021 a club (with members at least a year & a day) of 16 will
 receive two votes as will one of 24 members, those votes being either the club appointed
 voting delegates or a club appointed substitute (the alternate) for an appointed delegate who
 has to withdraw.
- Any members joining after 30 January 2020 are not counted towards the club's eligible voting numbers.
- 202J Past District Governors have full delegate status independent of their club's delegate quota
- The standard club constitution states: "Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote of his/ her choice for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote of his/her choice on each question submitted to, the respective convention."

Therefore, voting decisions are the choice of the voting delegates during the Convention business session, not decided by the club.
