The transferring member should contact the club secretary of their former club and asked to be dropped from the roster, satisfy any outstanding dues, and then notify the secretary of the new club when complete. The president or secretary of the new club will complete the transfer process.

- 3) Add Transferring Member screen:
 - a. Enter the member number or the first few characters of the first name, last name, and the club number of the club the member is transferring from.
 - b. Click the "Search" button
 - c. Once you have identified the member you want to transfer click the "Add Member" button.
- 4) Returning Member screen:
 - a. Enter the effective date, member type, and year of birth
 - b. Click the "Add Button"

If the member has not already been dropped, MyLCI will notify the former club and the member. The transfer will be complete within 30 days.

Matching grants (previously called standard grants) are large-scale humanitarian projects that address unmet needs. The project must serve a large population. Grants awarded are between US\$10,000 and US\$100,000.

Matching grants typically provide funds for capital construction and equipment. Typical projects include mobile health units, centers for people who are disabled or blind, eye clinics, major medical equipment, nursing homes and schools in developing countries.

INFORMATION FOR PROSPECTIVE NEW CLUB MEMBERS. During the 2019 – 2020 year Charles developed a package of information which set out what new members needed to know if they were thinking of joining Lions. Called: LIONS' CLUB OF BLENHEIM WE SERVE BECOMING A MEMBER.

MISTLETOE MARKET AND CHRISTMAS PARADE. These are held on the same day and for 40 years have been an important event for the wider Marlborough community. For many years Charles has led a team which worked for some months organising the Market. This meant liasing with Marlborough District Council and other associated organisations. formed an excellent relationship with radio More F.M. which helped the club with advertising for other projects. He led a Lions' team giving support to the annual Christmas Parade.

RADIO STATION MORE F.M. COMMUNITY SUMMER BEACH DIG AND SANDCASTLE BUILDING DAY.

This is an annual event held at White's Bay on the outskirts of Blenheim. For many years Charles has been co – organiser of this project. The Lions' club has the responsibility for traffic control and car parking. He was liased with campers and picnickers using White's Bay prior to the event. He supported contact with More FM who organised the event.

Leitesha and Holly.



Good Lions Stories Motueka Mini Golf Project Motueka Lions Club





This all began with the construction of a Mini Golf course at the popular holiday spot, Kaiteriteri, in the 1980s. Motueka Lions were very involved with this work, and agreed to run the Mini Golf for the Kaiteriteri Recreation Reserve during the summer peak time – Boxing Day through to Waitangi Day. A great way for all Lions to be involved, with half day shifts every day throughout this period. The Recreation Reserve can leave it to Lions to manage, and Lions have a long-running project, with little pre-season preparation required and participation possible for Lions of all ages.



Although a Crown entity the Recreation Reserve receives no funding from the government. This is a special partnership between the Reserve and Motueka Lions, both not-for-profit entities. This partnership has continued for nearly 40 years, with Lions negotiating a good percentage of the net takings to be donated to their Charitable Fund. Despite the charge for a round of Mini Golf at Kaiteriteri remaining amongst the lowest in the country, the proceeds have steadily increased. For 2020-21, the overall takings for the 6 week period totalled \$43,750.

In 2021 as always, the season finished with an evening BBQ and a

competitive golf session on the final day, with Motueka

Lionesses invited to challenge Motueka Lions.

As usual, it was fun to be in the middle of a holiday crowd, busy having a good time at the beach! With many people from Christchurch making up a large proportion of the Kaiteriteri crowd, a few large groups hold their annual Mini Golf Championship, with the ceremonial Jandal as the prize.

Hot Air or a Simple Idea

Many in the world have tried to impose their own ideas on the masses and some were good, some bad.

Graham Henry many of you know as one of the most successful All Black coaches of modern day rugby had a vision. To have a rugby team that would become invincible. How was this going to succeed?

What do all leaders have in common? A TEAM! How did they become successful? They coordinated an approach that was acceptable by the team and in this

case the team of coaches. They knew what was needed to change old habits and chose players that were willing to adopt a new style of rugby. They did their homework on International opposition and came up with a practical formula to be more competitive on the field and it worked. They were prepared to make changes in their lives and tactics, they are still making those changes today.

What has this got to do with us as Lions?

In our District we have approximately 1200 members so let's call them our team.

In Lions we often get the "hot air" from above yet people at the Coal Face are still not prepared to make changes, although some have. Can we all act as a team or are we too old or worse still, self centred for the cause "we serve" but too driven on that to be concerned about the welfare of the Club. Will the club last? Oops another member resigned, oh well, let's just carry on. Does this resonate with you?

Our District Team in charge of membership have proposed changes over the last few years and still a number of Clubs are doing things as they have done the last 2 decades. We need to change. Our District Governor Paul has emphasized this need. We remember our first Convention back in the 1980's in Golden Bay. The first ever social night and what a night it was. Those present were our own age, they still are! Why have we let our clubs get into this "old age" state?

How can we make changes? Are we too old? Is this the way you want Lions to be in the future? In Cabinet we have no money available to help clubs or even start new clubs, there is a fund now for each club to contribute. The fees or dues you pay is for administration only and with fewer members, Cabinet is increasingly concerned at trying to keep these costs down. The answer is really simple, isn't it? When we had a reasonably healthy District of 1300 plus members the budget was worked accordingly. Now we are 100 less and the squeeze is really on. Why should that be? Well, we can increase dues that's simple enough but why should we? Cabinet costs are increasing (what isn't), we can't be taken over by a conglomerate but we can work with them to increase membership we just need to show them the benefits.

Can we keep members by involving them in different ways such as- if they can't make meetings, have a Club meeting at a project site after the day's project work. Involve them by linking your meetings to zoom and ensure they can attend. This electronic era can really work in your favour. Those new people you approach might come on board via zoom or a special project. A number of our Leo Clubs work in this way. To make changes try a brainstorming session on how to increase membership. Form a committee to work these ideas through.



So is this a good idea, or just "Hot Air".





For you, the three-mile journey is grueling, but standard practice. For your 5-year-old daughter, it's an exhausting trip that brings sweat to her tiny forehead and introduces the challenges of living in a water-stressed part of the world.

Imagine arriving at a sandy riverbank, already exhausted from the walk. Imagine plunging that jug deep into murky water where mothers bathe their children, knowing the water you'll struggle to carry home is dirty. Swatting flies from your child's eyes, you long for her to be in school, learning to read and write so she can forge a better future for herself. But you need her to help with the back-breaking chore of fetching water. You might rest a bit with your fellow villagers, mustering the energy to make the trip back home.

Imagine knowing that tomorrow you'll do it all over again. But right now, you can focus on today only. Today, you need water.

For fifteen-year-old Valentina Matiku, life involved walking miles away from her home in the blistering heat to find water for her family every day. Fortunately, a US\$77,000 grant from LCIF gave Valentina and other villagers what they needed most.
