



Update on the Mobile Skin Cancer screening unit - general consensus is that the project proceeds, as planned. The official trust Document will be drawn up after the Council of Governors Meeting on 20 June. We almost have the District Trustees in place and once they are all in we will proceed. We have already a group within District 202E who wish to donate \$30,000 to the Lions Clubs Cancer Trust (LCCT). So we have a good start for the beginning of the Lions year for the LCCT. My aim is to have two Motor Homes Sign written, siting outside the venue for the ANZI in Queenstown in September 2022. (Congratulations DG Paul on your dedication and determination to see this through.)

Disaster Preparedness Grants - Disaster Preparedness Grants support districts interested in partnering with local authorities and other community organizations to plan and prepare for future relief efforts. Lions' district governors may submit proposals for Disaster Preparedness Grants. Grants are awarded for up to US\$10,000.

**Emergency Grants -** Emergency Grants provide up to US\$10,000 for districts impacted by a natural disaster. Lions' district governors may apply for Emergency Grants to help meet immediate needs such as food, water, clothing, and medical supplies. LCIF awards nearly US\$2 million in emergency grant funding each year.

**Community Recovery Grants - Community Recovery Grants aid districts interested in** supporting short-term cleanup and repair efforts in situations where other organizations have already addressed immediate needs. Lions' district governors may submit proposals for Community Recovery Grants. Grants awarded provide up to US\$20,000.

Major Catastrophe Grants - Major Catastrophe Grants are awarded for long-term reconstruction projects due to disasters that occur on a much larger scale. Major Catastrophe Grants are awarded at the discretion of the international president and the LCIF chairperson and cannot be applied for by a district. These grants provide significant funds for catastrophes with major international impact, such as the recent earthquakes in Mexico, the 2016 earthquake in Italy, and Hurricane Harvey (USA).

## INCORPORATION CLUB & REGISTERED CHARITY

To comply with the Lions Clubs International Constitution (which all Lions clubs must comply with under the terms of their charter) a Club should have a separate Charitable Trust entity.



District Governor Paul states: "Lions Clubs International has ruled, and this has been accepted by the Council of Governors through the MD Treasurer Steve Bennett and MD Legal Alan Knowsley, that Clubs must have **TWO SEPARATE ENTITIES.** It is no longer a choice, even though the one entity model was initially accepted by Charity Services. This is no longer the case. Clubs who fail to have their clubs properly structured could face being put into Status Quo until they comply with the rules that govern membership of Lions Clubs International."

An Incorporated Society is for an organization to register with the Companies Office and gives that society a legal existence rather than just being a group of individuals.

#### INCORPORATION OF THE CLUB

- 1. It is recommended that all clubs be incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act.
- 2. This confers protection to members from liabilities of the club eg contracts, debts, fines (as long as there have been no illegal actions taken).
- 3. For Tax purposes the society gets and exemption for the first \$1000 of income (for a group that is not an Incorporated Society the tax liability starts at \$1)
- 4. The Club, as the Incorporated Society, and the administration bank account is managed through the Board. Administration funds come from monies obtained from Lions such as membership dues, fines, raffles at club meetings i.e. within the 'circle of Lions'. No public monies apart from expenses incurred during a project are in this account see point 4 below under Charities.
- 5. 15 members (currently under review by Government) are needed and they must pass a resolution to incorporate.
- 6. Forms are available from The Registrar of Incorporated Societies.
- 7. If a club fails to comply with the requirements to file annual returns this can result in the club being struck off and having to re-register.
- 8. Annual returns should be accompanied by a certificate from a Board member that the accounts have been approved by members at a general meeting.
- 9. Clubs need to notify changes of registered office, including email addresses (so as to ensure they receive all correspondence)
- 10. Any changes in the constitution also need to be filed along with copies of the resolutions adopting the new constitution.

#### CHARITIES

Charities are supervised by the Internal Affairs Department (Charities Services) and must have a Trust Deed registered with Charities Services.

- 1. Only organisations registered with Charities Services will qualify for income tax exemptions.
- 2. The Trust can be named after your club eg. "Lions Club of [insert area] Charitable Trust"
- 3. Your club would need to appoint Trustees to administer the Trust (say four senior members).
- 4. The Charitable Trust will have a bank account holding the funds raised through projects (public funds). [Legitimate expenses incurred e.g. mileage, ingredients for baking, advertising, or machinery running costs in raising those funds, can be claimed back by the members. If the individual members so wish those individual members can donate these monies back to the club to be put in the club administration account – a written record should be kept]
- 5. Your Club's Charitable Trust must keep minutes of meetings and decisions and file annual returns. (continued next page)

#### **CHARITIES** - continued

- 6. You can check out if your charity is still registered and up to date with all of its filing requirements at <a href="https://register.charities.govt.nz/CharitiesRegister/Search">https://register.charities.govt.nz/CharitiesRegister/Search</a>
- 7. TO COMPLY WITH THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION A CLUB SHOULD HAVE A SEPARATE CHARITABLE ENTITY AND NOT COMBINE THE CLUB WITH A CHARITY IN A SINGLE ENTITY.
- 8. If your club only has a single entity then you need to set up a separate charity.
- 9. Once that is done you need to amend your club constitution back to that approved by Lions Clubs International and then deregister the club as a charity (keeping the Club as an Incorporated Society and the new Charity set up). A Standard Lions Clubs Constitution with the addition of two clauses required by NZ law is available on the national website.
- 10.Instructions and guidance on these steps is on the Lions Website. https://www.lionsclubs.org.nz/members/resources#legal

## The procedure for dealing with a proposed donation from the club:

- 1. The club meeting agrees to make a donation from funds held and is minuted accordingly
- 2. The resolution will be in the form of a recommendation from the Club's Board to the Trustees of the Charitable Trust.
- 3. The Trustees should then meet (email or phone is sufficient) and discuss the recommendation and approve. A minute should be prepared recording the matter and decision reached, and be filed in the Trust minutes.
- 4. When the Trust holds an AGM or a physical meeting, all the trust minutes can be approved and signed off.
- 5. The payment of the donation should always come out of the Trust's bank account.

- **Lloyd Morgan** Charitable Trust and LCIF donations. Does your club give an annual donation perhaps \$10 per member? (the need is there now more than ever.)
- Between the Lions:: Lions Clubs New Zealand main means of monthly communication between MD and clubs.
- Club donation summary District can gather a summary of the support that the whole District has given. Please send to District Treasurer Ian Lennie. Great to sell District and no club will be identified.
- Old Coins funds available for club youth projects Lions Clubs NZ Charitable Trust applications through NZ Lions website. Ideally works 1/3 from club, 1/3 recipient and 1/3 Old Coin fund.
- Creating a Youth liaison the focus for Lions is 'what can we do alongside youth rather than for youth.'
- Media response reminder to clubs to discuss with MD legal before responding to any reporters questions regarding sensitive issues (issues may reflect negatively on the reputation of Lions.)
- **Next Lions magazine due in August** send in articles for this now. Send photos separately as a jpeg (not embedded in a word document) editor@lionsclubs.org.nz
- **Position Hand over** ensure you provide a thorough hand over of your role when someone else in the club is picking it up. (an extensive handy reference A Z folder 'bible' is a great method and can be added to.)



## **Charter of Lions Club of Rangiora Lioness**



History: The original Club was formed in Rangiora in 1986 - a ladies branch of Lions International. Over the years the club served the community both in funding and special projects. Camp Quality, Golf tournaments, Cook-book, Telethon, Food parcels, Fashion parades, Antique and Book fairs, Cheese rolls just to name a few. Between 2007 - 2020 \$106,000 was raised for the local community. In 2019 Lions International invited all Lioness Clubs to join a Worldwide International Join Together Programme, and become part of a full Lions Club or a new Lions Lioness Club. A decision was made to discontinue Rangiora Lioness Club and form in January 2021 Lions Club of Rangiora Lioness and on the 3rd May 2021 this Club was Chartered with 12 members.

I liken this club to the Phoenix - this mythical bird is a symbol of hope, renewal, rebirth, immortality, solitude, resurrection and grace, so just like the phoenix emerges from its ashes so has this club. The Phoenix of Rangiora has risen. Thank you all.

## Fueling the Dreams of Becoming a Paralympic

You feel your heart beating in your chest, you hear it in your ears. A bead of sweat rolls down your face. You hear the whoosh of a ball being hurled in your direction, then come the bells. You cannot see the ball, but you hear it coming. You have a second to react, to block the ball from crossing the goal line you are defending. Your teammates



cheer. One step closer to a gold medal. The athletes in USABA's residency program are training for the ultimate goal...to represent Team USA at the Paralympic Games in Tokyo next summer.

Everyone deserves the chance to feel this way, regardless of their ability. Thanks to a partnership between Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and the Anthem Foundation, athletes who are blind or visually impaired have more opportunity to train for a spot playing goalball in the Paralympics.

**Creating More Opportunity Through Community Partnership** - Through the Lions-Anthem Foundation Healthy Heroes initiative, Lion- and community-led humanitarian projects improve the health of communities across the United States. The Anthem Foundation provides grant support to LCIF, which in turn, awards grants to Lions clubs and districts with a goal to improve local health and wellness.

**Excitement. Strength. Consuming. Challenging.** - These are the words goalball athletes use to describe their sport. Goalball, created exclusively for people who are blind or visually impaired, is the first Paralympic sport that hasn't been adapted from another sport. During a game, two teams of three players each compete on a court equivalent to the size of a volleyball court. The basketball-sized ball has bells inside, which help alert the player to its location. Each team tries to roll the ball over the opponent's goal line while the opponents listen for the oncoming ball and attempt to block it with their bodies. All athletes wear eye shades, which completely block out any vision; this creates a level playing field for athletes with varying degrees of visual impairment. The athletes in USABA's residency program are training for the ultimate goal...to represent Team USA at the Paralympic Games in Tokyo next summer. Prior to that, Fort Wayne is gearing up to host the USA International Goalball Classic in March, which will classify athletes for the upcoming Paralympic Games.

LCIF supports Lions as they create more socially inclusive opportunities for people with all levels of ability. As "knights of the blind," Lions have long supported people with low vision or blindness. In addition to championing the health and well-being of these communities, they also work to eliminate preventable and reversible blindness. Sharing their community values is the Anthem Foundation, a perfect partnership for LCIF and Lions.

Thanks to the partnership between LCIF and the Anthem Foundation, there are more athletes with low vision or blindness finding purpose and living their dreams. Given the opportunity to dedicate themselves to training, these athletes are one step closer to competing for gold in the Paralympics.

## A CLUB WEBSITE - SHOULD YOU HAVE ONE? Charles Riley

Club websites have been around for some time and were originally hosted on the MD 202 website until MD completely revamped their site content.. This did not include Club Pages so Clubs using this facility were encouraged to migrate to the e-clubhouse platform provided by Lions International, for the most part a copy and paste exercise.



Many Clubs had pages set up for them by MD and were not actually aware of their existence, in fact they were even updated with their new Club Officers each year, not that they knew about it

To be fair there is not a great member interest in using this method of publicising a Club and providing information for anyone out there who may be interested in what you do and who to contact but we really do need to use any method to get our brand out there. It is also an easy way for Club Members to view their Club Bulletin which can be uploaded each month.

Once you have set up a site a Google search will take an interested party directly to your page and the information which you may care to include and let's not forget that internet use is increasing rapidly whatever we might think!

To create a Web Site you need to have a site template set up by e-clubhouse from which to work with. An application can be made by going to Lions-E Clubhouse.org then follow the prompts and select the application form to complete. Within a couple of days you will receive confirmation that a site has been set up for you including a user name and password which you will need to log in to your site to set up and maintain your page.







This is the landing page for a Club Site and includes a photo of your choice and all information for meeting dates and times as well as Club Officer names and contact details.

You are provided with basic pages and a photo Gallery option which are listed upper left but you can also add up to 5 more pages for specific purposes such as About us, Become a member and Bulletins to name a few. All the pages once set up can be updated at will as the need arises.

A helpful user guide is available to download and print to assist with initial setup and later updating.

A help email address is also provided and prompt assistance is available if needed. However the process is quite intuitive and with a little curiosity and expertise all will be well. Have a look at the Blenheim Club site as an example Blenheim Lions Club - Lions e-Clubhouse

Spirit of Adventure Christchurch Host Lions Bulletin have you ever wondered where your annual donation goes? Will Griffiths (a recipient) writes about his Spirit of Adventure.

Hi Graeme, ( and Host Club)

Thank you for sponsoring my trip on Spirit of Adventure over the New Year. My voyage was 811 and we sailed from Auckland up to and past the Bay of Islands. It was the trip of a lifetime, leaving me with many fond memories, friends, and life skills.



We did so much during the ten days. The highlights consisted of swimming with dolphins, making many new friends, visiting remote beaches, and gaining an experience of sailing. New Year's Eve on the boat was pretty awesome as I watched the Bay of Island's fireworks from the top of the boat and sang songs.

There were two main things I really took away from doing this trip.

The first being the friends I made during the trip. It allowed me to meet people from all over New Zealand who I would never otherwise ever had a chance of meeting. I now have a wide group of people from all over New Zealand. I have already met up with some of my closest friends on a trip to the Coromandel, and now we are planning a road trip down south over the winter holidays. It's so cool that I now know people who I can do things like this with, and I hope to be able to keep in contact with them for the rest of my life.

The second thing I really took away from the voyage was what aspects make someone a good leader?

At the start of the voyage, we were split up into 4 groups. We spent a lot of time with these groups doing tasks around the boat like cleaning, dinner prep, fun activities, etc. Each day someone from the group is selected as a leader, and each day the group would have to adapt to this person's style of 4 leading. Some people were laid back, figure it out yourself, while others were full dictators, ignoring what the rest of the group thought.

Eventually, we came to realise that a good leader is someone that is efficient and clear with handing out tasks, and also listens and takes advice from the rest of the group. It was interesting observing how much more efficient we became at doing our group tasks once we had all started to get an idea of what makes a good leader. On one of the days, we had to row in our groups to this beach. The groups who had effective leaders ended up functioning the best and made it to the beach the fastest. Our group did end up winning, mainly because our leader listened to the advice one of our group members gave to him on the speed of the beat we should all row to.

Early this year, I am intending to do a school presentation at Christchurch Boys High about the Spirit of Adventure and why other people should apply to go on the boat. I will talk about the process of funding raising and give examples of some of the organisations that can be approached to assist with costs.





Lions Clubs New Zealand Heads Up for Kids project provides a helping hand for young people to engage in an experience or activity that will enable them to live their dream, establish life goals and reach their full potential within their chosen field.

Donate old New Zealand & foreign currency and support Kiwi kids Copper trails, brass razoos and gold sovereigns are all part of the Lions Clubs of New Zealand's unusual campaign Heads Up for Kids.

Launched in July 2010, Heads Up for Kids is a unique collection which asks New Zealanders to dig out and donate old decimal and pre-decimal New Zealand currency, and all foreign money.

The obsolete cash is then redeemed for New Zealand dollars and used to fund education programmes for young New Zealanders who would otherwise not get the opportunity.

Many young people have already benefited from Heads Up for Kids, receiving scholarships to organisations such as Spirit of Adventure and Hillary Outdoor Pursuits Centres.

To date Lions have collected over 28.8 tonnes of coins and thousands of bank notes (that's the equivalent weight of 4 elephants, 460 cattle or 6450 cats!) bringing the total raised close to \$612,000. The Reserve Bank of New Zealand estimates that there is \$80 million in old decimal and pre-decimal NZ coins and \$20 million in old banknotes unaccounted for.

## Top Service Project Oxford & Districts Lions Global Cause: Hunger

The project came into being late May 2020 because of Covid-19 Lockdown. The lockdown stopped the club's regular projects from happening.

The Original idea being to give people who were struggling because of the lockdown a food parcel, including new potatoes, for Christmas. The project manager made 0.3 of an acre available to plant seed potatoes, sweet corn and courgettes. With 540 kg of seed potatoes planted by hand the question was how to distribute the crop at harvest time. The club linked up with an organisation called Satisfy who recover food that maybe out of date but still useable, produce that is, for whatever reason not suitable for supermarkets but very useable. Satisfy act as a hub who then distribute to 27 different trusts and groups in North Canterbury on a weekly basis. These can be delivering to families or providing a weekly community meal. In linking with Satisfy we were the first organisation to supply them with very fresh produce. Both parties met on Neville's land with the Satisfy group amazed at what was happening. As well as those listed beetroot, rhubarb and beans have been donated.

Actual club involvement has been the manual planting of the potatoes and pumpkins, weeding of the courgette plants, daily picking of courgettes and weekly lifting of potatoes. This equates to approx. 600 to 700kgs of potatoes and 40 kgs of courgettes done by 10 -16 lions, not necessarily the same Lions each week. To date we have donated just on 5500 kgs of potatoes and 400kgs of the other produce. All produce collected by Satisfy is weighed and recorded with results being forwarded to the lion's club. When the potatoes finish pumpkins will be supplied for a few weeks.

Impact wise, the club was flat coming out of Covid lockdown and were wanting to do some service. For the club, the weekly gatherings are good for morale and comradery. This project has brought them back to what they are used to doing, supporting a larger community not with cash but with goods and time. Support with service. It is envisaged that with support from Food Secure North Canterbury this project will be ongoing. Probably quieter in the winter with progress starting in the spring after revaluation of the community needs and our ability to produce.

People directly served is measured by converting produce given into meals. To date we have given enough produce to serve the equivalent of 15,413 people based on a figure that was given as the measure, 350gms equals a meal.

Footnote: As of March12th 2021 we have received a grant from Food Secure North Canterbury to assist us in continuing the project for 2021 – 2022. As of May10th 2021 we have supplied 10,138.07kgs of produce = 28,966 meals.

## Lions Christehurch Schools 2021 Music Festival

This email sent to all Clubs in catchment area, via Zone Chairmen. Those Lion members who attended our 202E Convention in March will be aware from our presentation that the 2021 Festival is



definitely going ahead – unless of course Covid springs an unexpected surprise on us. This will be the 81st Festival, which many of you will have been involved in over the years – your Festival Liaison Team have certainly had considerable experience in a variety of ways, in particular as school choir teachers.

District Governor Paul has received a letter from the Festival Association confirming our naming rights sponsorship, which we have had now for well over 20 years. Sponsorships cost, and although we haven't been asked for a specific amount, it has been suggested that Lions offer in the vicinity of \$15,000 this year, but this will only be possible if the 30 or so Clubs in the areas that more than 90 participating schools are in, donate to this fund. Thank you to the Clubs that have already done that. The amount is up to individual Clubs – one has made two donations, making a total of \$800 from them, some have donated \$500 or \$600, but even smaller amounts all add up. By the way, total festival costs for the Association are over \$200,000, with less than half of this coming from the sale of tickets.

We all know of the Code of Ethics. How many are told of what sits behind the Code of Ethics?

### Core Values of the Ethical Standards of Lions Clubs International

For Club officers and above

#### **Club Officer**

Ours is an association of service, and the manner in which the service is rendered is fully as important as the service itself. Our members, your fellow club officers, your District Governor, the International Board of Directors, the Executive Officers, the Administrative Officers, the International Office staff and our communities expect honest and ethical conduct from each of you every day. No act or request on the part of Lions clubs and their members, officers, board of directors or staff within our association with whom, or the community for whom, we render services can justify the breach of this guideline. Honest and ethical conduct is defined by our core values that serve as the foundation for our Ethical Standards:

#### **Commitment to SERVICE**

We are responsive to the needs of Lions. We seek to understand their priorities, values and needs, and to empower their service. We are committed to our shared goal of community and humanitarian service.

#### **Dedication to EXCELLENCE**

We are passionate about the causes Lions serve and the quality of our work. We go beyond what is expected, striving for excellence and continuous improvement in all we do.

### Appreciation for DIVERSITY

We create and foster a spirit of understanding among the people of the world, knowing that diversity is our strength. We appreciate individual and cultural differences, and we embrace the experiences and talents of others because together we are more.

**Dynamic COLLABORATION** We work as a team to improve the quality and relevance of our programs and initiatives. We welcome and encourage the participation of Lions, partners and colleagues, solving problems and meeting challenges together.

#### **Personal and Professional INTEGRITY**

We promote and live by the principles of good citizenship. We are dependable, honest and trustworthy professionals who are accountable for our actions and their results.

## Spirit of INNOVATION

We evolve to meet the changing needs of those we serve, embracing an environment of growth and creativity. We rigorously test and optimize new ideas, and encourage the adoption of best practices globally.

Your responsibilities begin with understanding of the core values and Ethical Standards of Lions Clubs International. Your role in the association demands an ongoing vigilance to maintain these standards of honest and ethical conduct. Lions Clubs International has adopted several policy statements that concern the association's Ethical Standards, such as our Mission Statement, Code of Ethics, Anti-Discrimination Guidelines for Service Activities and Membership. Obligations of a Chartered Club, Use of Publicly Raised Funds, Rules of Audit, Conflict of Interest, Solicitation, and Privacy. The International Constitution and By-Laws, the Club Officer Manual and the International Board Policy Manual provide information about these policy statements and additional guidance in the areas of ethical standards and conduct. In many instances, ethical standards intersect legal requirements. If an ethical or legal compliance issue arises that raises a question in your mind, you have a responsibility to bring that issue to the attention of the appropriate International Board committee or International Office division (for example, the Finance and Headquarters Operation Committee reviews Conflict of Interest issues; the Constitution and By-Laws Committee and/or Legal Division review Legal issues). You may also bring ethical or legal concerns to the attention of your District Governor, the International Board of Directors, the Executive Officers, or the Administrative Officers of the association.

The core values of the Ethical Standards of Lions Clubs International, along with the policies of the International Board of Directors, provide a guide and framework to help you understand what is expected from you and to help you make good decisions. As they are not all inclusive, your good and best judgment is essential in doing the "right" and ethical thing. Please join us in continuing Lions Clubs' tradition of honest and ethical practices in serving millions of people in need.

There is a time frame of 3 months for final training and scheduling of staff, finishing touches, and be operational by February 2022.

The Playscape has a budget of \$500,000. Whilst this is a large sum of money, it is only a small cost of the overall project. The new hospital is the only one in NZ, whereby the doctors and medical staff have had input into the outstanding design, to make it practical, and provide all the medical equipment required. Patient care and comfort has been a high priority, with the aim of providing a much quicker post-operative recovery. This is where the Lions Playscape plays an integral role for the overall health of the children, who require the care and specialist services.

I have attached some pages from a booklet 1912 - 2021 (From King Edward VII memorial Hospital for Children to Te Wao Nui Child Health Service and Hospital) which briefly summarises the journey of the hospital build, starting in 2017.

Thank you Lions for being part of this wonderful legacy. With a large catchment area, the hospital will provide exceptional high level health care to families in the wider Wellington, Nelson, Marlborough, Taranaki, Hawkes Bay and Waiarapa. All started with a personal donation of 50 million dollars from Mark Dunajtschik and Dorothy Spotswood.

To quote "My philosophy is people that are born with a healthy body and mind can look after themselves, and those unfortunate to be born with or suffering ill health need our help"

#### 2019


• The Riddiford Building, the last of three original onsite nurses homes on the hospital campus, is demolished to allow for construction of the new children's hospital.






