
I have been attending a few changeovers over the past month. Thank you to those clubs who have invited me along; it has been a pleasure to meet the incoming boards.

The Treasurer Talks

Incorporated Societies Bill

At long last we have some guidelines (they are as yet very broad) regarding the new Incorporated Societies Act:

- The Bill is scheduled to become an Act in October this year
- Every existing incorporated society will need to be re-registered by 01 December 2025 and there will be much earlier trigger dates set as to when that can start
- It is anticipated that every existing society will require a new constitution, with very minor exceptions
- We are almost certainly going to have Lions/Multiple District prepare or adapt pro-forma constitutions for us, since changes will need their approval
- In the meantime, we need do nothing except continue as we are filing accounts and other documentation as required
- Clubs that are non-complying at present mainly in the area of failing to file accounts and updates need to become up to date or risk being called to account by the Registrar of Incorporated Societies
- When enacted filing requirements will be parallel to the filing requirements for charitable trusts

Internet Banking

Everyone is now on internet banking; as outlined at recent Forums there will be some learning issues but as also recommended then, your bank's staff who are very well trained in this, will assist whenever asked.

The District's affairs are now much more straightforward now that there are no cash or cheque transactions to deal with, and in fact we are not able to undertake cash transactions now without a whole lot of drama.

ecruitment and retention of members will be an emphasis for District 202J during the 2021/22 Lions year. At its heart, this issue turns on how well each club engages with its local community and the club members engage with each other. This is a task we all share.

This needs to recognise we all have different abilities and commitments outside Lions so have differing capacities to offer. Critically, members need to enjoy their membership.

nother Lions year ends, they seem to go way too fast – probably because everyone is busy with projects, service activities etc & most weeks there is an activity/meeting in your diary.

I am handing over the GMT role to Ken Whitcomb for the coming year. Thank you to all the clubs that assisted in getting your Monthly Membership Reporting (MMR) up to speed; I know it is difficult at times to Logon to MyLCI.

Membership is & will be an ongoing issue not only for Lions but for probably most organisations nationwide. As we all get older (who me??) there is not the next generation coming through; I believe we need to address the reason we are not getting them join our organisation. Maybe Lions needs to look at its membership structure & cater for those that are able & willing to help with projects etc but are time poor to attend all the meetings, they now do all their business on a phone or laptop. Zoom meetings play a big part of workday life now, however networking & meeting in person is also an important part of our social needs, therefore both can play an important role in where we are heading in the world of technology.

Getting new members is not always easy; I have heard on several occasions of Presidents/ Membership Directors working hard on a membership drive - it seems putting adverts in local papers & flyers out & about unfortunately does not work, prospective new members need to be approached personally & taken to a tea meeting/ project or social occasion by a member, so they are not left hanging out on their own. Good orientation is also important; at times I hear of members that have left shortly after joining as it was "not what they thought they were joining". Do not rush them into joining, the prospective member must be comfortable in being part of a service club.

We must look after the members we have; as an aging organisation (like most) some are no longer able to contribute actively to projects, they should still be involved & included in being part of the club. When our elder members joined Lions they were probably in their 40s/50s & have done their apprenticeship; the social time with other members is an extremely integral part of their social network. Some are unfortunately facing health issues, surgeries etc so clubs need to look out for these members & help them where they can; service is just as important as big fundraising projects.

While I will no longer be the 202J GMT Coordinator I am taking on the role of the 202J District Administrator; this position previously undertaken by the Cabinet Secretary is now a separate position.

Hopefully, I can assist or get assistance for you with any issues of logging into MyLCI, or update membership information for you (I will have the power)

Thank you to DG Ella for her year at the helm & wish DG Elect Christine all the best for her year – 2021/2022. One of the highlights of the past year was being able to visit the Berwick Outdoor Experience on the last day of the camp; what an amazing opportunity for those that took part, some said it was life changing. Have been busy supporting three Enviro Schools projects on the Peninsula. A raised berry garden, (complete with bird netting frames) has been built at Portobello School. Pupils will be involved in growing strawberries, raspberries, blue berries, and black currants.

A 'produce exchange booth' is underway at Macandrew Bay School. Members of the public will be able to donate any fresh produce they don't need, & locals can help themselves to the produce at no cost. School children will be involved in monitoring the use of the exchange booth and learning principles of waste minimisation and community self-help.

At Broad Bay School a raised walkway symbolising aspects of local history will be surrounded with native & exotic plants as well as 'sensory' plants exhibiting special textures & aromas. Work continues on upgrading Peninsula walking tracks, enabling more accessibility for members of the public.

♣ Port Chalmers:

Congratulations to the Port Chalmers Club on attaining 50 years of service to the West Harbour community; this was celebrated with a dinner at the Port Chalmers Town Hall Saturday 5th June. Donated to the Port Chalmers Volunteer Fire Service for a new First Response vehicle, an initial \$1,000 to go to the Dental School for a mural with an undertaking to offset any shortfall after inviting other clubs in the area to contribute.

\$2,500 donation to LCIF. Sponsored a 65 year old lady to the Berwick Outdoor Experience, provided a decorated cake for the District Convention with proceeds going to Camp Quality; also donated \$1,000 to Camp Quality. Ongoing maintenance at the Lady Thorn Dell, have sold 700 bales of peastraw & delivered 4,000 telephone books to the West Harbour area.

Have been entertained by some very interesting speakers: the Otago Harbour Master, K9 Medical Detection group & the North Dunedin MENZSHED they are looking towards completing some future projects with them.

Used Spectacles Collection



Club Meeting Program Ideas

ost general meetings feature a program for the benefit of their members. Programs can inform or entertain and provides a terrific opportunity for members to learn about local issues that might be of interest to the club.

There are many places to find good programs, they include:

Local community leaders

Such as a mayor, member of government, police or fire chief, school superintendent, etc. Not only will the club identify needs within the community, club members will also build stronger relationships with influential community leaders.

• Local business people

Such as representatives from your members' companies, the Chamber of Commerce, or convention and visitor's bureau – programs from these diverse groups can offer variety.

 Recipients of club service Hearing from those who have benefited from club's efforts is a great way to motivate members to continue their dedication to serving those in need.

Cultural Organizations

Such as museums, theaters and orchestras – interesting and informative programs from these organizations are a good way to add variety.

- Organizations that help the disabled Such as Special Olympics, blindness assistance organizations, agencies for the disabled, groups that provide assistance to the elderly and others. These groups often provide opportunities for hands-on involvement.
- District committee chairperson Learn about district projects to encourage club support. Ask your district governor for more information.
- Programs in a pinch

Have a few programs ready in the event of a last minute cancellation. This could include the International Program video, Lions Quarterly, an introduction of the resources available for online learning and many other resources that are available from the website. Ask members if they have any programs they would be willing to present at the last minute if needed. Keep a list of these "emergency" programs on hand so you'll be prepared to act quickly.

 Networking opportunities If your club includes business people, make sure they have the opportunity to network. Encourage them to discuss their business, exchange business cards and include their profession in the club directory.

Promoting Your Meetings and Events to the public

If your club is among the many clubs that welcome the public to attend meetings, consider the following ideas:

- Prominently display a meeting plaque or sign at the meeting location with the date and time of the meeting. See the Club Supplies Store for both plaques and banners.
- Place posters in public areas noting the date, time and location of the club's meetings with a phone number to call for more information.
