I had the pleasure of attending two changeover evenings, Kapiti and Levin Waiopehu, where one new president and one existing president were inducted into their roles. What was also pleasing was the induction of new Lions at both meetings.

President's Weekend this year was held in Masterton where 22 Presidents attended.

Remarkable Pair Achieve Unique NZ Lions Double Honour Story by Dave Murdoch



On Sunday June 27 at 6pm by Zoom two Dannevirke Lions achieved very high honours in Lions International circles.

New Zealand has a membership of 9500 lions in 350 clubs which make up seven districts in Lions International Multiple District 202 including the Pacific Islands as well as New Zealand.

On Sunday Lion Murray Pringle was formally inducted as NZ Multiple District Council Chairman – the highest position for any New Zealand Lion apart from President of Lions Clubs International.

Council Chairman Murray has been a Lion for 11 years and has held several important positions with the New Zealand Council being on the Council Advisory Board, a Trustee of the Lions NZ Charitable Trust and of the Lloyd Morgan Charitable Trust. Lloyd Morgan is New Zealand's only International President (1979-1980).

After joining Dannevirke Host Lions with his partner Simon Williams from Wellington Pride nine years ago, he became its President in 2018 and after that role he took on 202M Cabinet responsibilities of Legal Advisor and Zone Chairman. He moved up the ranks to Vice-District Governor in 2019 and was elected District Governor in the 2020-21 year.

As his District Governor year approached its end, Murray was one of three district governors to apply for the Council Chairperson of Lions Club New Zealand which he won in a vote from all seven district governors in "a truly humbling but also a rewarding experience."

His official role is "To ensure the long-term viability and relevance of Lions Clubs in New Zealand by providing governance, encouragement and assistance in a proactive, professional and enthusiastic and timely manner...." This is no small task and to ensure he can manage Murray has

On Sunday June 27 dropped to part-time at Lloyd Dodson and Pringle in which at 6pm by Zoom two he is a partner with the plan to retire at year's end.

He said his plan for the year is to future-proof Lionism in New Zealand by "providing a blue-print for a sustainable future."

Meanwhile Murray's partner and also Dannevirke Host Lion Club member Simon Williams has moved up the ranks over his 31 years in Lionism as well including being District Trustee of the Lloyd Morgan Charitable Trust, President after Murray of Dannevirke Host, District 202MYouth Chairman and Vice-District Governor in 2020-21.

After Murray's induction as Council Chairperson on Sunday by Zoom, Simon Williams was inducted as 202M District Governor for 2021-22.

This is truly a rare event – for two members of a Lion's club to become consecutive District Governors – but also even more unique – one of them becoming Council Chairman.

Covid-19 has had dramatic impact on these events. When Council Chairman Murray was to be inducted as 202M District Governor in 2020 both he and Simon decided to attend the Multi-District Convention in Singapore in June but by then the pandemic had struck and the convention was cancelled. Instead the seven NZ District Governorselect met under strict contact conditions at Hanmer Springs and were inducted by Zoom.

This year the International Convention was planned for Montreal but Covid ensured it was cancelled. Further however the planned meeting of the seven governor-elects at Martinborough clashed with Wellington's recent Covid scare. So Murray and Simon were officially inducted by Past International Director Ron Luxton by Zoom at home on Sunday night.

In the meantime Lions business continues understandably both amazing lions were a bit pushed to attend the Garage Sale last Saturday and the Booksale starting July 21 but having them in the Dannevirke Host Lions Club is as wonderful as it is humbling.



ENVIRONMENT

Last month I focused on partnering with other community groups to achieve environmental goals. I want to continue with this theme for this month's column.

Firstly, thanks to PDG Jack Hayes for his excellent article to be found elsewhere in this issue of the InforM. Jack describes the valuable contribution several Lions clubs have made in planting trees in the area around the historic Anzac Bridge near Eketahuna. This has involved collaboration with a number of other organisations. See page 24.

I would also like to reflect on a couple of examples of Karori's support of environmental organisations over the years.

In 1995 we invited Jim Lynch QSM to talk to us about his idea of a predator-proof fenced ecosanctuary in the heart of our capital city. We were inspired and offered our services; his "impossible dream" became the iconic Zealandia, where we enjoyed a 25 year association involving many support projects. This included a District 202H project in 2000-2003 involving around 25 Lions Clubs and well over a hundred individual Lions (at one time or another).

A few years ago Karori was looking for a suitable Centennial Legacy Project. We approached the Otari Native Botanic Garden and asked them what projects they might envisage us undertaking. The result is the Lions Otari Plant Conservation Laboratory, which has had international exposure and where some groundbreaking research is being carried out.

The message is, find out what opportunities there are in your community, what great ideas that you can support, what other organisations there are that you can work along with. Ask them how you can best support them - and ideas, opportunities and results will follow.

Once again, I invite club Presidents and members to let me know what environmental projects you are busy with, so that we can share the news and experience around the district.

The following matters could be of interest to all treasurers:

Firstly, the External Reporting Board which sets the accounts formats for charitable trusts amongst other structures such as companies, has reviewed the format of accounts to be filed with the Charities Commission. From about 14 pages to 2! Charitable trusts must be Tier 4. The old format can still be used. The following note has been received from the Charities Commission:

This email contains information that is confidential and is intended for the addressee only. If you are not the intended recipient, please respect that confidentiality and not disclose, copy or make use of its contents. If received in error please destroy this email and advise me immediately. Thanks.

We wanted to share with you that we have made reporting easier for smaller charities and other NFPs by developing a new optional template to help them meet their annual reporting requirements to Charities Services.

We'd like you to help us spread the good news by sharing this information with your relevant networks.

The new template includes all the same information as provided for in the current 18-page Tier 4 Reporting Template but has been reduced to 2 pages (by removing the optional information) - click here for the new template. The basic requirements of the Tier 4 standard have not changed

The optional 2-page template can be used by Tier 4 NFPs to help prepare their 2021 performance report, i.e for balance dates on or after 1 January 2021.

NFPs that wish to include additional information in their reports if requested by funders, for example, can still use the full Tier 4 Reporting Template to report all the required information.

Charities that have an existing reporting format they are happy with can continue using this – the new template is optional only and intended to be a helpful resource for charities rather than an additional requirement.

Sharing this info is easy, you can do one or all of the following: Share the text below as a News Item via email or E-Newsletter, or Post on your FB Page or share our post on LinkedIn:https:// www.linkedin.com/company/external-reporting-board

Secondly, some clubs use the IRD mileage rate for reimbursing members for using their car on Lions business. It should be noted that the rate has dropped to 79 cents from 82 cents and this new rate should be used from 1 April 2021

A re you, as members, aware of the food rescue organisation in your area? Our club, Hastings Host, had Nourish for Nil in to speak to us – this was very interesting – highly recommend clubs getting involved.

Interestingly, one of the first such food rescue organisations in the world was started in the 1970's by Lions in Cape Town, South Africa, and operated within the Western Cape. Like us, Lions in South Africa has shrunk in districts and numbers over the years, and I don't think they are continuing that programme, except that there is now a very large organisation nationwide in South Africa called Food Forward South Africa, which may perhaps have some roots in the Lions programme.

Kaibosh is very substantial, and operates across an area in which there are 18 Lions Clubs in our district. So perhaps an opportunity for at least some of them.

I'm sure you will find the following clip interesting.

Reversing Type 2 Diabetes - can it be done?

It is not possible to permanently cure Type 2 Diabetes but it can be reversed or put into remission. This means a person's HBA1C is in the normal range and they no longer need to take medication.

Not everyone will be able to achieve this. There may be other factors complicating their condition and it is more difficult the longer one has been diagnosed.

The essential goal is to remove fat from around vital organs. Research indicates that a reduction of 15kg is enough to do this and allow the functions of the body to return to a state where they manage blood sugar levels, without medication.

So, this year I began a journey to attempt to reverse my Diabetes. Each month I will provide you a glimpse into that journey, update you on my progress and tell you about the things I have discovered along the way. *Roughly the programme – per day*

Step 1 (8 weeks) – 3 complete nutrition liquid formula and 2 cups non-starch vegetables

- Step 2 (2 weeks 2 complete nutrition liquid formula and one small meal
- Step 3 (2 weeks) 1 complete nutrition liquid formula and two small meals

Step 4 (ongoing) – normal eating, watching quantity, using the other steps when needed.

Jo's Journey - Part 1: In the beginning

Why now? Well, it started with Covid. Firstly, I gained 2 kg, not a lot in terms of weight but it was at the expense of muscle mass, so not healthy. Secondly, there were lots of interesting documentaries on TV and more time to watch. More than one of these mentioned some research done and a programme started in the UK. Thirdly, I found the book **Life Without Diabetes** by Professor Roy Taylor.

The book goes into quite a bit about the research, of which I will provide snippets over the coming months. But one thing was clear, the results are less successful for people who have been diagnosed for more than 10 years. I was diagnosed in November 2008, so it is a case of now or never.

The first step was to get an appointment with my doctor. However, as I was not suffering to any extent, this took nearly a month. Therefore, I embarked on the programme a little early.

The second step, clean out the pantry of banned items and buy the special formula and non-starch vegetables that were to become my routine for the next 8 weeks – or so I thought. In the first week I dropped almost 4kg – a bit fast from a health perspective, so a programme modification was made. Adding a small meal but with little or no carbohydrate.

Once I did manage to get to see my doctor, she was able to cut my Metformin by half (4 down to 2 tablets a day) and remove one of the two blood pressure medications I also need to take.

As I began week 5, one of the common side effects of using formulas begins – constipation! But that will have to wait till the next InforM. In the meantime, send me your best cures and old wives' tales.

Progress report: Start weight was 90.3kg, 4 weeks in 84.9, for a total of 5.4kg lost. Add that a reduction of medication by half.

At he beginning of this month, for the first time in a very long time, we caught up with the processing of glasses. Unfortunately it didn't last long. Within the past 5 days, around two and half thousands glasses arrived on my doorstep to be processed, which means many hours of work for our little team. 300 of these glasses were new, good quality, reading glasses given to us by a shop in Blenheim.

By way of a special request by Kate Hargaves, the wonderful contact I found, we were asked if we were prepared to send some glasses to the Middlemore Foundation, a charity funding life changing initiatives to help those in need of help with health and home education in South Auckland. The Middlemore Foundation also has an eyeglass programme which was an initiative started by Lions Club of Bucklands Beach and designed to assist low income families with funding money for glasses. Just over a week ago I sent 340 pairs of glasses, of mixed magnifications for both readers and distance to donate to people, who find it very difficult to find money for a pair of glasses. We will be continuing to work with this foundation, It is great, we have found somewhere where we are able to help some of our own, low income peope, as well as the Pacific Islanders and the Australian Aborigines.

This month, there has been a lot of publicity on the radio, of the Lions Recycling of Glasses. I was interviewed by one of the stations, and unknown to me, they were recording it to go on air. Also through Multiple District, I was contacted by another radio station for an interview on the project. Not easy to do as, I had no idea what they are going to ask me, and to try to tell the story in 6 minutes was quite a challenge. I must have done a reasonable job, as soon after, I was asked by another radio station to do an interview, which I have done.

Report on the Anzac Bridge Reserve and the Lions

The Anzac Bridge is a well-known sight on State Highway 2 – just north of the Pukaha Mt Bruce Kiwi Reserve, and 10 km south of Eketahuna. It will be 100 years old next year and is now a National Heritage site inside a DOC Reserve and supported by a charitable trust called 'Friends of the Anzac Bridge.'

The DOC Reserve area was mostly the Miller Reserve (gifted in 1947) and two carparks

and the Eketahuna and Pahiatua Lions were the first Lions to assist with native tree plantings in 2008. Woodville, Tararua, and all of the Masterton Clubs have all assisted in planting and maintenance since. Those initial planting efforts are now paying off, with good stands of bush but some gaps. Those gaps are our focus now - plus wind shelter planting with Flax, and Manuka as nursery crops to shelter the larger trees. This is a long-term environmental project in partnership with the local Councils, DOC, the Forests of Peace and Remembrance (Rotary) and the local community. The Miller Reserve also needs some work, so we will be there for a long time yet.

Planting on this site is hard work – mainly using a six foot steel bar to break up the shale sub base and then plant. The site is fertile but exposed to strong winds, is cold in winter with heavy frosts and snow followed by very dry summers! The native plants survive regardless. Our success rate has stayed above 80% even with the occa-



sional theft of plants and the odd predation by stray cattle off the road.

This has become a youth project with much of our annual planting being done by local Schools, the Wairarapa Boxing Academy, the 21 ATC Sqn cadets and local families. We have our next planting bee on site on Sat 16th October starting at 0900. We will have a BBQ going for a lunch to complete the working bee around midday. We will have around 500 trees, shrubs and flax to plant. ALL are welcome.

Re-homing a Defibrillator (continuing to provide a service to the community)

Lions Club of Wellington North have for many years supported (and continue to support) Wellington Free Ambulance along with other community organisations.

In 2015, after consultation with Wellington Free Ambulance the club decided to fund the purchase and installation of a defibrillator in the local community. Countdown in Crofton Downs were enthusiastic in their support of the project and were willing for the defibrillator to be installed in their supermarket, along with a plaque identifying Wellington North Lions, and Wellington Free Ambulance's continuing association with the defibrillator. Things moved quickly once the club made its decision to pay for the defibrillator, with it in place by early 2016.

Fast forward to 2020.

The Countdown Group decided to install their own defibrillators and removed the existing one, along with the associated plaque. The supermarket then contacted Lions and, soon after, the 2016 defibrillator was "re-homed" in the Johnsonville Tennis Club (along with the original plaque) at 9 Dr Taylor Terrace, Johnsonville. Therefore, living to fight another day and possibly saving another life but continuing to provide a service to the community in the northern area of Wellington.
