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

YOUTH REPORT

The Anzac Bridge is a well-known sight on State Highway 2 – just north of the Pukaha Mt Bruce Kiwi Reserve, and 10 km south of Eketahuna. The Lions Cl ubs New Zeal and Cancer Screening Service Update

Lions Clubs Cancer Trust (LCCT)



The History of this Proposed National Project,

This project was first raised by PDG Keith Kenderdine to the MD Centennial Coordinator David Dawick back in 2016-17 where it was suggested that NZ adopt the Lions Clubs Skin Cancer Screening Project as a National 100th year anniversary project. But sadly, the project was not followed up at that time, by the Council of Governors.

Council Chair Arvind Raman invited PDG Colin Beauchamp AM .JP and PDG Garry Irvine to the 2019 Multiple Districts (MD) Convention in Blenheim. At the Convention, the Australian instigators of the service gave a great presentation. PDG Garry Irvine is the Director for liaison with New Zealand (NZ), and has provided a huge amount of information and support to the Project Coordinator.

After discussion at the 2019 MD Convention in Blenheim with Colin and Garry, Paul O'Connor 202E took up the cause and prepared a proposal, and presented it to the Council of Governors Meeting in November 2019. and again, at the 2020 Meeting. The Proposal was that the Council of Governors allow the conduct of a feasibility study and that the proposal be presented to the MD Convention 2021.

The Motion passed at the Convention was;

"That this convention adopts in principle a Lions mobile skin cancer screening service as a National Project to be investigated by a trust to be established by and reporting to the Multiple Districts Council of Governors,"

To comply with the above motion the Trust Document and other administrative Documents for its establishment have been produced by the MD Legal team. The feasibility study asked for by the Council of Governors is also being produced.

The next step is that the Council of Governors will have the opportunity to sign off the project, on their consideration of the feasibility study.

One might ask why this service is not provided by Government then one only has to look at the various organisations who have vehicles on the road plugging those gaps in the health system.

Why is this Lions service required?



Because there is a need and where there is a need there is a Lion.

Over 4000 people. are diagnosed with either *melanoma* in situ or invasive *melanoma* every year in *New Zealand* – that's around 13 every day. *New Zealand's melanoma. incidence rate* is the. world's highest.

Around 70% of *melanoma* cases occur in people aged 50 years and older. *Melanoma* rarely occurs in children. New Zealand has the highest rate of skin cancer in the world.

Figures provided to us after our meeting with Cancer Society Canterbury the stats are as follows; National average of melanoma incidence rate is 35.6 per 100,000 people. (1780) The South Island regions of Otago-Southland, Canterbury-West Coast have the highest incidence rate with 44.4 and 38.6 per 100,000 people (2220), (1930) respectively.

In contrast the regions of Wellington and Waikato-BOP had the lowest of 32.3 and 33.7 per 100,000 (1615) (1685) respectively.

Is it not better that Lions New Zealand create a service that will help our communities? The above statistics tell the story,

This service will be delivered by volunteers and professional staff.

The administrative function will be run by a small team formed as the Project leadership team, all volunteers.

It is envisaged that not all volunteers will be Lions. So, the load is spread with those that wish to be involved. I know that in some Districts they are just champing at the bit to get started. To start with the financials are based on a 20 two-day series of Screening in the first year, but this may increase as we develop the service.

How can your club help

This project is not new, but so many clubs have not been advised of it's worth and why we should be involved, it is hoped that we can get the message out to Clubs through the Zone Chairs and this Newsletter The trust would appreciate any feedback from Clubs. Remember this project has been presented at five (5) District Conventions and two MD Conventions. It would be great to have your support. That support needs to be communicated to your District Governors. This project will by its existence provide a lifesaving lions service to our local communities, and a fantastic opportunity to work as one team of Lions nationally.

NEW RESEARCH New DNA-based test on the horizon for children with solid tumours 13 Sep 2021

When an Australian child is diagnosed with blood cancer acute lymphoblastic leukaemia (ALL), the treating clinician is almost certain to make use of an important DNA-based technique called 'minimal residual disease testing' to help quide treatment decisions. But for children diagnosed with solid tumours, no such test is available.

New Australian research, led by scientists at Children's Cancer Institute published this month in the *British Journal of Cancer*, brings us one step closer to having such a tool.

To investigate the feasibility of using WGS technology as the basis of MRD testing for solid tumours, the researchers used data from the Zero Childhood Cancer Program (ZERO), Australia's first personalised medicine program for children with cancer, which involves extensive molecular testing and analysis of children's tumours, including WGS. Since the program began in 2015, it has generated unprecedented data about cancer in children, including previously unavailable genomic data.

The clinical implications of the findings will be explored in prospective clinical trials.

This work was made possible by funding from Children's Cancer Foundation, Australia and the <u>funding partners</u> of the Zero Childhood Cancer Program.

Coronavirus (COVID19) Update:

Clubs transitioning to Alert

This week the Government announced an adjustment to the restrictions under Alert Level 2, effective 11.59pm Tuesday 21 September.

In view of the above, please note the following:

Business and Dinner meetings:

- The number of people in a gathering has increased to **100**. This means that Clubs can now come out of 'hibernation' and start having Business meetings face to face at their appropriate venues.
- Please scan in using QR code at the venue or keep a record of members who have attended.
- Please remember to keep to the social distancing rule of 2m.
- Masks to be worn at Business meetings.
- Tables and chairs to be set up appropriately.
- Have hand sanitiser available for members to use.
- Respect members decision of not attending a meeting, or not to wear a mask for medical reasons.
- If a member is not feeling well, or has symptoms of a cold or flu, they should not attend.
- Meeting venues need to be wiped down prior to and after the meeting. (Check with the establishment if they charge extra as a decontamination fee).
- Meeting venues with access to Bar facilities: if the bar facility is at your Club venue one member at a time to be served. If the venue is at a public venue, then to have one person serving you at your table. (Please adhere to the venue's health and safety requirements).
- All sub-committee meetings to adhere to the above.
- In respect to Dinner meetings, members need to be seated, separated, and have one person serving your whole table. (No buffet dinner setting).
- Note: All members to follow safe, hygiene requirements.

Projects:

Community organisations can operate, and volunteers can resume their duties at Alert Level 2. However, everyone should do everything they can to reduce the risk of transmission. Where it applies, community organisations should follow the guidance that has been provided for businesses and guidance on gatherings.

Volunteer organisations whose services involve close personal contact must keep contact tracing records.

- Volunteers should keep records of where they go when they go there and who they meet.
- If you have cold or flu-like symptoms, stay home.
- Keep a 2-metre distance from others where possible.
- Wash your hands regularly.
- Reduce the number of shared surfaces, and regularly disinfect them.
- Minimise risk in all projects and follow appropriate protocols in respect to the COVID19 Health requirements. (i.e., social distancing, regular hand hygiene and cleaning of common Surfaces).
- If your project is an event involving a large group of people the numbers need to be kept within a maximum of 100.
- If your project involves serving the community, need to have hand sanitiser available for public use. Members need to use gloves where appropriate (i.e., taking money, handling food, taking tickets, or direct contact with the public), and have wipes and disinfectant spray available to wipe down surfaces on a regular basis. Remember social distancing needs to apply, as well as members to wear masks.
- Any project involving the public using pens, pencils, etc. These need to be wiped after every use.

ENVIRONMENT



This is one of the 5 Global Causes Lions Clubs International.

During the past fifteen months of writing this column, I have focused several times on forming partnerships with other groups to achieve worthwhile environmental outputs, and I do so once again, because it's important.

Environmental matters are gaining increasing airtime in the media these days, for good reason. COP26 is a two week international conference in Glasgow beginning 31 October. It is of particular significance because it's the first 5-year reassessment of national objectives to combat climate change after the Paris Agreement. Unfortunately, it is already a political football. If you haven't read about it in the media already, I am sure that you will.

In order to survive, the international Lions community needs to stay relevant, and appeal to younger people. Increasingly younger people are becoming more environmentally aware and active, as they recognise that it is their future at risk.

There are many environmental groups active. Unless your club has good expertise and knowledge of what's needed in your community regarding environmental aspects, it makes sense to link up with a group already established and active. This could be informally at first, as just a couple of Lions joining in and taking an interest. Later, perhaps, you could establish a more formal partnership. This provides an opportunity to achieve worthwhile objectives, meet like-minded people, possibly gain new members and gain good publicity.

DIABETES AWAREENESS

Reversing Type 2 Diabetes – living on 800 calories a day

A key part of the programme to reverse type 2 diabetes is the 12 weeks reduction. The first 8 of these is consuming only 800 calories a day.

There are two ways to do this – find a recipe book of calorie-controlled meals or use a liquid formula. The formula needs to specify that they are complete nutrition. I found two formulas commonly available in New Zealand, Opti Slim and Opti Fast but they must be the ones with VLCD after the title. This stands for Very Low Calorie Diet.

The votes for which formula is better run at about 50/50. I prefer Opti Slim but not all the flavours, Espresso is my favourite closely followed by Vanilla and Chocolate. I was not a fan of Strawberry or Banana and the soups are nothing but dire. A friend loves the Opti Fast desserts. Whichever is used both products also include eating two cups of non-starch vegetables each day as well. According to Professor Taylor, this is to combat the tendency for the formulas to cause constipation.

In my last column I asked you for your tips and tricks for combatting constipation but received none. So here are my go to favourites – licorice (but watch if you have high blood pressure), prunes or dates and artificially sweetened treats (the ones that warn of laxative effect), what better way to put this to use.

For this month's challenge I am looking for the swaps you use to make a favourite dish or meal healthier. Of special interest to Type 2 diabetics is how to reduce carbohydrates. Send your ideas to 202m.diabetes@lionsclubs.org.nz

Jo's Journey - Part 2: Well down the road

Since being diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes back in 2008, I have found that the predominant medical professions approach to treatment is monitor and respond. Every 3 months I have a set of blood tests taken and my doctor alters my medication accordingly. I was initially offered an appointment with a nutritionist and a podiatrist but neither was ongoing.

It was the blood testing facility that told me I could get a 'serial card' so I didn't have to get a form from the doctor each time I needed tests. But it took me nearly 2 years to get the doctor to set the facility up.

To be fair, the government does fund the 4 appointments and check-ups per year and some of the prescription charges. It was still costing me about \$200 per year, but this is now considerably reduced, as my medication has reduced.

Diabetes New Zealand provides free information and a subscription magazine but does not have a regional support outlet in Wellington. For this you need paid membership of Diabetes Wellington Inc. I did not find the latter was value for money.

Unlike many other comparable countries, unless you are willing to spend the money or do the work yourself, there is little proactive treatment of the diabetes in New Zealand.

Over the last 8 weeks I have been able to slowly add more meals back into my diet but have reached somewhat of a plateau. At this point my second round of blood test have revealed that I have already reached the desired position of being back in normal range for blood sugar levels. However, my goal is still to lose the additional 5kg to allow me a bit of wiggle room.

My doctor still has me taking one Metformin a day and has halved what was left of my blood pressure medication, so another good reason to continue the good fight.

Progress report: After 12 weeks 81.4kg, a total of 9.9kg lost. On the day of lockdown I had new test results. HBA1C is now 4.3 which is back in normal range. Further reductions to medications.

Next issue – What Professor Roy Taylor found in his research into Type 2 diabetes.



Facts surrounding cataracts

Cataracts are a leading cause of blindness worldwide. A cataract is described as a clouding of the normally clear lens of the eye. Once the lens becomes cloudy, the light which normally passes though a clear lens becomes distorted before reaching the retina on the back of the eye. This causes a drop in vision quality, ranging from reading difficulties in early stages up to complete blindness in one or both eyes, as stages get more severe.

Symptoms to look out for include:

Blurred vision;

Sensitivity to light (glare)

Reduced night vision

Fading or 'yellowing' of colours

Cataracts generally develop in both eyes, but not evenly. The cataract in one eye may be more advanced than the other, causing a difference in vision between eyes. Cataract formation affects only the lens of the eye and not other important structures, such as cornea, iris, retina, or optic nerve.

Most cataract surgery is performed after the age of 60 due to the aging process, however some people may develop cataracts earlier around age 50. It is not uncommon for cataracts in very young people in their teens and 20's.

Removal of a cataract is the most common surgical eye operation performed in New Zealand and Australia. It has a high rate of success due to the modern methods used by ophthalmologist. If the eye is healthy, the likelihood the removal of a cataract will store good vision, and frequently glasses are not necessary,.

The lens is contained within a clear membrane called the lens capsule. The lens capsule separates the lens from the iris and the transparent, thick fluid called the vitreous body.,

With older surgical methods, both the lens and the capsule were removed, with modern methods the capsule is preserved. This is a significant in surgical technique because:

The capsule is used to position the artificial lens Risks of surgery are fewer Vision following surgery is generally much improved.

Cataract surgery takes approximately half an hour, and within a day of surgery some vision, if not all, is normally gained.


