## The Elephant in the Room

In a COVID-19 environment it will be about, where possible finding a safe way to undertake our service activities

Clearly, Lions does not have infection control expertise and rely on direction from experts in the Public Health sector

The pace of change in the COVID-19 pandemic is unprecedented when compared with typical risks that we deal with in our service activities, so we need to constantly assess the situation

For those reasons, it will not always be easy for Lions to 'get things right'

Consider these risk factors to our members.

How many people does the member carrying out that work come into contact with?				
Very few = lower risk	Many = higher risk			
How easy will it be to identify the people who the member comes into contact with?				
Easy to identify, such as other members = lower risk	Difficult – such as members of the public = higher risk			
How close is the member carrying out the tasks in proximity to other people?				
2 metres or more in an outdoor space = lower risk	Close physical contact indoors = higher risk			
How long does the work require the member to be in that proximity to other people?				
Brief contact = lower risk	Lengthy contact = higher risk			
Does the activity involve regular interaction with people considered at higher risk of severe illness from				
COVID-19, such as people with underlying health conditions?				
Little to none = lower risk	Whole time = higher risk			
What is the risk of COVID-19 infection and transmission in the activity environment when compared to				
the risk outside the activity?				
Equal to outside work = lower risk	Higher than outside work = higher risk			
Will the work continue to involve regular interaction with unknown people if the region is at a higher				
Alert level?				
No = lower level	Yes = higher risk			

The Alert level the Region you are in ultimately dictates what activities may or may not be undertaken, this guideline is applicable if the activity you are planning is 'permitted'

Consider the results, if the nature of the service activity itself raises the risk of COVID 19 infection and transmission above the risk faced outside of the activity, advice coming through from Worksafe NZ as recently as 26 October suggests if risk exists against this assessment, and you chose to continue with the activity <u>vaccinated</u> members should be the only ones getting involved.

If the situation is not as it were 'black and white' it would be reasonably practical to err on the side of caution.

There are also myriads of Projects completed by other Clubs that you can look at and use to help you plan your Project. Have a play around and learn something new. Don't forget to get your Secretary or Club Administrator to fill in the manhours etc at the end of the Project and push the report button to complete your Project.

There is a large national Project coming next year called Rowing for Life Aotearoa NZ. It is a partnership between Rowing NZ, Waka Ama NZ, Surf Life Saving NZ, Coastguard NZ and Lions NZ in which a group of rowers are going to row from Bluff up the East Coast of both islands and around the top to Cape Reinga. The aim is to raise funds for Child cancer, Surf Lifesaving, Starship Hospital, hopefully the Lions Cancer Trust (mobile Skin Cancer Screening Unit (yet to be verified) and unfunded cancer drugs. They hope to row about 30-40 kms per day starting in March and taking to July. Lions have been asked to help with fundraising events. Our logo will be on the boats. Promotion and anywhere else suitable. This is a fantastic promotion for Lions and Leo's! When the teams land at the various locations, Lions can have BBQ's or a fundraising event where the rowers will attend to talk and possibly Olympic rowers may be able to attend to raise the profile of the event.

Clubs would bank funds raised to their Districts so they can be receipted and acknowledged. Then the funds are to be transferred to a Lloyd Morgan account and at the completion divided between all the named charities. Lloyd Morgan will charge a small admin fee for the use of the account.

I will attempt to get the schedule of landing spots out to affected Clubs as soon as I can so they can start planning fundraising events. Any questions give me a call and I will endeavour to answer them or will find the answers for you.

# Lions upgrade transport service

A HIGHLY valued transport service has been upgraded by the Edgecumbe Lions Club.

The club has purchased a replacement car for the transport service that helps local residents get to appointments around and outside the region.

Driver Edward Davis said in the past year the car had travelled 14,700 kilometres, assisting Öhöpe, Kawerau, Edgecumbe, Matatā, Whakatāne and Thornton people get to appointments.

The Lion's club donated the first car two-and-a-half years ago. The replacement car has been purchased by the club with a discount and two 15,000km services, courtesy of Nicholson Autos.

The transport service was originally set up in 2019, when Riversles Medical Centre manager Storm Hale saw the need for an accessible transport service for patients to get to important appoint-

ments or into town from Edgecumbe and surrounding areas.

"I found that people were not showing up for appointments or able to do shopping in town. The 'did not attend' outcomes at the hospital were not good — I want our people to be looked after and there is a need in this area," Mrs Hale said.

At the time, the taxi service in Edgecumbe had been discontinued and buses were unreliable, so for some, trying to travel into town had become highly difficult, stressful and expensive, said Lions member Harold Perry.

"The taxi has to leave from Whakatane,

drive out, then return back. It can end up costing around \$90 a trip," he said.

Those benefiting from the service include a blind elderly man who uses the service to go shopping once a fertnight.

Mr Perry said the service was for anyone who needed it to travel and could not safely transport themselves.

"If they need it, it's there," he said.

The car is based at the Riverslea Medical Centre and is available for any residents of Edgecumbe or surrounding areas.

Driving arrangements can be made with the drivers based at the centre. The cost to use the car is a \$20 donation per 100km travelled - this works out to be about \$2.50 for a trip into Whakatane.

The car can also travel longer distances so people can get to medical appointments outside the area.

#### Celebrating 10 years – November Newsletter

The Cancer Society Lions Lodge 10<sup>th</sup> Birthday refit has just hit \$200K of which the Lions Group from the 202L Region have very kindly donated \$120K toward the target.

Since the middle of August when New Zealand went into lockdown due to the Corvid-19 out breaks in Auckland, unfortunately parts the Waikato region has been caught up in this outbreak too and has been at Level 3 now for over four weeks.

Because of the outbreak and trying to keep the Lodge guests safe during their treatment. The Cancer Society formed two bubbles which means Guests can only go to treatment, all meals are serviced to their rooms and they often cannot go home in the weekends until they have finished all their treatment. This can mean weeks for some of the guests before they are able to see their families.

For me personal, I have been volunteering at the Lodge helping where possible, making and servicing meals, driving the shuttle backwards and forward to the hospital for guest to get to treatment. Which has been very humbling to make a small difference to help someone's life during these unusually times a little easier.

Thank you to the support of the Banking Trust and Tamahere Lions Club we have been able to move very quickly on getting more TVs installed into all the bedrooms to give the guests something to watch while they are having to spend more time in their rooms.



#### The International Association of Lions Clubs - OBJECTS


- TO CREATE and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.







## Four new Lions Club members


The Morrinsville Lions Club inducted four new members into the club at a recent meeting.

We all know that COVID has had a huge impact on our communities with more families in need than ever before – many who have never asked for help are suffering because of job losses and increased day-to day costs. Demand at the Welcome Bay Community Centre has ballooned from around 20 families per week to well over 40 families per week.

On Monday 6 September Welcome Bay Lions Club began to help to feed our community; each week two of our members shop at Pak 'nSave Cameron Road, Tauranga and spend around \$300 on essential food items (including cereals, milk, vegetables, meat, pasta and rice plus much more).

Charles & Sue used their bargaining skills with the owner of the store to gain us a very generous discount every week.

On average we are helping to feed 12 local families each week (often there is enough to help a few







#### LIONS WELCOME BAY SUPPORT POOR GIFTED STUDENTS IN TANZANIA

Reaching out to help the scholarship students of St. Constantine International School in Tanzania, DG Suez Reid adapted the East African styles to brighten up her attire for the day.

One of several volunteers from the Welcome Bay Lions Club, **Sanaa na Ufundi** (Art and Craft Exhibition) had a difficult start with lockdown levels meaning the VIP launch featuring dancing, music, food and a Zoom connection between Deputy Minister of Education Jan Tinetti and the students in Tanzania, all had to be cancelled – twice. When it did open, it was with limited access – so the hard work and Lions promotion was much appreciated.

A special surprise was the arrival of a local Te Puke family who had not only lived in Arusha, but two of their three children had attended the school in the 70s. They were delighted to be able to bring their own children to have a taste of East Africa.

Stranded back home in New Zealand, it was Lions member and St. Constantine International School's marketing director, Leonie Trubshoe, who decided to organise the art and craft exhibition as part of a campaign to raise funds to help the poor gifted students gain an international education.

One of the top private schools in Tanzania, the school had been favoured by the attendance of many UN agency children, NGOs, and the families of executives from major international companies paying fees at the upper end of the scale, with the profits from them used to create partial scholarships for highly talented, poorer students who showed potential to be leaders within their own country.

However, due to the mass exodus of international organisation families because of Covid, they have next to no ongoing scholarship funding coming in.

Net enrolment ratios in the senior years in Tanzania are less than 4% and class sizes in Government schools are often over 120 pupils per class - so, in order to create leaders within the country, we need to be able to help the very talented amongst the poor.

For the last three years – including through lockdown – 100% of St. Constantine International School's A-level students passed. The exams and assessments were graded in Cambridge, UK alongside their international equivalents, despite most not having English as a first language, and a period of being in lockdown when many only had borrowed school tablets on which to work - and erratic internet service!
