Judging Criteria for the Clarkson Trophy:

udging club bulletins is done on the 100 point system below which was published for many years in the Policy & Procedures Manual (*now no longer seems to be available on the NZ Lions website*).

Layout and Appearance (20 points)

- Masthead
- Club name
- Official meeting place & time
- Appearance
- Illustrations (Clear, good size, appropriate)
- Originality

Front cover: Should include club name, Lions logo, a suitable illustration, club charter date, month & year of each edition.

Use current (since October 2008) Lions logo. Download from LCI website. Bulletins containing obsolete versions are marked down.

Body of Bulletin: Clear headings, legible text, uncluttered layout

Content (80 points)

- Editorial (Can be about anything and might be controversial.)
- Reports (including President's Report should be positive, encouraging, about 1 A5 page. Committee reports - each club sub-committee should report on progress. Board meeting report could be a digest of proceedings, or the Minutes of the meeting.)
- Completed projects
- Future projects
- Club, Zone, District & International news (Zone, District & International news are the larger picture. News and views from outside the club. May include articles from J-Times, or from LCI – use their website)
- Coming events (a list of the events with date, time, venue)
- Humour (Use plenty! As long as it is appropriate to the readership, which should include partners and families of members

 keep it clean, avoid off-colour jokes.)

Include a club data page, important information about the next meeting. Also a list, somewhere in the bulletin, of key club officers.

The following points should be carefully watched in designing and printing the bulletin:

- Neatness
- Legibility
- Convenience of size
- Attractive appearance

MyLCI Updating

C lub secretaries please ensure that all your club information is up to date and correct on MyLCI before you do your 2022/2023 club officer reporting.

To edit members details, go into MyLCI, & select the Edit link to the right of a member's name.

Also update club information such as meeting times/days, venues etc.

"Club Info" is in the pull-down menu within "My Lions Club" on the dark blue strip below the Lions emblem beside MyLCI at the top left of the page. It is essential all this information is up to date as Multiple District 202 & District 202J get all the information for the 2022/2023 directories from MyLCI and if it is incorrect there it will be incorrect in the directories!

Updating is ongoing whenever members personal details change (email, address, phone numbers etc etc)

- it is essential to be done before you file your club officers for 2022/2023.

2022/2023 club officer reporting to be completed before 15 May.

Preparing for MyLCI Reporting Club officers 2022/2023 year

nce your club board for 2022/20223has been elected the names for each position must be reported to Lions Clubs International via My LCI before 15 May.

Prepare now for filing your incoming officers' report by ensuring all members' data is correct in the MyLCI website (where you do your monthly electronic reporting of membership & activities). This is the information that will be included in the report & subsequently in the Multiple District & District directories

- incorrect information within MyLCI means errors in the directories.

Check & update data for all members, but the critical ones for the 2022 - 2023 incoming officers' report are:

- President
- + 1st & 2nd VPs
- Secretary
- Club Administrator (the person who does MyLCI reporting)
- Treasurer
- Membership Chairman
- LCIF coordinator
- Club Service Chairman
- Club Marketing & Communications
 Chairman
- Directors.

These are the members you are going to add as Officers of your club for the 2022-2023 Lions year. Ensure details are entered as proper sentence format (i.e. not all capitals)

Preparing for MyLCI Reporting (cont'd) Club officers 2022/2023 year

Follow these steps:

- Go to: https://www.lionsclubs.org/en
- Click: MEMBER LOGIN (in black text UPPER CASE on white background near the top just right of centre)
- "Access to your Lion Account" appears
- Choose "Sign In" if you already have a user name & password,
- Otherwise choose "Register" & create your Lion Account.
- Once signed in the Member Portal page appears. Click "MyLCI" icon (second to left)
- Club Home Page appears
- Click "My Lions Club" (gold text on the dark blue band near top), then "Members". Find the member to have details updated. Click on "Edit Member" at right hand side.
- A new window called "Edit Member" appears. Some info (address, phone number, email) can be changed here. Click "Officer Correspondence Address Same as Member Correspondence Address" to update both addresses.
- Click "Save" at the bottom. A confirmation of submitted change window appears. Click "Go Back to Members" near the bottom left to edit another member.
- Other info such as name, date of birth are changed from the "Change Member Information Request" underneath "First Name".
- A window called "Change Member Information Request" opens. Insert the changed details in the fields (boxes) at the right under the heading "Change To".
- If making a name or date of birth change enter the details in the field (box) "Reason for Name Change".
- Click on "Submit". A confirmation of submitted change window appears. An email from LCI's Member Service Centre will come advising the name/DOB change has been processed.
- Ensure all members data is correct this is the information that will be recorded into the 2022/2023 club officers' report: name, address, phone number/s, email, and spouse/partner. Correct any errors/changes & include the postcode (you can find this at the Address & Postcode Finder: https://www.nzpost.co.nz/tools/address-postcode-finder
- Note: you cannot record on the MyLCI website a club address such as a PO Box for subsequent publishing in the Multiple District 202 directory. Only the club members' addresses are recorded on the website. Should your club address be other than a member's address (e.g. a PO Box) please advise the Multiple District office at: md202.secretary@lionsclubs.org.nz

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MyLCI Reporting 2022/2023 Club Officers

NOW - To file your incoming officers' report:

- 1. Go back to your club's Home page: Click "Home" at left hand side on dark blue band with gold text below the Lions emblem
- 2. Click "My Lions Club" on the dark blue band to the right of "Home".
- 3. Click "Officers" from the pull down menu, then "Select Term" (at left hand side), then "Next Year" from the pull down menu
- 4. "Officers" page appears: "Choose Officer Type" is the default in the pull down menu to the right of "Select Term".
 A list of vacant offices appears (officer positions are listed at left hand side of page)
- 5. Click on "Add Officer" at right hand side of page for President position
- 6. "Assign Officers" page appears
- 7. Click on "Select Member" (club listing appears)
- 8. Click on member's name for this position. Screen returns to "Assign Officer" page. The member's name is displayed to the left of "Select Member"
- 9. Then click "Save" near the bottom of the screen
- 10. The Confirmation page appears. Beneath "What would you like to do?" choose "Go back to officers"

Repeat the steps 5 - 10 for each of the 1st & 2nd VPs, Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Chairman, LCIF coordinator, Club Service Chairman, Club Marketing & Communications Chairman & Club Directors.

- 11. Then choose "Go back to officers", then pull down "Choose Officer Type" & select "Lions Club Admins" - that is the club member who does the MyLCI/MyLion monthly reporting. Assign the club administrator as for the club officers.
- 12.Go back to the Home Page.
- 13. Click "My Lions Club"
- 14. Click Reports, Click Lions Clubs Officer Report for Next Year (near bottom of list)
- 15.Click View/Print

16.You can now see the report (a pdf file)

Used Hearing Aids & Batteries Collection

- Hearing Aid batteries are now going through to Lion Andy Andrews in Cromwell (see Used Spectacles page 17 for details); Andy has someone in his area who is coordinating this. He has arranged for a transport company to collect them in Dunedin so again, if they come to IPDG Ella she can arrange for them to get to Cromwell.
 - The money raised goes towards funding cochlear ear implants (government funding has been reduced).
- Used Hearing Aids: drop them off at any Bay Audiology Clinic. They have the "Free to Ear - Samoa Programme" where they provide free hearing health care to the Apia community using donated used hearing aids.

Lions Clubs International FOUNDATION

hile we rely on Lions clubs around the world to contribute to LCIF on a regular basis, approximately 30% of the total contributions to LCIF come from partner organisations and affiliates which help our ability to give and serve. Our Foundation works strategically with some of the world's finest organisations in an effort to maximise our capacity and funding.

In essence these partnerships enable LCIF to better support Lions around the world so we can support more people with our humanitarian services. Our partners range from dedicated non-profit, government, NGO and Corporate partners, all of whom provide our Foundation (LCIF) with access to a diverse pool of resources and knowledge.

Johnson and Johnson have awarded LCIF millions of dollars since 2002 to help fund Sight for Kids screenings for millions of children throughout Asia. These screenings are coordinated by local Lions in the various areas.

Since 2014, LCIF has partnered with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) to expand Lions Quest in Southeast Europe, Central America, and West Africa. As an evidence-based program for school prevention, Lions Quest aligns with the methodologies outlined in the UNODC's International Standards for Drug Use Prevention. LCIF has granted more than US\$1.4 million to pilot Lions Quest in Serbia, North Macedonia, Montenegro, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Croatia, Guatemala, El Salvador, and Ivory Coast; UNODC has mobilized a similar amount.
