Welcome everyone to the start of our Lions year: 2022-23.

It is important that we acknowledge the first people's language. There are three languages in New Zealand: Te Reo, English and Sign Language.

Each of the clubs in our district has a unique and a special history. In Te Reo that is called Whakapapa.

What does Whakapapa mean? It maps relationships so that mythology, legend, history, knowledge, tikanga, custom, philosophies and spiritualties are organised, preserved, and transmitted from one generation to the next.

When we organise and hold our changeover nights we can all see the Whakapapa in the stories, the reports, and the awards. We are transmitting the club from one year to the next.

Whakapapa has two parts:

- Whaka: this means to cause something to happen. We as Lions do this when we complete our service in our communities, year on year. This leads to the second part of the word.
- Papa: this means layers. As our clubs go from their charter night and on through the years many layers are added to the club.

Each of our 33 Presidents will add their own layer to the Whakapapa of our District's clubs. Just as they made a commitment to do their best so we all as members committed to support them.

Kia whakatomuri te haere whakamua: 'I walk backwards into the future with my eyes fixed on my past'.

This whakatauki or 'proverb' speaks to Maori perspectives of time, where the past, the present and the future are viewed as intertwined, and life

as a continuous cosmic process. Like our Lions emblem, looking forwards and backwards simultaneously.

It has been a privilege to attend eight changeovers and witness the ending of one layer and the starting of another- thank you.

I hope you will take the opportunity to think about our District goal:

By the end of Lions year 2022-23, every club in District 202J will have reported a service activity online, had a member attend training, made a contribution to LCIF and contributed to a net membership growth of ten members for the District.

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Focus on Global Membership (GMT)

ur District membership target for the 2022-23 Lion's year is a net membership growth of not less than 10. In recent years we have, in common with other Districts, experienced net membership losses. The Lions Global Membership Approach (GMA) is an integrated approach across all Districts to address and reverse this worldwide trend. As the GMA lead for our District, I seek your help and support in working with you to recruit and retain members across clubs and thank those who attended the District Forum for their input.

Given the age profile of membership in our District, clubs need to focus on keeping older members engaged and supported with greater usage of privileged membership. They also need to ensure younger members are encouraged and supported to take on roles within the club and provided with appropriate mentoring and training to undertake those roles. These two objectives could be combined by pairing appropriate older and younger members.

Lions has a century of traditions, but also needs to operate in the present. Clubs need to examine the way they conduct meetings, projects and other activities and, whilst respecting the past, place emphasis on what is effective and promotes good fellowship rather than reliving the past. Restrict formality to where it is needed, in making and recording decisions, but be more relaxed but respectful elsewhere.

Make your club a club that people want to belong to because it allows them to enjoy participating and serving in its events.

District 202J Remembrance and Rededication Service Timaru 12 June 2022

Rededication Address presented by Past International Director Tony Hanning

istrict Governor Christine and Kevin; fellow Lions; members of the Lions' family and friends. "There is no exercise better for the heart than reaching down and lifting people up."

During his presidential year, our International President, Douglas X Alexander, has emphasised that Lions are a family like no other. "With our hearts united in service," he said, "we will lift up our communities all over the world, because in times of great need, only a greater passion for service can make the world a better place for all people." President Alexander has always led with his heart. "There is no exercise better for the heart than reaching down and lifting people up." Quoting Muhammad Ali, the President said 'Service to others is the rent you pay for your room here on earth.'

In recent days, as celebrations have taken place marking Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee, we have heard a lot about service. In her 21st birthday speech in 1947, she said, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong." That has been an unwavering commitment throughout her seventy years as Queen, formally endorsed by her recently:

"In this year of my Platinum Jubilee, it has given me pleasure to renew the promise I made in 1947, that my life will always be devoted in service."

Loyalty and commitment to service are ideals that mark her life.

As Lions, we too, make a commitment to live by certain principles and ideals, and like the Queen, we rededicate ourselves to those ideals from time to time, as we do today.

For the current Lions' year, District Governor Christine chose the theme: "Together We are a Team." That theme fits well with our International Lions' motto, **We Serve.** As Lions we do not serve alone; we serve as members of a club, so yes, it is as part of a TEAM led by District Governor Christine that our clubs have provided service this year.

District Governor Christine always likes to be well-prepared, (and is,) but her year as Governor has led her into many uncharted waters. Despite the pandemic and other difficulties, she has led us well because of her commitment to service and her willingness to change and adapt according to circumstances. I reminded her recently that the Titanic and the Earnslaw were launched in the same year (1912). If she had been the captain of the Titanic it may well have missed the iceberg and still have been sailing today, like the little old Earnslaw!

Come 1 July, our new International President will be Lion Brian Sheehan, who plans to visit our District immediately after his election in Montréal and share his vision and plans with us. District Governor Christine will hand over the ship to District Governor Elect Jules Ellis, who will steer it out of the harbour and take us on a cruise to destinations yet to be revealed.

As our borders open and the travel bug bites again, young ones start itching for their big OE. I am reminded of a young American college student back in 1967, Diane Spieker, who spent a summer working at a resort in Switzerland. She was fascinated by the chance to meet people of many different nationalities. Ones she was most taken with were Jews who had emigrated to Israel and who

holidayed in Switzerland because they could not bear to return to their native Germany, site of so many sad memories. She was impressed by the kind and gentle manner of one man who was interested in the fact that American students were working in Europe. When she noticed one morning that he and his family were leaving, she put down her trays and went over to tell them how much she had enjoyed meeting them. The man said how he had enjoyed meeting her too as that was his job with an international organisation out of Amsterdam - meeting and talking with young people from all over the world. Diane asked if this was to help them find jobs or entrance into universities abroad? "No," he said. "It's simply to bring people together for talks and discussions on promoting peace and better understanding in the world."

(Where have you heard that before, Lions? The opening words of our Lions Purpose statement of course: "To Create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.") That is one of the advantages of belonging to the largest service organisation in the world, Lions Clubs International.

Diane chatted on, "Oh, I think that's just great. One thing I've learnt from my summer working and travelling here, is that until you've lived and worked with people from different countries and backgrounds you can never really understand their feelings and problems. I think the only way we can have peace in the world is to have people of different nationalities living and working together." He smiled and nodded in agreement. Diane remembered that her group would be in Amsterdam later that summer so asked could they visit him where he worked. He agreed willingly and said, "Just ask for me when you arrive." "But who should I ask for?" She said. "Just ask for Frank," he replied. "But Frank who?" she queried. He took her hands in his and replied softly, "I'm Anne Frank's father." Diane's eyes welled with tears. She had read all about Anne Frank's experiences, and death in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. She was overwhelmed and could but mumble how honoured she was to meet him. As he held her hands he commented, "I'm happy to hear what you have said. If people could remember the ideals they had when they were seventeen and still live by them when they are seventy, the world would be a better place, **so stick to your ideals.**"

Lions, this day, 12 June, happens to be Anne Frank's birthday. Born in 1929, today would have been her 93rd birthday. Anne was just a few years younger than the Queen. Her parents, Edith Frank-Hollander and Otto Frank, hid their family in Otto's office building for two years before being betrayed and discovered. Anne, her older sister Margot, and the girls' mother all died during the Holocaust, leaving Otto Frank as the family's only surviving member.

On 12 June 1942, Anne was given a blank book for her thirteenth birthday, which she transformed into her famous diary. Her *Diary of a Young Girl* (The Diary of Anne Frank) gives a full account of her life in hiding from June 1942 through early August 1944. She explained its value this way: "I can shake off everything if I write; my sorrows disappear, my courage is reborn." Of all the entries in her diary this one struck me the most with its beauty and simplicity:

"It's really a wonder that I haven't dropped all my ideals, because they seem so absurd and impossible to carry out. Yet I keep them, because in spite of everything I still believe that people are really good at heart... If I look up into the heavens, I think that it will all come right ... and that peace and tranquility will return."

Lions, if a young girl in Anne Frank's circumstances had reason to hope, what reason do we have to do anything less."

Rededication Address 12 June (cont'd)

Our communities depend on us to meet needs that would otherwise go unmet. Lives and futures can be forever changed by an act of service or an act of kindness. There is a saying which applies to us as Lions: "You have not lived today until you have done something for someone who can never repay you."

Speaking metaphorically, today, 12 June 2022, like Anne on her thirteenth birthday, each of us receives a blank book awaiting entries of service that we and our club members will carry out during the coming year. When we gather again in twelve months' time what a diary of service that could be! It is up to you and me to make sure that our book doesn't remain blank.

Before we conclude, let us reflect for a moment on those words of Otto Frank to the young student; 'Stick to your ideals.'

Now let us rededicate ourselves to another year of Lions' service. This year, let us do that by paraphrasing the Queen's rededication: I renew the promise I made when I became a Lion, that my life will be devoted to service." Lions, I invite you to repeat that promise with me.

What do we do Lions? What is our motto?

Response: We Serve.

Ma te Atua koutou, e tiaki, e manaaki, e nga wa katoa. (May God protect and bless you now and always.)



Lions. When you hear or read of major Lions humanitarian services being undertaken around the world and here in NZ, be proud of the fact that each and everyone of you have contributed to them by supporting your Foundation, LCIF.

Ukrainian Update:

One of LCIF Refugee Relief grants made in June, was \$US300,000 to Poland Lions to help provide meals, grocery food starter kits and hygiene supplies to the refugees. Polish Lions are also purchasing furniture and equipment for dormitories being used to house refugees in the Warsaw area.

In Italy and in France, Lions are purchasing and distributing food, baby diapers, clothing and hygiene supplies. As the refugees move further into Europe, more Lions Districts are providing for the refugees with LCIF Refugee Relief Grants. Over \$US1.5 million in grants have been made to Lions Clubs enabling Lions to serve thousands of displaced refugees.
