- Diabetes "Lap the Map" November as Diabetes Month. There is time to think about what you might like to do as a club or maybe as a District / Multiple District. Could we 'walk' the length of NZ? Maybe organise a District wide relay...

Keep up the good work, stay safe.



Your donations to LCIF help make so much of our service possible, as the needs continue to increase around the world. As humanitarians, our organization continues to grieve for those impacted by the crisis in Ukraine and surrounding countries in Europe. In our first story below, you will see how Lions are responding to the crisis, empowered by LCIF funding made possible by your support. As Campaign 100 enters its final two months, and we strive to meet our US\$300 million goal, we ask you to continue to commit your participation as we help build bridges across borders and our differences.

Responding to the Humanitarian Crisis in Ukraine

The conflict in Ukraine has driven millions of people from their homes, creating a humanitarian crisis that is forcing families to search for safety and security. In this time of great need, Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) is awarding grants to make sure Lions are there to help provide immediate relief to those struggling to meet their most basic needs, and Lions around the world are uniting through kindness to help the people who desperately need it.







Greetings to all Lions worldwide from our Lions Clubs International Foundation.

What a tumultuous world we live in. While we are still getting over our own floods, fires, tsunamis and volcanic eruptions, the world decides to deliver us Covid and now a desperate humanitarian situation in the Ukraine and surrounding countries.

LCIF has listed the need for aid in this horrible war and all I can say is "Thank God for Campaign 100" and the forethought of LCI in getting this fundraising appeal underway. This appeal is due to finish at the end of June this year and we have achieved 91.3% of our goal (as at 25 March) and we WILL get to that \$300 million target.

LCIF has set up a category to donate specifically to the Refugee crisis in the Ukraine. Any individual or Club wishing to support this cause, please follow these instructions.

- Before you start make sure you have your Lions membership number (either Individual or Club).
- Log on to www.lionsclubs.org and select the LCIF in the top row. (Don't click on the Yellow donate icon near the search button).
- The bottom two-thirds of the screen is giving updates on 4 topics, one of which is "Kindness Matters". At the bottom of this is a blue donate now button - use this.
- The default cause is a green highlighted "Refugees and Displaced Persons" heading. (This is specifically related to the Ukraine.)
- The rest of the forms is self-explanatory so just go for it.

Now, how are we going as a District this year? Total amount received to 28 February for District 202D was \$US9,788 - 10% above the total for last year (\$US8,962) so looking good from that point of view.








If are thinking of setting up a charitable trust to comply with recent changes in charities legislation, you are not alone. Many clubs are doing the same and we can help you with the process.

There are several parties that you will need to deal with along the way:

- Your club
- The charities commission
- Incorporated Societies
- Inland Revenue
- Your club's bank

We have developed a straightforward summary which details the steps you need to take when dealing with each of these parties. This is based on the experience of our club, which did this last year. Please contact me and I can send this to you.

There are 2 documents that you will need to use:

- 1. Charitable Trust Deed template
- 2. Standard Lions Club Constitution (latest version)

These are both templates that are simple to fill out. They have been approved by Lions, the Charities Commission, Incorporated Societies and Inland Revenue. Using these documents will streamline the process and ensure that we all operate by the same rules and stand together. I can send these to you as well.

So please don't be afraid or confused by the process. I am happy to come and talk to your board or club about it if needed. We are here to help!!





As the international association of Lions Club clocks 100 years of existence, District 404B-2, region 5 has joined in the celebration by carrying out charity projects in the district.

With six clubs under the region including Ikeja New Era Club, Ikeja Unique Lions Club, Ikeja Platinum Lions Club, Ilupeju Achievers Lions Club, Lions Club of Maryland and Lagos Pelican Lions Club, the district governor was invited to witness the milestone event.

The District Governor Taiwo Adewunmi, who harped on the importance of collaborating just as these clubs have done, he said that there is greater impact when projects are carried out in unison and the effect is better felt. "Instead of one club feeding few people with N5,000, 10 clubs can donate same amount together and impact a huge number."

Even with the economic recession, which has also affected the activities of clubs, he noted that it is a ripple effect from what the society is experiencing. "In the beginning of the year, we planned to have 100 cataract surgeries at 50, 000 each which amounts to five million, but we ended up having only 60 surgeries because we were able to raise only three million. We also wanted to feed about 10, 000 people around the district but we were able to feed only 3000; these are the effects of the recession.


Members are no longer meeting up with their dues, some states whose majority are civil servants have not been paid salaries in months, while those we run to who own their businesses are affected. But then, our charity projects must go on."

On the activities of the region, Chairperson Region 5, Adewale Afolabi, said that the region and clubs activities revolved around the four centennial service challenges of youth empowerment (donation of sewing machines to young entrepreneurs); eye screening and donation of glasses to students and teachers of Lagos African Church School, Ifako-Agege; distribution of food stuffs; tree planting to protect the environment and the provision on a traffic warden shelter at Allen Avenue roundabout, Ikeja.

President, Ikeja Unique Lions Club, Juliet Kojo said that their legacy project was borne out of the need to put up something visible in the community rather the usual feeding the hungry. Since most of the booths at Allen Avenue are old, we decided to build a new and bigger one to accommodate the traffic wardens considering the nature of their job. "They do a lot of work, when we cluster the roads, they are there to clear them and so we have chosen this to honour them."
