We have borrowed the name from District L, who have been running a pilot of this program for the past year. We believe the name will sit much better with our members than the "Global Membership Approach" name it replaces. We will also be introducing to you "Tupu the Tui" as our mascot for this program but more about that later.

We have now held 2 meetings with members from a good selection of clubs. The meeting in Feilding on the 7th of May was attended by 41 members with representation from 15 of the 18 clubs in Zones 1-3. The meeting in Ngaere was postponed until the 28th of May as I had Covid. We had 23 members attend this meeting representing 10 of the 17 clubs in Zones 4-6. My thanks to all those who came and contributed so positively to the workshops.

The key issues that came out of the workshops were:

- The need for the district to take a leading role in this process, coordinating ideas and resources
- The need to promote what Lions is doing in communities
- The need to ask our members what is working and what is not
- The need to ask our communities what we can do
- Young people are more drawn to causes, rather that joining a club
- Orientation is a recurring theme. It is a 3 year process that should involve the sponsor and the whole club and be managed thoughtfully.
- Leadership can occur in many ways but we need to support those that show an interest
- Branch clubs could play a key role in getting younger groups to join us.

We have collated all the ideas and are now in the process of pulling these together into a coordinated plan for the district. The plans will shortly be circulated to the members who participated in the workshops for feedback. A coordinated plan for Project Vital will then be presented at the Presidents Dinner in late July and then via Zones to Clubs.

Thank you to all those participating in this program. Your enthusiasm with fresh ideas will see us move forward with some exciting initiatives.

Hi everyone, welcome to the new year of Lions, it is going to be another good year with excellent Leadership for 202D and a strong Cabinet team. We have Tobi coming up the ranks, we need to get a 2nd and 3rd VDG now to keep building our Lions Leadership strength.

In my new role as Kan Tabs and Heads up for Kids, I have a lot of learning to do, so bear with.

A reminder that the Kaponga club sort and sell the aluminium for Kan Tabs with the money going to Kidney Kids Support Group. This Group was founded in 1990, it is a not for profit parent driven organisation that assists parents of children who have kidney disorders. Kidney Kids provides regular newsletters, information and resources regarding kidney disorders, and organises annual camps for children who may not be able to attend ordinary school camps because of their medical needs Clubs down South have a collection point in Palmerston North, or just give them to a Cabinet member to bring to the meeting and give to myself or Leo Danz.

Heads up for Kids was launched in 2010 by the Lions Clubs of New Zealand, Heads up for Kids is a unique collection which asks New Zealanders to dig out and donate old decimal and pre-decimal currency, and all foreign money. The obsolete cash is then redeemed for NZ dollars and used to fund education programmes for NZ youth. Collection points are Resene Stores and I-Sites nationwide, New World Stores in the Lower North Island. Fastaway Couriers takes (no cost to the club) the currency to the Head Office counting house. The Lions Clubs New Zealand Child Mobility Foundation: David Hart, a trained medical engineer working in the United Kingdom, developed the Hart Walker in the 1980's. It has the potential to help thousands of children with a disability to walk. David's motto is "May every child walk with pride, for it is their right" Although the Hart Walker looks simple, it has up to 1000 working components. It combines a bracing system used to promote proper body alignment with a walking base. Elastic cords are added to achieve an alternating walking pattern and can be adjusted to address unbalanced muscle abilities. The Hart Walker can be adjusted to grow with the child and the four wheel base can be changed to a two wheel base to no base at all as balance and function improve.

We are supporting a child in our North of the 202D District, I am yet to hear of any other children with a Hart Walker or in need of this support.

We also collect old glasses, not bifocals, or scratched lens and you can keep the glasses case, decorate it however you like and sell them as jewellery or medication cases, just saying!

Keep up the good work of all this collecting as it makes a huge difference in different ways for so many different people.






