



This has been the "season" of Club Changeover ceremonies, with Club Officers and Board members being installed for the new Lions year. I have been fortunate to be a guest at several Changeover Meetings, and have been privileged to conduct the Installation Ceremonies for the Havelock, Blenheim and Glenmark clubs.



Lions Clubs across the country are encouraged to host family friendly walks and community events to promote a healthy lifestyle and raise awareness of diabetes in New Zealand.


It doesn't matter how far you walk or run, it's about being involved, getting active and moving together.

Heads Up For Kids
Lions Clubs New Zealand Heads Up for Kids project provides a helping hand for young people to engage in an experience or activity that will enable them to live their dream, establish life goals and reach their full potential within their chosen field. Donate old & foreign money to help our Kids. Launched in July 2010, Heads Up for Kids is a unique collection which asks New Zealanders to dig out and donate old decimal and pre-decimal New Zealand currency, and all foreign money. The obsolete cash is then redeemed for New Zealand dollars and used to fund education programmes for young New Zealanders who would otherwise not get the opportunity. Because the obsolete currency is no longer legal tender, and foreign coins cannot be exchanged in this country, the project is not in competition with other fundraising dollars. Many young people have already benefited from Heads Up for Kids, receiving scholarships to

organisations such as Spirit of Adventure and Hillary Outdoor Pursuits Centres.

The Reserve Bank of New Zealand estimates \$80 million in old decimal and pre-decimal NZ coins and \$20 million in old banknotes are unaccounted for. There are plenty more coins still out there and Lions Clubs of New Zealand are hoping to collect \$1 million. **DROP OFF POINT FOR COINS.** If you have any old coins or foreign currency that you would like to donate, please take them to your nearest: Resene Colourshop. From here old money and foreign currency is couriered to the counting parlour by our kind sponsor Aramex.

APPLICATIONS Only through a Lions Club. Funding assistance is available for activities undertaken within New Zealand and does not cover travel or accommodation costs. The Trustees meet to consider applications on the third Wednesday of the month - September, December, March and June. Thank You all so much for the effort you put into not only bringing in new members into Lions but also retaining those members we already had as the number of drops we had over the year was also significantly down on previous years.


As Henry Ford once said "If You Always Do What You've Always Done, You'll Always Get What You've

There is a Lions Training workshop called Pathways to Leadership that I recommend anyone to attend including Leos. Taking in the title, what does it mean? Is it a Pathway to

become a Leader in Lions? In a way yes but it also stands every one in good stead for the "outside" world. Having said that, the title is captivating especially in the Leos world since the acronym LEOS means Leadership, Experience, Opportunity and Service. This is all part of the Leo Club Programme

but wait there's more: Did you know that Leos is just the start of becoming a Lion?

Leos can start at any age but will only be recognised by LCI as Leos from age 12. So the first steps are very important in teaching them the Leo Club Programme starting with the 5 c's – competence, confidence, connection, character, caring/compassion.

Once they turn 18 these younger Alpha Leos can join an Omega Leo Club to continue their journey until age 30. This is the age that they can become Leo Lions joining their own Leo Lion Club until age 35 when they transition out to become young Lions until age 40.

In New Zealand it is noticeable that there are too few Omega Leo Clubs and expectations of the sponsoring Lions club of Leos to "join" their club once Alpha Leos leave school is rather daunting on the Leo involved unless they have been brought up to be encouraged to become a Lion, being involved from day one in that Lions Club. In that case they are Leo Lions if they have been a Leo for one year and one day. Subject to the Lions Club approval they get subsidised subs until age 35.

Leos having served the required time as a Leo can be a Leo Lion at any time up to age 35.

With Programme Vital the expectations is for all Lions Clubs to increase membership in all Districts including new Lions Clubs. The same can be said of Leo Clubs.

<u>Kaikoura Lions Club Shield</u> awarded to the Club that undertakes the best environment project in a school in the school year.



HART WALKER fitting

"Challenging Disability, Raising Expectations, Pushing Boundaries."









Sophia (above), with her dad. She communicates through her lovely smiles and by sometimes blowing raspberries (don't we all want to do that sometimes). She is 22. A Hart walker must be adjusted regularly to fit them properly so they don't cause pain or sores from use. Sophia has been lifted by her parents into the support frame, which allows her to walk around, although this still requires quite a bit of effort for the children. Miro (middle), has quite good coordination, readily catching the ball and throwing it back. He absolutely had great fun doing this. He can talk quite well and was looking forward to going to his "granddads" after the fitting. Our club (Rolleston & Districts) helps and supports the provision and fitting of Hart Walkers for physically challenged children. The Hart Walker is a customised orthotic walking frame which encourages a normal gait pattern, with bracing around the chest, pelvis and the lower limbs with movable joints at the hips, knees and ankles. This helps guide each step while preventing any excessive or unnatural movements, and is attached to a wheeled frame. The walker has to be adjusted and checked, at least annually, so it continues to fit the user properly. Children who use these devices normally spend many hours of their waking life in a wheel chair, with the constant associated threat of suffering pressure sores from this. The walker allows these kids to improve their co-ordination and strength, and to have a necessary break from their wheelchairs. Lion Shirley McNichol and I attend and lend a hand at the Christchurch fitting clinics. The Clinics involve parents bringing their child along, where a specialist Physiotherapist, from Australia, does the adjustments and fitting of the bracing. There is no doubt, though, that they enjoy the experience of being on their feet with the ability to move more freely. I am glad we Lions can give financial and practical support to help these children. John Jones (abridged)
