On Sunday 10 July 2022 by 10am the weather had lifted and IP Brian Sheehan took off from the Mackenzie Rugby Club grounds on his first ever helicopter flight, accompanied by PID Ron Luxton, Fairlie Lions Norm Blakemore and Murray Bell and Pleasant Point Lion Tony Brady. They said it couldn't be done, but the project team lead by Norm, Murray and Tony, reinstated the bridge over the Opihi Gorge and forged through dense bush to reform the Opihi Gorge tramping track (a 5-hour trek for experienced trampers). This legacy project is a tribute to the courage, tenacity and ingenuity of all involved, Lions and community members. Lion Brian was flown over the Gorge to view the bridge and track, then over Lake Opuha, which was also a Lions project in the planning stages, and finally a thrilling buzz over Mount Dobson ski field, which is owned by a Fairlie Lion.




Literally a buzz from start to finish.


A reminder for Secretaries or Club Administrators to keep the monthly membership reporting up to date; once again, any issues with this let me know.

The money raised goes towards funding cochlear ear implants (government funding has been reduced).




