Passion, advocacy and service

Derek, Garth and I have been visiting clubs in the District. We have been hearing some amazing stories about the history of the clubs and of years of service. Big, big thank you for the kindness and hospitality you have extended to us.

One of the things I have spoken about is the six areas that show a club is in good shape. The first is that the club is engaging in service that is meaningful to members and that they are passionate about. Why is that important? Because passionate people keep going and get stuff done. They're interested, they care, they pass a blank piece of paper around at a tea meeting and turn that blank paper into a project. This is what IP Brian refers to as advocating for your community. Getting stuff done in your community and making it a better place to live.

There are 1,140 advocates in 202J, there are 1,140 members who know their communities like the back of their hand. Each of us will know what

our communities need, and we are the project experts in delivering that. You are already doing it. Waimate Whitehorse have reported over 200 hours service already this year. If they maintain that, it is equivalent to a full-time member of staff over the year. That is a huge bonus for Waimate; they have a community worker for free. Well done.

How does this help our clubs? When members are invested in their service they don't leave, when communities see the service, they want to be part of it and we will attract new members.

The challenge to all of us is to find passionate people and ask them how can we help. That is exactly what Dunedin Host did when they supported Grace to enter the Young Speechmaker Competition and she came away with a second place - congratulations.

Together we're changing lives.

Focus on Young Speechmaker

Interview with Grace Johnston, Year 13 Student, Columba College, Dunedin.

Finalist in Multiple District 202 Lions Young Speechmaker Competition.

Grace was sponsored by Dunedin Host and came second.

Why did you choose the subject, 'Toxic masculinity'

I chose this topic because it is so staggeringly misrepresented and misunderstood. Toxic masculinity refers to the harmful cultural norms surrounding masculinity that we are inundating our young boys with and is the primary catalyst of New Zealand's terrifyingly high rates of male suicide, violence, and substance-fuelled crime. It's not that all men are toxic, it's that many of the cultural expectations surrounding masculinity have turned out to be causing an awful amount of harm but I strongly believe that we can turn this around. As public speaker Ben Hurst says, "Boys won't be boys. Boys will be who we teach them to be."

What surprised you about the competition

Hilariously enough, I was mostly surprised by how friendly and chatty each of the competitors were! Going into the competition, I was expecting everyone to be sticking to themselves and rigorously going over their speeches but instead, the competitive element was super fun and definitely maintained a significant undertone of support and care for one other. He waka eke noa - we were all in it together.

What will you take away from the competition

Every single one of the competitors spoke with immense amounts of passion and drive which I am so grateful to have witnessed. Although each of us all spoke on vastly different topics, we all knew that we were at the competition because we had the common love for public speaking. Each of the competitors sparked so many ideas for me, in terms of what kinds of elements I could add to my own speeches in the future or helped me view different lenses I could be applying to my speechwriting. The feedback we received was also immensely helpful and will help each and every one of us, in our journeys of honing our crafts.

Are you doing it again next year

Definitely! It was the opportunity of a lifetime and any opportunity for me to be able to stand-up and spread my message I will forever be eternally grateful for.

Privileged Membership

istrict Cabinet has asked me to write a short piece about a very special category of membership - **Privileged Membership**.

Lions clubs have seven membership categories available to fit a range of different circumstances. They are set out in our Constitution and By-laws.

The category that most of us belong to is **Active membership** which entitles us to all the rights and privileges of membership of a Lions club, and places obligations on us too.

Sometimes our willingness and ability to keep up with the demands of Active membership is affected by age, failing or ill-health, a diminished ability to attend meetings regularly, and take part in projects that require a reasonably high level of physical fitness. This is the very situation that **Privileged membership** is designed to address.

Unfortunately, some members feel guilty when they can no longer keep up with the pace of life and Lions, nor participate fully in the life of a Club, and think, therefore, that they should resign, or mistakenly request **Member at Large** status. This is a category intended for temporary situations such as transfer to another location, or short-term employment interruptions to attendance. It has to be reviewed by the Board every six-months.

When **Active membership** becomes a burden because of advanced age or ill-health, clubs are encouraged to offer **Privileged membership** to Lions who have provided long and good service to their club and community.

The official By-laws put it like this:

"PRIVILEGED: A member of this club who has been a Lion fifteen or more years, who, because of illness, infirmities, advanced age or other legitimate reason, as determined by the board of directors of this club, must relinquish his/her active status. A Privileged Member shall pay such dues as the local club may charge, which dues shall include district and international dues. He/she shall have the right to vote and be entitled to all other privileges of membership except the right to hold club, district or international office. This membership category shall be included in the club delegate formula calculation."

It is good to see some of our clubs recognising the availability of this category of membership and using it positively to retain the membership of valuable Lions who have, as a result of their long and dedicated experience, a wealth of knowledge and wisdom to share.

It is our privilege to have them as members, and it is their right to be offered **Privileged membership** as and when circumstances dictate.



201 V3 DG Lion Dave Culpitt from Hastings, Mornington Peninsula, was a guest at our July tea meeting and gave an insight into their District project supporting the bush fire communities - providing them with water tanks and milling the salvaged trees around their properties for timber to rebuild, the cooperation and collaboration with other community services organisations: collaboration is between Minderoo Foundation (Perth), Rotary and Lions to form a partnership to help disaster hit communities rebuild fence lines and give local landowners the materials to rebuild their farms free of charge from fire damaged trees for the East Gippsland Timber Milling Project.

Celebrations:

This year LCIF, our Foundation, and Johnson & Johnson Vision celebrated a 20-year partnership for our "Sight for Kids" school-based eye health programme. The programme enables Lions and eye professionals to provide comprehensive eye health services in low-income schools. Over the last five years the programme has been operating in Thailand, Philippines, India, China, Florida USA, Kenya and Turkey. The programme over the 20-year period has had a tremendous impact in many communities around the world with over 42 million students screened to date with 500 thousand pairs of eyeglasses provided to children in need and 600 thousand students referred for other eye treatments.

Thanks to all Lions clubs in "J" who have donated to LCIF over the years and especially for our recent Campaign 100 fundraising venture. It is your generosity that enables our Foundation to provide such humanitarian services.

Tonga:

LCIF have announced that a grant of \$US24,100 has been made to three remote island villages of Nomuka, Tungua and Fonoi in the Ha'api group in the Kingdom of Tonga. These three islands are located closest to the January volcanic eruption and were badly affected by the eruption and tsunami which resulted in much damage to homes and

buildings, including their water supplies. As the Islands are low lying, the ground water is salty and not suitable for drinking or cooking. The Tongan Ministry of Education has agreed to the installation of Lions water tanks at the local schools on each island and for community use, with each tank being fed from rainwater collected from the existing school buildings once the appropriate spoutings are fitted.

Thanks to all 202J clubs that donated to LCIF's Tongan appeal, your donation has been put towards a very much needed community asset. In total nine 5.000 litre tanks will be installed.

Ukraine:

Donations to LCIF for the Refugees and Displaced persons funds are still being accepted to help support the 9 million Ukrainian refugees. Plan now for a club donation to support these victims of the Russian conflict.

DG Jules District goal is for all clubs in 202J to donate to our Foundation this year. Let's start your new Lions year off by planning to commit to donating to our Foundation now, as your way of ensuring that Lions can continue to provide humanitarian aid worldwide as needed.


