Jimmy Carter Quiz

After 3 years, the President Jimmy Carter Quiz made a return. On the 17th of August, students from 10 secondary schools gathered at the Hart Dinning Hall (College House, Palmerston North Boys' High School) to compete for the Jimmy Carter trophy. It was a good atmosphere, with all schools stating they wanted to 'give it a go and have fun'. The quiz had a different format from previous years, with a shorter time for answering each question, and two "quick rounds" for which the teams only had a minute to an-swer 10 questions. In addition to the school teams, the team of parents and teachers ("The Invincibles") also made an appearance, as it has become a tradi-tion.

The rounds ranged from general knowledge to geog-raphy, sports and music, among other topics. At the break, PNBHS, Awatapu College and The Invincibles were all tied at first place, with 51 points each. PNGHS was following closely, with 49 points. In the second half, PNGHS staged a great comeback that saw them winning the quiz with 88 points, leaving Awatapu Collage, PNBHS and The Invincibles tied with 87 points. It was only in the last round when the team from PNGHS clinched the victory, besting the PNBHS team by one point in the Music round. A sudden-death tie-breaker ensued, in which Awatapu and PNBHS battled until PNBHS correctly answered that Queen Elizabeth II has been 70 years on the throne.

It was a great atmosphere, with close scores and lost of "ohs" and "ahs" when the answers to the ques-tions were read. At the end of the quiz, and with 1st, 2nd and 3rd places defined, President Kevin and co-convenor Gordon Batchelar proceeded with the presentation of the trophies and prizes to the schools. As usual, Bruce McKenzie Booksellers sup-ported the club with the book prizes. The night end-ed with a light supper and The Invincibles licking their wounds, having been bested by the high-schoolers this time.

The feedback received from the schools has been very positive. Our club received fantastic support from PNBHS, for which we are grateful. It was great to see 22 Lions on the night supporting this event.

New Zealand Lions Speechmakers Contest 2022 - Winner Isabella Drummond





"Years ago, anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked by a student what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a culture. The student expected Mead to talk about fishhooks or clay pots or grinding stones.

But no. Mead said that the first sign of civilization in an ancient culture was a femur (thighbone) that had been broken and then healed. Mead explained that in the animal kingdom, if you break your leg, you die. You cannot run from danger, get to the river for a drink or hunt for food. You are meat for prowling beasts. No animal survives a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal.

A broken femur that has healed is evidence that someone has taken time to stay with the one who fell, has bound up the wound, has carried the person to safety and has tended the person through recovery. Helping someone else through difficulty is where civilization starts, Mead said.

LEGAL – Our MD Legal Counsel Alan Knowsley confirms that with changes to the dorporated Societies no action is required by clubs at this stage and no re registrations can occur until October 2023. Alan Knowsley will complete the first club reregistration and after this is done provide all clubs with the updated constitution wording.

FINANCIAL

The Multiple District is expected to post a surplus again in 2022. This is a result of COVID limiting our projects and is not expected to occur in future years.

MD APPOINTMENTS – PDG Pam Fiveash has been appointed to the position of MD Youth Chair for the period to 30 June 2024. This is a new position that will initially run for two years.

MD AWARDS - Minor changes have been made to the MD award application and requirements. These changes have been made to improve understanding of the application process and to better define the criteria. The amended documents will be available on our NZ Lion website and apply for applications for the current years MD Awards.

LAP THE MAP - Districts and clubs are encouraged to support Diabetes awareness by becoming involved in the Lap the Map promotion during the month of November. Additional information will be available on our NZ Lions website.

YOUNG SPEECHMAKER – The final was held in Palmerston North on the 13th of August and was highly successful day. Thanks go to the clubs from 202D Zone 2 and Graham Robinson Zone Chair for organising this successful day. Thanks also to the MD Speechmaker Coordinator Myra Davey.

TOPEC CAMP – An enjoyable camp was held at Topec in July this year. Some attendees flew in from Australia and all that attended have said they had a great time.

LLOYD MORGAN LIONS CLUB CHARITABLE TRUST – The Trust has requested and been granted permission to distribute their newsletter through Between the Lions. Please watch out for these and support our NZ Foundation.

TRAINING – A variety of local training and zoom training is being provided by the GAT team. Club

members are encouraged to participate in this and provide suggestions of other training needs.

PUBLICITY & COMMUNICATIONS – Clubs are encouraged to have a MARCOM Chair. A variety of training will be offered to help clubs with their marketing.

LIONS CLUBS CANCER TRUST (Lions Clubs Skin Cancer Screening Service) – The business plan is almost finalised and once this is complete more information will be sent out to clubs. The Trust is publishing a regular newsletter which is distributed to clubs through their District Secretaries and in Between the Lions.

STARSHIP FUNDRAISING PROJECT – This project now has a total of \$296k banked and is still receiving funds from clubs. Grant applications have been lodged with LCIF and LMLCCT and it is hoped that this will bring the project to the target goal of \$406,700.00.

TONGAN APPEAL – Funds raised are to be used to purchase water tanks to be placed on Government School land. Any remaining funds will be used for the purchase of either medical equipment or teaching materials for Nomuka where substantial tsunami damage occurred.

ANZI - ANZI September 2023 in New Zealand is to be held in Christchurch. The Council of Governors has agreed to underwrite this Forum by up to \$9,000.00 to provide the committee with additional seed money. Our 2023 Forum will be promoted in ANZI Cairns in September. Local members are encouraged to attend the Forum when it is held in New Zealand.

MELBOURNE JUNE 2024 – The International LCI Convention will be held in Melbourne in 2024. This is a wonderful opportunity for the Lions members of MD202 to attend an International Convention closer to home. You may want to start planning for this event now.

MD CONVENTIONS – Following reflection on the MD 2022 Convention work is underway on reviewing the style and content of our conventions. Members will be consulted for their views as part of this process.

FORWARD ACTION PLAN – The Council has begun work on the strategic plan to bring it into alignment with the new LCI strategic plan and making it personalised to the districts and clubs of MD202.

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Heads Up for Kids | Sorting Instructions

It is important that coins and banknotes are sorted following these guidelines.

You will need 10 plastic bags at any given time.

Any sort of plastic bag will do, but plastic bank bags or grip lock bags are best.

Send them regularly to Resene HQ no matter the amount. Fill multiple bags if necessary.

You **do not need to count** the money, but it is **important to sort** into the following categories: **Bag One:** All NZ copper 1 & 2 cent coins can be put in the same bag together. **Bag Two:** Silver NZ 5 cent **Bag Three:** Silver NZ10 cent **Bag Four:** Silver NZ 20 cent **Bag Five:** Silver NZ50 cent. **Bag Six:** All old New Zealand Banknotes together **Bag Seven:** Current New Zealand coins and banknotes. **Bag Eight:** Old Pre decimal NZ pounds, shillings and pence (in separate bags if possible) **Bag Nine:** All foreign coins **Bag Ten:** All foreign banknotes (laid flat if possible)

When you have sorted all collected bank notes and coins, please package all bags together into a sturdy bag or box and label 'Heads Up for Kids' with your club name and contact details inside.

Do not send back in Heads Up for Kids **Collection Cans – keep these for collections**.

Take your sorted and securely packaged parcel of collected monies to your local Resene store, from there it will be couriered to Resene HQ. Alternatively if there is not a store near you send direct to Resene Paints, 32 Vogel Street, Naenae, Lower Hutt.

To reduce pressure on our kind courier sponsors Fastway, please send small amounts regularly, not huge amounts rarely.

We believe every child who has been through their own cancer journey should have the opportunity to come to Camp Quality. We're concerned that we're not hearing about all the children who are eligible to have this experience. You may know of children in your local area, and we'd love to talk to them and their whānau.

Who are we looking for?

Wellington Central Districts covers children living in the lower North Island - from Wellington, up to Taranaki and across to the Hawkes Bay. We take referrals of children living in this area who have experienced cancer and are aged 5-13 years.

Working with our medical team, we will need to ensure they are well enough to safely attend camp . But, if you're not sure, please refer them to us anyway. We have other ways that we can support them until they are able to come to Camp Quality summer camp.

What can they expect?

When a child attends camp with us, they will enjoy a 6 day summer camp in January. Our camp programmes provide a stress-free and caring environment for children where fun and friendship are combined with achievable challenges - allowing the children to "just be kids". They get a sense of normality and independence and focus on the positive aspects of their lives rather than hospitals and treatments.

They'll be paired one-on-one with a trained adult companion, who will be their buddy for the length of camp - helping them make the most of the activities on offer while having fun and keeping safe. Our nursing team takes care of their medical needs, and our programme team makes sure they have a fun time.
