Together We Can

The Methven Walkway

hree years ago, the Methven Lions Club decided to embark on a project to encircle Methven with a walking and cycling track. It had been started in the '70s but never really got a head of steam. The small part that had been done was badly overgrown, unloved, and disappearing. We formed a separate committee to raise the necessary funds and to construct the thing, and when completed, it will be around 12.5kms long. Our dream was to create something that could be enjoyed by people of all ages and capabilities to enhance both their physical and mental wellbeing.

We thought that getting kids out from behind their screens would be beneficial too. We also liked the idea of it becoming a strong enough attraction to draw more visitors into Methven. Oh - and it needed to be all-weather.

Fundraising has been intensive and time-consuming but conducted in an environment where wellbeing is to the fore, and we raised money from local and district councils for asset creation, community benefit and increasing biodiversity.

Lions have done the work, spear-headed by the indefatigable Ron Smith. There's something like a thousand tonnes of shingle gone down. We've built a boardwalk over a wetland. We've built four bridges, four cattle grids, erected several kilometres of wooden and wire fences and planted around 3,000 native shrubs, trees and tussocks.





The project was divided into three sections. Two have been pretty much completed and the third is usable, albeit not yet to the standard we would like. Next year!

We have received countless letters and emails thanking us for creating a community asset that will serve Methven well into the future. It was a large part of Methven Lions' entry into this year's Ashburton District Council's ANZ Business Awards, where we won the "not for profit" category against some pretty stiff competition. It has just been announced as an award winner in the "For Communities" section of the Golden Foot awards.



So, all up, we think we must be doing something right!

We were lucky enough to receive a visit from Lions International President Brian Sheehan and his wife Lori earlier in the year. We asked him to perform an official opening ceremony, cutting a ribbon and unveiling a plaque. He did so with great aplomb and walked part of it accompanied by Lions and an enthusiastic crowd from the local community.



Not only has the Walkway been a big part of the internal glue that has held our Lions Club together through some pretty tough Covid-related years, but it has also struck a real chord with the Methven Community.

We love doing it and we're very proud of it.

Used Hearing Aids & Batteries Collection

- Hearing Aid batteries are now going through to Lion Andy Andrews in Cromwell (see Used Spectacles for details); Andy has someone in his area who is coordinating this. He has arranged for a transport company to collect them in Dunedin so again, if they come to PDG Ella she can arrange for them to get to Cromwell.
 - The money raised goes towards funding cochlear ear implants (government funding has been reduced).
- Used Hearing Aids: drop them off at any Bay Audiology Clinic. They have the "Free to Ear - Samoa Programme" where they provide free hearing health care to the Apia community using donated used hearing aids.

"WE SERVE". In our last Lions year Lions served 495 million people through 1.4 million global service activities, exceeding our Campaign 100 goal of serving 200 million people each year. This figure would have been even greater if all clubs were reporting service activities on MyLCI.

October heralds "Vision Awareness Month" which incorporates World Sight Day on 13th October. Since Helen Keller addressed the Lions at the International Convention in Ohio in 1925, and asked Lions to become "Knights of the Blind" in a crusade against darkness, Lions have become world leaders in an effort to prevent avoidable blindness. LCIF proudly serves by offering unique and impactful initiatives through programmes and grants. This year between 1st July and 30th August alone, 20 such grants were awarded totaling \$US2.298 million.

Over the years our SightFirst programmes have played a key role in reducing global blindness through building comprehensive eye care systems, training eye care professions and raising awareness in underserved communities.

Here in NZ one in 20 aged 50 plus have moderate to severe vision impairment while 25% of New Zealanders with diabetes are affected by diabetic retinopathy.

As with any of our recognised eight areas of focus, our Foundation is reliant on all clubs committing to make an annual donation so we can provide much needed service to those less fortunate in the world.

Global Membership Approach

Growing Club Membership Through Community Partnerships and Service

ur District Membership Goal is to achieve a net increase of at least 10 members in the 2022-23 Lions year. This requires that we both recruit new members and, apart from deaths, retain as many existing members as we can. We can also help other clubs and Districts, by seeking transfers for members leaving our locality or District.

Our District Global Membership Approach (GMA) project is now transitioning to action at club and zone levels. Project Possible focuses on Improving the capability of clubs and members and community relevance and visibility of club events and projects through working with local partners. This covers all the Global Action Team (GAT) areas of Leadership (both training and participation), Membership (both recruitment and retention) and Service (both projects and donations) – all leaders and members at all levels. Several clubs are already involved in progressing this within their own localities. Resources and support are available to all clubs, ideally co-ordinated within zones, and through District Forum and other training to be rolled out.

Capable and enthusiastic clubs attract and enthuse members, and attract community acceptance and support of their club events and projects. Our District has the highest level of clubs reporting service on MyLion within Multiple District 202 so far this year. Let us see if we can achieve the same in membership growth.

- In an email of up to 500 words describe how the club communicates with its members and promotes itself to the public.
- 3. Submit two copies (different months) of its electronically distributed club bulletin.
- 4. Club's website submit screen shots of up to 3 pages from the club's website.
- 5. Social Media submit screen shots of up to 3 pages from the club's social media page.
- 6. Submit evidence to demonstrate how the club has used other forms of advertising or media e.g. teardrop flags, posters, newspaper articles.

CRITERIA

- 1. Entry description = 30 points
- Club bulletins = 25 points (layout including masthead, appearance, illustrations, originality) (content - including editorial, reports, completed projects, future projects, Club, District and International news, coming events, humour)
- 3. Club website = 15 points
- 4. Club Social Media page = 15 points
- 5. Other forms of communication or publicity = 15 points

If the expanded criteria are not submitted to Judy & Beryl then 202J cannot judge the Clarkson Trophy or submit a 202J entry for the Ron Rowe Award - which wouldn't reflect well on 202J
