For those clubs that have new members join, thank you so much, from a personal level I really appreciate the effort that has gone in with 20 new members this year.


Our district membership sits at 1188 Lions and 68 Leos it is great to see going in the right direction.

Featured in last month's District Bulletin was a note

from the IP Int'l President Douglas K Alexander-that globally we had surpassed our goal of raising USD300m by reaching a staggering total of USD325m. A total we all should be very proud about. Even in 202e with our donations of \$24,260 we continue to donate with distinction. This amount was contributed to by 75% of our clubs.

As many of you are aware, there continues to be disasters around the world, from cyclones, floodings or earthquakes to name a few, and of course none more evident than to countries in western Europe who through their respective Lions Clubs are supporting the thousands of refugees fleeing Ukraine. LCIF donations can be made to specific disasters i.e. Tongan Relief Appeal, or for Displaced Persons, such as for Ukrainian victims, or for vision. These being just 2 of our 8 Global causes of LCI.

DID YOU KNOW:

- * when you donate to LCIF 100% of your donation directly supports LCIF's Global causes.
- * there are 2.2 billion people who have a vision impairment or blindness.
- * 1 in 11 people in the world have diabetes
- * annually, LCIF approves 148 to 160 emergency grants
- * for Covid-19, LCIF made 353 grants totalling USD5.3M for emergency needs which included PPE gear, Medicine, food and other essential requirements
- TO RECOGNISE YOUR CLUB'S CONTRIBUTION, or personal donation, a Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) can be awarded to a Lion or someone in your community who has given outstanding service. These Fellowships are actioned upon the recommendation of the club. S hould you wish to proceed and nominate someone, please note that with present delays of varying types, it could take up to 3 months following an application to receiving the official plaque.

All donation to LCIF give Clubs credits towards MJF's which cost USD1000.

There are several clubs in our District who have donated sizeable funds to LCIF and have yet to nominate a person (Lion or non Lion), to whom a Fellowship could be awarded.

Each member reports their individual total exercise time to the club GST or project coordinator.

Project coordinator converts the total club hours and minutes to total kilometers.

Minutes are then converted to distance at a conservative rate of 30 minutes = 2 kms.

B. CLUB ONLY ACTIVITY

- 2. Organise a club walk or run or cycle. Coordinator to total the distance travelled. Distance of walk/run/cycle multiplied by number of participants
- C. CLUB HOSTS AN EVENT OPEN TO THE PUBLIC could be gold coin entry with funds to local diabetes group.
- 3. Organise a walk which is open to the public.
- 4. Organise a trikeathon for a local preschool or bikeathon for a local primary school, or skateathon at local skating facility
- 5. Organise a run for the public in collaboration with the local harrier club or an athletics club
- 6. Organise a relay style walkathon around a local sports ground/park or stadium (similar to Relay for Life.
- 7. Involve the local diabetes support group, or diabetes educators or green prescription facilitator.

Cycling 2400 km for war torn Families in Ukraine from Tbilisi Georgia to Istanbul Turkey

Hi, My name is Grant McIntosh. I am a dairy farmer in Culverden and a member of the Amuri Lions Club. I am cycling to raise funds for Ukrainian families whose homes and lives have been torn apart by the war. The cycle route is Tbilisi Georgia to Istanbul Turkey starting on the 20th of August 2022 and covers 2400km in 23 cycling days.



"Our brief was to remove approximately 18 cu m of sand from the sandpit at Redwoodtown School, in Blenheim.

Replacement sand is to be 'imported' from Golden Bay, thus enabling the children to create sand structures ie castles from the stickier based sand. Unfortunately due to the high sides on the sand pit and a low roof, getting a digger in was not an easy answer. So MBC Leos were tasked with removing the contents by shovel and bucket to wheelbarrows on the outside of the structure. After 4.5 hours we achieved our target with 5 Leos and 4 adults aided by the school Principal kept everyone well fed with plenty of BBQ food.

Hopefully, we'll be promoting the 'Lap The Map' project to the school, whilst the Principal has

LESSONS FROM GEESE (it is an old one but very true)

It is Amazing what we can learn from animals.

As each goose flaps its wings it creates uplift for the bird that follows. By flying in a 'V' formation the whole flock adds 71% EXTRA flying range.

When a goose falls out of formation it suddenly feels the DRAG and RESISTANCE of flying alone. It quickly moves back to take ADVANTAGE of the flying POWER of the birds in front.

When the lead goose tires, it drops back into formation and another goose flies to the point position

The geese flying in formation HONK to encourage those up front to keep up with their speed.

When a goose gets sick, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to HELP and PROTECT it. Lesson from the geese


Dear Lion.

Come along and help The Lions Club of Wigram celebrate their 50th year.



Honouring Stuart Erskine McLean MStJ a Charter Member of Amuri Lions

The first project that he was involved with was organising a scrap metal drive, and instrumental in organising a fête to raise money for a "Jaws of Life" for the Fire Service, raising \$8 000. and only the second to be put into service in NZ. He was one of the first in a long tradition in Amuri Lions to raise cattle for charitable funds, a stalwart member of the Lions crew manning the Amuri A&P Show bar, and he has been part of this roster every year for 50 years. Stuart organised a first for Amuri Lions, go-cart racing in Waipara, and another a raft race on the Waiau River from Twin Bridges to the Waiau Bridge. The list of projects that Stuart has taken part in his 50 years in the Club is huge. He has organised and taken part in many four wheel drives, manning a barbecue for a huge cross-country drive across the Molesworth hosted by Hickey the TV One weatherman and helped organise 4x4 drives and mud plugs. During his term as President he was instrumental in organising the horse ride from Bluff to Rotherham.



Stuart organised a ploughing match with the final in Rotherham, ran a week long speech contest at Culverden School, set up bus tours for the elderly and attended the Camp Quality children's cancer respite week for a number of years. This year he celebrated 50 years of Lions Service. Stuart is a Melvin Jones Fellow. Stuart has held a long and distinguished service in our Community as both a member and Chairman of the Amuri St John Area Committee. His service to St John was recognised by his award of a Member of the Order of St John.





Retention of members in your Club

If your Club is losing members, there are logical reasons, but part of the problem is that you will never know what these are, so you should have an ongoing, overall strategy that is always working for your Club. Consider these guidelines -

- * Prevent members from thinking their evening was "wasted" by making it interesting to as many members as possible.
- * Insist that Club funds are put to work. Members want to see results for their efforts.
- * Publicise your projects and contributions. The community needs to know what you, as Lions, have accomplished.
- * Put all your members to work. Look for that "quiet" member there will be something they can do.
- * Make your new member induction ceremony full of zest and the spirit of Lionism so that your new Lion is in no doubt that this is a very important step in their life. Involve older, experienced members.
- * Ensure sponsors continue to look after the wellbeing of the member they have sponsored, especially for the first few years.
- * Do a Club Survey to gauge individuals feedback is your Club fulfilling your members expectations.
- * Remember that most members drop out because they are underworked and not involved, and liable to feel they are not valued. Club leaders need to recognise and acknowledge the talents and contributions of ALL members.

Six steps to a strong Lions or Leo Club -

- 1. A major service activity
- 2. A major fund raising project
- 3. Strong public relations
- 4. A good understanding of LCI
- 5. Well organised, enjoyable meetings, with a strong sense of fellowship.
- **6.** A strong Membership Development and Retention programme.
