

# Lady Thorn Rhododendron Dell

ince 1998 the Port Chalmers & District Lions Club has been developing and maintaining what has become the Club's signature project the Lady Thorn Rhododendron Dell. The Dell is situated in what was the old disused Port Chalmers quarry, well known for its breccia rock used in the construction of many of the heritage buildings in Port Chalmers & Dunedin city.

Thousands of Lions man hours have been spent in creating what is now a community asset and a local attraction to visitors especially from visiting cruise ships that call at the Port.

In 2004 a lookout offering panoramic views of the Otago Harbour was erected with a display of historical photos dating back to the 1800's.

The Dell is part of the Dunedin Open Gardens group which runs for three weeks in October and includes Larnach Castle, Ovelston and other notable gardens; the Port Lions hold their annual garden fete at Labour weekend to coincide with this. The Fete features a variety of stalls and live music, Lions running their BBQ for lunch, and people can view the rhododendrons in full flower.

The Dell has been a recipient of several awards including a Keep Dunedin Beautiful Award. It has also had a visit from two Past International Presidents, Lion Al Brandel and Lion Bob Corlew, who have both planted a rhododendron to commemorate their visit.

Mid December heralds the sound of Christmas Carols in the Dell to the strains of the music of the Dunedin City Salvation Army band and a choir adding to the diverse service that Lions provide in the local community.

### **Pleasant Point Lions Club Helps Fight Predators**

Pleasant Point and Fairlie residents wanting to help protect New Zealand's wildlife will soon be able to borrow from a Irap "library" being set up in both towns

towns. The initiative is being supported by the Department of Conservation, the Pleasant Point Lions Club and Opuha Water Ltd (Owl)

Lons Club and Opuna Water Ld (Owl). Doc regional predator-free ranger for Canterbury Tim Exton said one of the major obstacles to achieving Now Zealand's goal of becoming introduced predator-free by 2050 is that no matter how much predator control is done in natural arcas, the risk of reinvasion by pests from urban areas remained high. "Rats, possums, stoats, feral cats and hedgehogs kill millions

of our native birds, lizards, insects and other invertebrates every year. "By making it easier and less expensive for people in urban areas to trap pests, we can reduce predator pressure on our native species, with the added bonus of bringing

native bird song back to our gardens and

gardens and parks." Mr Exton said Doc was also protecting a population of native long-tailed bat (classified as "vulnerable and decreasing") on the Opihi River/Te Ngawai River/Kakahu reserve and over into Geraldine. Urban pest control would complement this programme. Opuha Water Ltd is providing funding for the materials the Pleasant Point Lions Club

volunteers will use to make the familiar wooden box DOC200 traps (effective for rats and stoats) and rat tunnels with Victor rat traps. Pleasant Point Lions Club member Neville Burt, who will act as administrator of the

The traps are easy to use and meet humane standards.

Pleasant Point trap library, said people would be able to borrow traps for a small fee for up to two months to help control introduced predators on their properties. "The traps are easy to use and meet humane standards. "We are encouraging people who borrow traps to report their catches because it adds to Doc's

information about the extent of introduced pests and will help assess the success of the libraries by comparing trap catches in the early days of their operation against those in later

In addition to the DOC200s

In addition to the DOC200s and rait tunnels, people could also borrow "Flipping Timmys" to control possums, and live-capture cage traps for feral cats. Mr Exton said the aim was to deal with the urban predator and that meant treating family cats with respect, while dealing with feral cats. Opuha Water environmental manager-Julia Crossman said supporting the trap libraries was a natural extension of the work Owl was doing throughout its scheme in the Opuha/Opihi

catchment. "We are very aware of the fact that it is a privilege and responsibility for us to operate in this environment.

responsibility for us to operate in this environment. "Supporting the removal of introduced predators so we can see our natural biodiversity Introduced preducts so we can see our natural biodiversity expand and thrive, complements Owl's long-term goal of creating a biodiverse corridor from the mountains to the sea." It is hoped the library in Pleasant Point will be ready to launch at the Pleasant Point Farmers Market on Sunday. A date has not been set yet for the opening of the Fairlie trap library, but it should be ready this month. The Fairlie trap library is being supported by Mackenzie Community Development. The Pleasant Point Lions Club yolunteers will make traps for

volunteers will make traps for both libraries.



# **Used Hearing Aids & Batteries Collection**

- Hearing Aid batteries are now going through to Lion Andy Andrews in Cromwell (see Used Spectacles for details); Andy has someone in his area who is coordinating this. He has arranged for a transport company to collect them in Dunedin so again, if they come to PDG Ella she can arrange for them to get to Cromwell.



So 202J can qualify to submit an entry for the broadened Ron Rowe Award, the Clarkson Trophy, with the agreement of PDG Terry Clarkson, has been broadened to align with the new Ron Rowe criteria.

Clubs, you have a very, very important role in providing the Clarkson Trophy entries.

Please prepare & gather:

- the up to 500 word description
- screen shots of your club website & social media pages
- evidence of other forms of advertising or media.

Send these, as well as your club bulletins, to Media Manager Judy Phillips & J-Times Editor Beryl Naismith well before 30 November 2022.

Both the Ron Rowe Award & the Clarkson Trophy are judged on the immediately preceding Lions year (PDG Christine Stewart's year) 2021/2022 so gather the screen shots & other evidence from that year (and start gathering the same from this current Lions year so it's ready to go next year).


