Aim High

Last year 60% of clubs in the District reported their service activities on MyLion. Whilst 100% reporting would be ideal, I set the 202E District goal for the 2022-23 Lions fiscal year at 75% of clubs reporting their service activities. I was therefore extremely disappointed to go into Insights today and see that only 45% of clubs in the District have reported their service activities on MyLion so far this fiscal year. Why is this? Are clubs ashamed of what they do? No! On my visits to clubs around the District, all clubs I see are proud of the projects they do and donations they make, and rightly so.

Don't hide your lights under a bushel. Shout about your successes. Put them in your local paper, put them on Facebook, but most of all enter them on MyLion. Why is it important? Because Lions International is the only service organisation with a seat on the United Nations, and every year it reports to the UN the number of volunteers involved, the number of volunteer hours worked and the amount of money raised and donated around the world. And then Bill Gates donates dollar for dollar the same amount to us. That is why it is important to report on MyLion.

Some clubs say "We are autonomous and don't have to disclose what we raise or donate". That is absolute rubbish. Whilst clubs are autonomous to the extent that they are free to decide how they operate, and what projects they do or don't do, all Lions clubs are affiliated to Lions International and this allows them to call themselves a Lions Club and to use the Lions logo. However, by being affiliated they have obligations, and one of those is the requirement to report service activities on MyLion.

So, if you are the club secretary or administrator, to enter a service activity simply log onto MyLCI, go to MyLion, click on "Report Past Activity", click on the red "Report+" button, and then fill in the appropriate boxes. Don't forget to then click on the orange "Report" button before clicking on "OK". It really is that simple. So lets get club reporting up to 100%. Anything over the District goal of 75% would really make my day. TOGETHER WE CAN!



November is Diabetes Awareness Month

Diabetes New Zealand tell us New Zealand has a serious and growing type 2 diabetes problem.

It is predicted that within the next 20 years, the number of people with type 2 diabetes will increase by 70-90%. Of these people Māori, Pacific and Asian will be worst affected. Allowing this to occur will have a hugely detrimental impact on the wellbeing of our people, but also on the sustainability of our health system and economy.

At a population level, it is essential to create an environment which is conducive to healthy food and activity choices in order to reduce the high rates of obesity, the major preventative risk factor for type 2 diabetes. At a community level, there is a need to support our communities to make positive change. At an individual level, diabetes affects almost every aspect of a person's life, including their physical health, mental health, social life and employment. Diabetes is the tip of the iceberg as the cause of significant health issues with downstream comorbidities – cardiovascular disease, stroke, kidney failure, vision loss neuropathies and lower limb amputation. In New Zealand, 17% of all health loss across the population is the result of diabetes. Diabetes is a life-long condition that needs regular monitoring. Type 1 diabetes is treated by multiple daily insulin injections or an insulin pump. When you are first diagnosed you will be shown how to do these injections yourself at home. You will need to continue to do these injections yourself to maintain your health. This can seem very overwhelming at first but you will receive support from your healthcare team.

Type 2 diabetes is usually treated with key lifestyle changes, including changing your diet, increasing the amount of exercise you do and trying to lose weight. Most people with type 2 diabetes will also be offered medication. This is usually in the form of tablets to start with, although insulin injections may also be needed eventually.

Diabetes can affect your kidneys in two main ways:

1. Kidney disease (diabetic nephropathy). High glucose levels cause extra blood to flow through the tiny filters in your kidneys, so they have to work harder than normal to clean it. Over time this can damage the filters, causing them to leak.

2. Disease of the kidney's blood vessels (renovascular disease). High blood pressure causes a 'furring up' of the artery to the kidney, reducing the blood supply and causing scarring. Kidney damage occurs slowly over many years. It can be identified in its early stages by very small amounts of protein in the urine. This protein has leaked from the kidneys as a result of the damage to the filters. It is therefore important that people with diabetes are screened regularly for kidney disease in order to find and treat any problems early, before more serious damage can occur. Both diabetes and kidney disease can cause high blood pressure which increases the risk of heart attacks and strokes. Foot and eye problems are also common with people with diabetes and kidney disease, but these can be preventable. Regular checks with your GP and optician are therefore important to try to stop any problems from developing or to spot them early on when they can

be easier to treat. Bernie



Even at this early stage, registrations have started to come in.



As I sat and watched the burial of our late Queen Elizabeth 11, I realised like so many others that we had just witnessed the end of an era. For most of our lives she had ruled UK and the Commonwealth from afar.

From all accounts she was strong, steadfast and made her decisions wisely yet with a strong sense of humour a wit that amazed many. Her call to duty was unequalled and for 72 years from the day she became Queen to the day she died she put service first. I can remember as a 9 year old her first visit to New Zealand in 1953/54.

She left Christchurch by train stopping at all the towns on her way south. Staying the night in Dunedin her first stop the next morning was at Milton where by car she did a circle of the town ending at the Coronation Hall where a Dias had been erected in front. We all lined the route (Me in my Brownie uniform) waving flags and feeling the wonder that a Queen from the other side of the world was visiting us. I was trying to explain to my 15 year old granddaughter what it meant to us, a little country so isolated and far away from the seat of power. In those days as no Television, Tablets or Mobile phones we had to rely on Radio or Newspapers for our news which was often 2-3 days old when received. She just looked at me with pity and said "What ever" how did you manage to exist. This generation is are not interested in Royalty and what they stand for and it makes me wonder how much longer they will pay a part in our lives. In Australia there are many people wanting the country to become a

Republic and if this happens how long will it take us to follow suit. But for now Queen Elizabeth as you take Paddington's hand and walk into the sunset to be reunited with Prince Phillip your work is done and we will all remember you as a strong woman of courage, determination and wisdom that the world will sorely miss.

The Elizabethan era ends but in time to come I am sure you will be remembered as "Elizabeth the Great".

Also the Queens Corgi's Muick, Sandi, Lizzie and Candy will now go to the Countryside to retire and Beth and Primrose the Jack Russell's of King Charles 111 and Camilla will rule the corridors of Buckingham Palace.
