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It's time to get your club the recognition it deserves!

Now is the time to get your club entries together for the District Awards. These are due no later than **31 January 2023**.

Waverley Award: to encourage participation in **Community Service Projects** Particulars of the Project being presented by each Club should be contained in a written summary in the form of not more than one A4 sheet of paper – (both sides if wished.) - this may be accompanied by a scrapbook / folder of similar size which contains newspaper cuttings, letters of congratulations, references, reports, circulars and any such data to enlighten or impress the judges on the various phases of the project.

The dates and duration of the entire project must be clearly shown.

Environmental Award: (1 entry per club only)

Your entry should consider and will be judged on:

- How it promotes the care of and / or responsible use of our environment
- Club member involvement
- Community or other club endorsement and / or involvement
- Project has impact for your community and has ongoing possibilities.

<u>Youth Award:</u> The Project which wins the 202D Youth Award is forwarded to Multiple District for judging, along with the winning entries from the other districts in Multiple District 202. Please note, for the purpose of this award, youth are defined as young people up to age of 19.

Your entry must be presented in the form of an email (may be an attachment) or posted.

- Up to 500 words describing a club's youth project, including number of youth involved, benefits to the participants and community (eg. leadership, confidence....), percentage of club members involves.
- Entry can be supported by additional information such as press / publicity information, reports or photos.

<u>District Bulletin Award</u> – automatic entry but a copy must be shared to our publicity and Contact Editor Tobi Hipp

<u>Administration Award –</u> ensure you report membership every month (even if no change) and your club's service project via MyLion.

<u>Website –</u> automatic entry for those clubs with websites and good use of social media platforms.

There are many great things happening in District 202D. Let's get your club the recognition it deserves!

Feilding Host Lions Club Mini Golf Course 40th Anniversary

Feilding Host Lions are about to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the opening of their very popular Mini Golf Course.



This innovative community focussed Community Facility has been enjoyed by hundreds of young and not so young since it opened 20th November 1982 with thousands of dollars in revenue raised being donated to local causes, voluntary groups and organizations across a wide spectrum of ages including Girl Guides, Scouts, Air Cadets, ICONZ, "Bumps to Babies", Arohanui Hospice, and Manchester House Social Services Senior Hub.



Club Publicity Officer Laurie Dalton said the project arose out of the club's desire to provide further recreational facilities in Feilding, adding value to the work the Club had actively been involved with around the Makino Pool Playground Facilities.

As part of its research, a mini golf committee formed in 1980, visited mini golf courses throughout the north island with the final plan for an 18 hole putting course, aesthetically pleasing, interesting and challenging for golfers of all ages and abilities, being endorsed by the club and the then Feilding Borough Council.

Construction of the course commenced in October 1981.

It saw club members put in approximately 12,000 hours of voluntary work. The support for the project was overwhelming with donations from trades and the business community, local council and power board. The assistance received from young men serving periodic detention was a feature.



To help celebrate this milestone the Public is invited to come along Saturday, 26^{th} and Sunday 27^{th} November 2022 between 10 am – 4 pm and enjoy a free game and a sausage sizzle.



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HOT OFF THE PRESS – OCTOBER 2022

Bringing a New Member into Your Club

Congratulations on identifying a new potential Lions member. The process outlined here is suggested to ensure that this person enjoys their Lions experience and becomes a valuable long term member of your club.

Introduction to Your Club

Inviting prospective members to participate in meaningful



service projects, whether they be fundraising events or community service projects is key to membership recruiting, public relations and also member retention.

Inviting new people to roll up their sleeves and help out is an opportunity to talk to them about how the club functions and what they can expect as a member. Inviting them along to club meetings and social meetings also provides another opportunity for them to learn about your club.

Pre Induction Meeting

There are some things that a new member needs to understand about how Lions and your club operates. Before a new member is inducted, it is a good idea for them to meet with a small group from your club to discuss the following:

- What they can expect to get out of being a Lion
 - o Social interaction
 - o Service
 - Learning opportunities
- How the Lions setup works
 - \circ $\;$ They are joining your club and Lions Clubs International
- Club meetings
 - o How often
 - What is involved
- Time commitment
 - How much time will being a Lions take
 - Flexibility around busy lives
- Costs
 - Club subs
 - o Dues (District, Multiple District and International)
 - Meals and any other club costs

Lions Induction

The Lions induction ceremony is usually carried out by a senior club member or a zone or district officer. There is a standard induction ceremony available on the LCI website or from your zone chair but this can be modified and simplified to meet your club's requirements. The key things to include are:

- 1. A brief outline about your club
- 2. A pledge to participate in club activities



- NOVEMBER 2022
- 3. A pledge to abide by the Lions Code of Ethics
- 4. A sponsor who will commit to:
 - a. Introduce the new member to club members
 - b. Be a mentor for the new member
 - c. Ensure that the new member receives all information required to ensure they understand the workings of Lions and your club.

First Lions Year

The first year in Lions for a new member is crucial to ensure they get off to a good start and enjoy their Lions journey. It is recommended that a membership committee be established to manage and monitor your new members.

Key things to ensure are:

- New members are made to feel welcome.
- A mentor be appointed to help each new member. This may be their sponsor or someone else.
- The sponsor or mentor keeps in regular contact with the new member and ensure they come to meetings when they can.
- New members should be invited to all club projects.
- The mentor should ensure that the new member enjoys participating in projects, but also ensure they do not get overloaded. Family comes first.
- The new member should attend a full Lions orientation programme within the first 6 months. This could be arranged in the club or be done by attending a zone orientation meeting.
- If the new Lion is interested, offer then the opportunity to attend a board (business) meeting.

Second Lions Year

- Mentor to continue working alongside new member
- Membership committee to meet with new member to discuss their progress and whether they have any concerns or needs not being met.
- Introduce the new member to board meetings and discuss how the board operates.
- Encourage new member to work alongside someone organizing a project.
- Discuss further training opportunities with new member. •

Third Lions Year

- Membership committee to meet with new member to discuss their progress and whether they have any concerns or needs not being met.
- Encourage new member to lead a project.
- Discuss possible roles on the board they may be interested in taking on.
- Introduction to Zone and District

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LMCT Report - November 2022

The year to date has been a little slow in District 202D.

No applications for Grants or Loan have been made but I am sure they will start to roll in during 2023.

Donations have been received from **6** Lions Clubs, which percentage wise across the district Is 18% and is slightly above the same time last year, but I know most clubs respond generously before Christmas and in the earlier part of the New Year.

Club treasurers have received a letter with an invoice in August and a follow up letter from myself, to Presidents and Secretaries in September/October 22. If this has not been received, please contact me by email or phone listed below.

It is encouraging to see and read about the projects many Lions Club are involved with, serving their communities with 3 Grants were made in 202D and a total of 12 New Zealand wide.

Recognitions in 202D are zero this year, surely this will pick up as we had 44 last year. I ask Zone Chairs to please continue to push these recognitions at Zone meetings, as I will miss the November meetings due to a long-awaited operation.

The LMCT has updated Grants and Loans forms and criteria which are available on the Website or from District Trustee who can assist in any application or grant. Three Grants and one Loan were made to our District last year with a total of 12 nationwide, congratulations to those clubs.

The Emergency Grant application form and Name, along the Criteria are currently being reviewed to allow applicates to have more flexibility for the use.

Your reported service projects can be viewed within your district and around the world. That means your club's creativity and impact can inspire Lions and Leos to embrace new causes and serve in new ways. Reports also help Lions International staff identify best practices to share globally.

Be proud


