It's time to get your club the recognition it deserves!

Now is the time to get your club entries together for the District Awards. These are due no later than **31 January 2023**.

<u>Waverley Award</u>: to encourage participation in <u>Community Service Projects</u>
Particulars of the Project being presented by each Club should be contained in a written summary in the form of not more than one A4 sheet of paper – (both sides if wished.) - this may be accompanied by a scrapbook / folder of similar size which contains newspaper cuttings, letters of congratulations, references, reports, circulars and any such data to enlighten or impress the judges on the various phases of the project.

The dates and duration of the entire project must be clearly shown.

Environmental Award: (1 entry per club only)

Your entry should consider and will be judged on:

- How it promotes the care of and / or responsible use of our environment
- Club member involvement
- Community or other club endorsement and / or involvement
- Project has impact for your community and has ongoing possibilities.

<u>Youth Award:</u> The Project which wins the 202D Youth Award is forwarded to Multiple District for judging, along with the winning entries from the other districts in Multiple District 202. Please note, for the purpose of this award, youth are defined as young people up to age of 19.

Your entry must be presented in the form of an email (may be an attachment) or posted.

- Up to 500 words describing a club's youth project, including number of youth involved, benefits to the participants and community (eg. leadership, confidence....), percentage of club members involves.
- Entry can be supported by additional information such as press / publicity information, reports or photos.

<u>District Bulletin Award –</u> automatic entry but a copy must be shared to our publicity and Contact Editor Tobi Hipp

<u>Administration Award –</u> ensure you report membership every month (even if no change) and your club's service project via MyLion.

<u>Website</u> – automatic entry for those clubs with websites and good use of social media platforms.

There are many great things happening in District 202D. Let's get your club the recognition it deserves!

Ukraine Relief Grant Update

The conflict in Ukraine has driven millions of people from their homes, creating a humanitarian crisis that is forcing families to search for safety and security. In this time of great need.

LCIF has awarded grants totalling US\$2,694,934, to Lions supporting Ukrainian refugees who have crossed their borders, as well, Lions in Ukraine have received LCIF grants to address the critical needs of people who remain in the country. Grant funding enables Lions to cover a broad spectr um of refugee needs, including immediate survival needs, transitional needs for mid - or long-term settlement, and support for services to help refugees integrate into their new community.

During his recent trip to Europe MD LCIF Area Leader, PDG Leo Danz m et some refugees at a local church and saw their desperation, devastation, and emotional exhaustion of their not knowing what was happening to their families. He also visited two clubs in Italy and Switzerland who expressed the overwhelming need to contin ue to support the refugees who are still arriving daily by the train load.

Refugees and Displaced Persons Fund – LCIF is actively collecting donations to its Refugees and Displaced Persons fund, which will help ensure that Lions are there to help them find the safety and security they desperately need. Lions My Health Check project November update.

Hi Fellow Lions,

The objective of providing a Lions My Health Check Service Project (LMHCP) for the communities that have difficulty accessing a Medical Centre or a GP has been beneficial in detecting health conditions that a lot of people are not aware of .e.g. Excessive Blood pressure and high blood sugar content leading to diabetes.

The most recent site visits with the LMHCP Glob Caravan to the Manawatu A & P show plus Crosshills Country Fair at Kimbolton saw 79 people checked and 20 referred to their GP, some with serious problems.

A big Thanks go to the Glob caravan towing team Steve, Bruce, Ross, Warren, Ash, Rex, Tobi, Rowan as site visits have ranged from Zone 4 Opunake, Hawera, Zone 3 Hunterville and within Zone 1 to Rongotea, Apiti, Colyton, Feilding.

Thanks also to the Front of House teams who set up the Glob, then become græters and guides to assist people fill in the statistics questionnaire and mental health indicator plus weight/ height measurements. They are also refreshment distributors. Therefore Thanks to Feilding Host Lions, Feilding Manchester Lions, Ashhurst Lions, Colyton-Bunnythorpe Lions, Rongotea & District Lions, Foxton Lions, Opunake Lakeside Lions, Opunake Lions, Hawera Mt.View Lions, Normandy & District Lions, and Hunterville Lions. Good cooperation and collaboration and team building from the Lions family at large.

Thanks also to the Medical team members; Tegan, Megan, Merete, Miriam, Kathy, Rex, Val and Dr Warren.

These are the team that take blood pressure, blood oxygen, blood sugar, blood cholesterol readings that are analysed by Dr W who discusses their current health situation and makes recommendations for some to book into their GP asap. 370 people checked this year with 140 needing their own GP followup.

The LMHCP Planning Team coordinating visits, operational resources etc working in the back ground are: Dr Warren, DG Steve, VDG Tobi, CC-PDG Megan, Almoner Ash, Treasurer Anne, Secretary Robert, Nurse Miriam. We recently lost founding Secretary Steve Poole from Manchester Lions who will be missed. There was a request made at this months Zone 1 meeting for a Club representative from each Z1 Club to assist on the Planning team welcomed.



If the Clubs are on the Route they could also take the opportunity to sell (for a donation) food to riders as they go past. I would be happy to talk to Clubs that may be interested in this. It could also be an opportunity for clubs with cyclists to jump in with him and do a few kilometres for publicity options.

vintage vehicles, stockcars, a pipe band and








