These are remarkable figures for six months work, thanks to each of you along with the fifty new members who have taken seriously our pledge 'together we serve' and to continue to be the biggest humanitarian organisation ever.

See you all in Fairlie when we will be celebrating all we have achieved.


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Gift to IP Brian & Lion Lori from Timaru Suburban Lions Club during July 2022 visit


n recognition of the visit by Lions International President Brian Sheehan and wife Lion Lori to 202J District, and knowing the fondness our IP has of penguins, the Lions Club of Timaru Suburban donated to the Katiki Point Penguin Refuge Charitable Trust.

With this donation the club was able to sponsor two Yellow Eyed, or Hoiho, penguin chicks from the 2022/23 breeding season, and named them "Brian" and "Lori". We also donated towards the microchipping of the two chicks so they can be traced when they return to land in the years ahead.

Brian and Lori hatched on the 2nd of November 2022 and will soon be heading out to sea as juvenile Hoiho. It is a dangerous world for these penguins with a high mortality rate; if Brian and Lori survive their first year at sea we can expect them to come back as breeding birds in 2 - 4 years.

DISASTER DEVASTATION DESPERATION

ever has there been a greater need for Lions Clubs and individual Lions around the world to rise up and support the call from IPP Douglas Alexander, Chairman of Lions Clubs International Foundation, to donate to our Foundation Disaster Relief fund for the recent devastating Turkey and Syria earthquakes. Within two days of the event, our Foundation made an initial grant of US\$200,000 to help provide for the immediate needs of the victims, but there is a much greater need going forward.

The scale of loss and suffering, and the needs of the surviving people remains massive. As of 22 February there have been over 47,000 recorded deaths, thousands injured with many still unaccounted for.

Hundreds of thousands of people in both countries have been left homeless in the middle of freezing winter temperatures. In the city of Kahramanmaraş 40% of all buildings have been damaged. The death toll across both countries surpasses the 17,000 killed in 1999 when a similar earthquake hit northwestern Turkey.

We have seen the TV news coverage and have all shared our thoughts of sympathy for the families affected, but the people of these countries need more than that, they need the necessities of life and YOU AS A LION AND YOUR CLUB can help by donating to LCIF's Disaster Relief Fund. Remember that 100% of what you donate goes to the cause, nothing is taken for administration purposes. (Unlike the vast majority of other organisations).

"In Northern Syria a baby was pulled alive from a collapsed building with her umbilical cord still attached. She was the only member of her family to survive, with doctors saying her mother died shortly after giving birth". She has an uncle who is going to look after her.

"A father was captured sitting in debris holding the hand of his daughter whose body lay on a bed beneath slabs of concrete, glass and bricks". What a tragedy.

Whilst offering peace to the souls of those who have died, we need to unite with Lions from around the world, showing **EMPATHY**, **COMPASION AND KINDNESS** as we provide service to the living.

The people of Turkey and Syria, through LCIF would greatly appreciate your support at this time.



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International Youth Camp

...a participant's experience

n the 27th of December I had the privilege of attending the Lions Club International Youth Camp New Zealand which was held in Tauranga across ten transformative days at the Ngamuwahine Lodge. I made a myriad of special connections, memories and moments, all of which I will treasure forever.

Day One was such a special day as we were all settling in and getting to know each other. We pinned-up the flags of the clubs of past youth campers and played a game of volleyball. We finished the evening with team events and a swim in the river.



Day Two consisted of driving to the beautiful Mount Maunganui where we met President of the Mount Maunganui Lions Club, David Peart, who pointed out a number of things for us to look out for whilst going on our hike. Majority vote was to climb to the top of the Mount (instead of around the base) and we were so grateful to have done so. We then cooled off at the beach and dined with the Papamoa Lions Club where they taught us all about the history of the area. It was really special to share a classic Kiwi tea of chips and hotdogs with them after such a lovely day.



On Day Three, we volunteered at the Lions Tree Grove doing ground prep by clearing some of the harakeke bushes in preparation to replace them with remembrance trees of past Lions club members. It took a lot of mahi but it was filled with lots of laughs. We then drove to the Skyline rides

and the Gondolas in Rotorua before attending the Mitai Maori Village tour. We watched a cultural performance with a waka filled with tribal warriors where we learnt all about traditional Māori culture. We finished the night with a delicious hangi and watching the glow worms.

On Day Four, we stayed at the camp, participating in a heated game of paintball before climbing the high ropes and using the flying fox. Gerry Hart and Wayne Smith from the Ngamuwahine Education Trust led us through this wonderfully as many of the campers were facing their fears and trying new things. Whaea Linda Cousins, our wonderful cook, taught us how to make flowers out of harakeke. We then got stuck into preparing for our New Year's Eve celebrations by making pizzas and our Australian campers taught us how to make damper. We spent the rest of the evening singing, dancing and celebrating, wearing white as our Brazilian camper showed us her Brazilian tradition of wearing white on the New Year to symbolise peace. We slept outside under the stars...covered in bug spray!

International Youth Camp (cont'd)

On Day Five, we hiked the Kaimai Ranges to feed Henry the Eel. Many of us had a quick (chilly) dip in the water before we hiked back to camp.

In the afternoon, we came across a lone, very friendly goat who followed us the whole way back to camp. We named her Leo and she watched us play a very heated game of volleyball. In the evening, Lions Club member Sarah Cross from Sarah C's Bees gave a presentation all about the life of bees. She was very passionate about them, and she voted on which team flag she liked the best.



On Day Six, we stopped at the award-winning Southern Cross bathrooms in Tokoroa on our way to Taupo. We saw the beautiful Huka Falls and visited the Huka honey hive for some ice cream. We then met the Taupo Pakeke Lions to ride on their fundraising train that runs along the park. The money that is collected is donated back to the community. We then swam at the hot water Otumuheke stream, which was a new experience for many of us, before eating dinner at the Taupo Lakeland Lions Club.

We started Day Seven off by viewing the Otorohanga Kiwi House with the Otorohanga Lions Club. It was so special to see the Kiwis as most of us had never seen them before. We spent the afternoon black water rafting. We were in tubes floating along the water in caves. This was an unmatched experience, floating in the dark watching the glow worms with our friends. We then drove to a sheep shearing presentation where we met two of the top world record holders for shearing at the Glenburn farm. We all got in there and had a go shearing the sheep.
