Convention Voting.....

- Clubs must be financial to vote all annual dues must have been paid in full at least 15 days before the start of Convention. Clubs & voting delegates must be in good standing.
- Voting delegates must be accredited by the close off time on the morning of the Business Session (1 April 2023).
- The standard club constitution states:

"... club shall be entitled to send its full quota of delegates to all such conventions and have power to pay the necessary expenses of such delegates attending such conventions. This club shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district ... to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in this club, or major fraction thereof, of this club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held... The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members."

- Therefore as at 1 March 2023 a club with 16 members of at least a year & a day will receive two
 votes as will one of 24 members, those votes being either the club appointed voting delegates
 or a club appointed substitute (the alternate) for an appointed delegate who has to withdraw.
- Any members joining after 28 February 2022 are not counted towards the club's eligible voting numbers.
- 202J Past International Directors have full delegate status independent of their club's delegate quota.
- The standard club constitution states: "Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote of his/ her choice for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote of his/her choice on each question submitted to, the respective convention."

Therefore, voting decisions are the choice of the voting delegates during the Convention business session, not decided by the club.

Disaster Relief

LCIF Disaster Preparedness Grants maximum \$US10,000

These grants support partnering with local authorities and other organisations for future relief efforts. It provides funding for relief goods stockpiling, disaster kit assembly, preparedness education, advanced support for first responders, food banks, medical facilities and shelters.

These grants are applicable on a District basis once every three years and District's matching funds of 10% of the total project cost are required.

LCIF Community Recovery Grants maximum US\$20,000

In the wake of a disaster which has affected at least 100 people this grant helps support short term clean up and repairs where immediate needs are not addressed by other organisations. This grant provides for repairs and coordination of temporary services but not construction projects. These grants are also on a District basis and must be requested within 60 days of the disaster. The project is co-educational, with contestants required to have had their 17th birthday and not be over 21 years of age on 1st December 2023.

All applicants must be sponsored by a Lions, Lioness or Leos club and the official entry form must be completed in full.

Entries close for Regional Heats Saturday 17th June.

The regional heats will be held in Oamaru Sunday 25th June.

The National Final will be held Saturday 12th August in Rangiora.

All Entrance Fees are covered by Sponsoring Lions/Lioness or Leos Clubs, \$75.00 per entrant.

The first prize is	\$2,500
Second	\$1,000
Third	\$ 500

Contestants will be required to deliver a Prepared Speech of not less than 5 minutes nor more than six minutes. The topic is at the discretion of the contestant. Penalty points apply for under and over time.

An additional Impromptu Speech of not more than two minutes on a topic determined by the judges will also be delivered by each contestant. Penalty points apply for over time.
