### District 202E Awards 2021 - 2022 IPDG Tracy Henderson

Owing to the lack of entries for many of the awards this year, many of the categories have been nominated and decided upon by the members of the Global Leadership, Membership and Service teams. If you want your Club and/or members to be considered for our District Awards then PLEASE nominate them.

1. <u>SightFirst Trophy</u>. Awarded to the club that excels in promoting/ alleviating sight issues in the previous year. Awarded for their efforts in collecting eye glasses and their collaboration with Air NZ in the collection. This years recipients are Lions Club of Chch South

2. Mt Cook Community Service Trophy – Awarded for their work on the Marshall Place Opaoa Reserve in Blenheim. This reserve is an artificially created bush near the centre of town unique to Marlborough. Land was originally farmed with initial planting of the forest by the Holdaway family. The local Council constructed the stopbanks in 1956 to protect the town from flooding so the Reserve is part of this floodplain. Forest and Bird helped with some planting in the 1970's and were keen to re-engage. Mature 65 year old Kahikatea trees are surrounded by a perfect wind deflecting range of plants including flax, ngaio, kanuka, totara, rimu, ribbonwood, lancewood, ramarama, coprosma, kaikomako, kowhai, karaka, titoki, cabbage trees and toi toi. Awarded to Marlborough Boys College Leo Club.

**3.** <u>Peter Tallott Trophy - "Outstanding Lion" Trophy"</u> – There are so many Lions who should qualify for this award. This Lion was nominated for all the work that he has done behind the scenes. He is very much a quiet achiever. From his mentorship of new District Governors and Vice District Governors to his work on Club constitutions and Trust documentation and so much inbetween. Truly an outstanding Lion ..... Past District Governor John Whyte

4. District Club Bulletin Award - District Bulletin Award - This was a very difficult as the quality of the bulletins has fantastic and the content has been excellent. This year the trophy goes to Jim Smith from the Lions Club of Wigram

5. <u>Syme Family Trophy "Best Club Project"</u>- This year the award has gone to a Club that has struggled a bit over the last couple of years but have come out on the other side and are a great example to their community of what Lions can do. They are very visible within their area and continue to excel. It was difficult to identify just one project as this Club has so many on the go at any one time – anything from venue hire to community store to equipment hire. This award goes to The Lions Club of Hokitika.

6. Halswell Lions "Membership Trophy" - The last couple of years have been difficult for all Clubs and again so many Clubs would be worthy recipients of this award. This particular Club is a great example of Project Vital .... They have revitalized their Club with new members; they have rejuvenated their Club with new ideas and this in turn has re-motivated the members. This year the Halswell Lions "Membership Trophy" goes to The Lions Club of Glenmark.

7. <u>Pollitt Family Trophy</u> "InterClub Visitation Cup" – (more than one Lion and not to the same club.) Pollitt Family Trophy "Inter Club Visitation Cup" .... This Club is one of the smaller Clubs within the District but are very active in the local community and enjoy visiting the other Clubs within the area. During the year 2021-2022 members attended meetings of at least 5 other local Clubs. This award goes to The Lions Club of Woodend Pegasus.

8. Ian Drewett Memorial Trophy (Outstanding "Excellence in Lionism") - this trophy is awarded to a Lion who shows his dedication, commitment and passion for this organisation in all he does. He breathes, sleeps and lives Lions. At times his enthusiasm gets the better of him - but only because he is so passionate. He attends regular monthly Zoom meetings where he shares information regarding this District and receives information that he shares with the District. During the 2021-2022 Lions year he was instrumental in ensuring IPDG Tracy's positive membership growth was attained -

and proved to be the highest in the country. Brian Attenborough, Lions Club of Woodend-Pegasus

9. McWha Award for outstanding Leadership - This award is presented to a Club president who has displayed leadership, community involvement and dedication to the service of others. This particular President has led his Club through a couple of rough years and has been at the helm when his Club needed to change direction with some of its projects. The winner of the McWha Leadership Award is Phil Bray, from the Lions Club of Oxford and Districts.

10. Marion McWha Trophy - "Leo of the Year Trophy" – Leo's are the future of Lions and it's a pleasure to present this award, jointly, to 2 young people who show so much promise .... These two young men are from the Marlborough Boys College Leo Club. Both joined the Leo's at the beginning of 2022. One took over the Presidency in March and the other was the Clubs Treasurer. Each attended 13 of the Clubs 15 activities during the year. These included community service, fund-raising and social events. Among the many, many achievements attributed to these young men is the fact that they have organised a group of 6 (mostly Leo's) who regularly walk around the College collecting rubbish. On most occasions they wear their Leo shirts. This small project was undertaken without direction from the College staff and is typical of how these Leo's support their school and in the larger part, their community.

So ... the joint winners of the Marion McWha Trophy "Leo of the Year" award are Alan Ashfield and Martyn Davis.

11. Kaikoura Lions Club Shield "School Environment Award" – the recipients of this award have already been acknowledged but they met all the criteria and they deserve to be awarded this honour. The Marshall Place Opaoa Reserve is a unique piece of easily accessible native bush very close to the centre of Blenheim. The reserve has been taken from a neglected, weedy and littered area with dubious usage to a safe, inviting, natural walkway. The new plantings will enhance and increase the process of natural regeneration that is happening. Once these future developments have been completed then the reserve as a living classroom will be actively promoted to the preschools and schools in the area. This award is presented to the Marlborough Boys College Leo Club.

Not presented this year - Young Speechmaker Cup (Syme Medal), Emerging Speechmaker Contest, Kan Tabs Club of the Year Award, PDG Stuart Barr "District Youth Award" and the Tail twisting Trophy.

### IMPORTANT MESSAGE FOR ALL CLUBS

#### Lions Club re-registration under the new Incorporated Societies Act

Under the new legislation all Incorporated Societies will need to re-register after registrations open in October 2023. I have tried to liaise with the Register of Incorporated Societies to get any necessary additions or amendments to the Lions Standard Form Club Constitution sorted prior to registrations opening in October 2023, so that clubs could all move forward with passing new constitutions knowing that the Register was happy with the changes. This was the process used when the Charities Commission came into being and we got the Lions Clubs Charitable Trust Deed ticked off by the Commission in advance.

Unfortunately, the Register of Incorporated Societies has decided that there is no power for them to do similar. As an alternative I plan to liaise with a club to pass what I consider are the appropriate changes then file that as a test case, after registrations open in October 2023. There will hopefully not be many changes needed, but there are some new requirements that are not covered by the Standard Form Lions Constitution. Once the test case has gone through the registration process, I can then let all clubs know the wording they will need to adopt for their club -Alan Knowsley MD202 Legal Counsel (source Lions Magazine Autumn 2023) constitutions going forward.

Natural disasters continue around the globe and none more so than in NZ Districts L, K & M (Northland Akld. BOP & Hawkes Bay).

LCIF have donated USD20k to assist in the wake of damage created by the cyclone, however donations from NZ Clubs are best channelled into their respective District's Charitable Trust account.

Nevertheless, LCIF has continued to support Refugees in Syria and Turkey following the earthquakes, and in Western Europe for refugees fleeing the war torn Ukraine.

The earthquake that struck Turkey and Syria devastated communities, homes and families. When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, Lions and Lions International are among the first to respond. LCIF quickly awarded a US\$200,000 grant to the Lions in Turkey, who are providing 16 prefab container buildings to the Hatay Province in southeastern Turkey to create a Lions Village for earthquake survivors. As relief needs continue to emerge, additional grants may be awarded. Your donation to the Disaster Relief Fund can be the difference for families struggling to cope with diasters like this one.

LCIF is not just about donating to Lions' humanitarian needs.

LCIF are also there to provide Grants for the community. Childhood Cancer and others, especially by way of 'Matching Grants'. These Grants are separate to those providing immediate support to disasters.

The LCIF Standard Grant is the most common funding sought by clubs with assistance commencing at USD10k (ie 50% of costings). Criteria for the Standard grant can be viewed on either the Lions International site, (or by googling)

Planning for the Future of Lions in 202E



"The Growth of our Association means we are always ready "To Serve" and "To Grow" means we must not only bring in New Members but also keep our current Lions Engaged and Active".

This is a quote from Immediate Past International President Douglas X Alexander early in his 2022 – 2023 term in office and even though this was written over 12 months ago I think it is still very relevant in todays world.
