Sponsoring new members is an accomplishment worth celebrating! That's why Lions Clubs International recognizes individual Lions who sponsor new members.

- Each of the 17 Membership Key Awards reflect the number of new members a Lion has sponsored.
- Recognition begins once a Lion has sponsored two members.
- Awards are automatically issued after the new members have remained Lions for a year and one day.

Share the tradition and encourage members in your district to invite their family, friends and co-workers to join Lions and help strengthen our organization.

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- 1. A new member must remain a Lion for a year and a day before the name may be used as credit toward a key.
- 2. The name of the new member and the sponsor must be reported via MyLCI, with the sponsor's member number and club number.
- 3. No sponsor shall receive more than one key of the same type.
- 4. Charter, transfer, and reinstated members cannot be used as credit for a key.
- 5. Only one sponsor per new member can receive credit for a key.
- 6. Requests for sponsor changes must be received by LCI Headquarters within 90 days of the new members' join date.
- 7. Key awards will be issued to a sponsor if the new member's club and the sponsor's club are in good standing.

Devastating natural disaster continue to strike across the globe, including:

Whilst no formal appeal has been announced by LCIF, an announcement is expected very soon and it is hoped that many many Lions clubs from around the Globe will contribute.

I have just re-read the July District Bulletin and have seen how one club in America has grown to over 400 members in the time since they chartered nearly 80 years ago. While I'm not saying 400+ is the ideal number for a club, it does lay down a challenge to us all.

WHAT IS YOUR CLUB DOING TO HELP 202E ACHIEVE ITS GOAL OF 1500 MEMBERS?

It seems to me that MARCOM and MEMBERSHIP go hand in hand. Here is my take on how these two important areas should work together to grow our clubs. I've unashamedly borrowed the headings from the report of this American club, because they are exactly what we need to follow if we are to achieve the goal we have been set.

Firstly BE KNOWN: Clubs need to let their community know who they are and what they are doing. Activities which involve the community in many ways will attract new people to your club. Get people in the community to help plan and run events. We all know our membership is getting older and we need the vibrancy of younger ideas to keep our clubs dynamic.

Secondly BE SEEN: I sometimes think we are invisible to our communities. Don't forget to wear your Lions vests or club shirts when doing public fundraising. Signage is an important marketing tool also. Photograph everything and every event your club undertakes and fill social media with good information. Many clubs have advertising brochures which people can pick up from shops, information centres and doctors' surgeries (to mention a few). MARCOM will help grow your MEMBERSHIP.

Thirdly REPRESENT YOUR COMMUNITY: We all know that "the times they are a-changing" and while this might be uncomfortable to some of us older members, we need to come to terms with a new reality and way of doing things. If COVID taught us anything, it was that in differing times different methods of carrying out our club activities are not only possible but can be successful. Don't be afraid of ZOOMING in to all the resources available to assist your club's growth. Use other groups to help grow your clubs. The local Rugby Teams could provide valuable 'man/womanpower' and bring younger members into the club. Once again, be inventive and pro-active.

Finally BRING IDEAS: Older members are sometimes afraid of newer young members who come in fired up with ideas. Step back and listen to them. They have the energy and drive to make sure we will survive another 100 years. Remember that all your club's successful projects were once upon a time new ideas. Imagine what would have happened if you had not taken a punt and given them a go.

In conclusion, use every tool in our MARCOM and MEMBERSHIP toolkits to make sure our district meets its goal.
