Olivia Goldsmith, our District winner in 2022, and Grace Johnston, our winner for 2023. Olivia went on to gain second place in last year's national final. Both challenged us all to think differently around the issues that face society today. They both are certainly extremely gifted young women, and we will watch their progress with interest.

The National 2023 final was held at Rangiora on Saturday 12th August. There were nine contestants representing the seven districts in Multiple District 202. Their prepared speeches were all different and again demonstrated the abilities of these young people. The impromptu speech subject was "When I woke up this morning my first thought was". They were given one minute to prepare. Grace performed very well in both and was placed a well-deserved second overall. Her prepared speech was titled "Reframing Masculinity".

The Young Speechmaker Competition is just one of the opportunities we, as Lions, have available to support our young people. I would like to see more clubs providing an entrant into our District competition next year.

Other opportunities include the two youth camps held each year: the Lions National Youth Camp in Foxton during October and the Lions International Youth Camp in Tauranga in December/January. Assistance with funding for these and other youth activities can be sought from Heads Up 4 Kids.

Don't also forget the Peace Poster competition which closes in October. It would be good to see more entries in this competition than in past years.

Focus on Young Speechmaker

hristine and I saw us enjoying a delightful drive to Rangiora Saturday 12 August for the National Young Speechmaker finals. Along with DG Garth and Christine, Robert and Beryl Naismith we were treated to laughs, smiles, plus some challenges expressed by nine exceptional teenage speakers.

Hosts, the Rangiora Lions Club, chose the RSA complex for the event. The small warm, room (about 100 seats) was ideal as the contestants did not need to use a speaker system.

The opening component is a 5–6-minute prepared speech. All covered areas of topical social issues that concern today's teenagers. Some were rooted in their own personal experiences.

Because the only pathway to this level is via the sponsorship of a Lions club followed by 1st or 2nd at the District competition these speeches have been presented more than once allowing the speakers to seriously polish both the content and the presentation. At this point the contestants, who have been together since the night before, sit in the audience. Watching the body language and reactions after each has finished showed, to me, that there were some surprises. That being the topic and its delivery did not seem to fit the perceptions gained from their earlier time together.

For the second component they were in isolation and in turn given the topic for the 1–2-minute speech. With only one minute to prepare for: "The first thing I thought when I woke this morning." When finished they could sit and listen to their competition.

Joe from KeriKeri (Mangonui Lions Club) attended a wedding in India and was struck by the many contrasts within the environment but more impressed by the apparent happiness of everybody regardless of their situation; "Food For Thought". His impromptu take was on the amazing people he was going to meet today.

Imogen, (Hastings Pioneer Lions Club) expanded on "othering"; you know, those over there, the others and how often we both unconsciously/ deliberately do this. Her first thought was about her sister's upcoming maths test. Our "J" entrant Grace's (Dunedin Host Lions Club) challenge of "reframing masculinity" was a great riposte to our more common macho approach. While her impromptu of "have I left the kettle on" was very personal.

Wanaka's Jackson (Wanaka & District Lions) gave an impassioned environmental presentation challenging us to be more involved in not further damaging what we have; "Issues with Modern Environmentalism". His "What if" approach first thing in the morning was not sleepy.

The Welcome Bay Lions Club gave us Ri who argued that feminism was more than just rights for women but that in fact women are human. Her "why do I do this?" impromptu was a personal challenge to anxiety.

Millie Jane (Hawarden- Waikari Lions Club) gave us a great 5 minutes on why not to buy electric cars then followed the impromptu with her waking thoughts about her pride in her family.

Hannah's (Karori Lions Club) personal account of life as part of a refugee family living in New Zealand was enlightening to say the least; "The Inequitable Way We Treat Refugees". At first light waffles beat pancakes for breakfast but she always picks hash browns first.

Sophia (Whanganui Lions Club) expounded that we need to look at the past as the best way to improve the future and procrastination is not an option; "It's Now or Never". Even as a teenager the debate around tea or coffee for the day starts on waking.

Ansh (Bethlehem Te Puna Lions Club) was forthcoming about being from a different race/ culture, in her case Indian, in a white European dominated society; "Intersection of Racism and Individuality in Aotearoa". Live, Laugh, Love was the theme for her impromptu.

Thank you NZ Lions for hosting this adventure. These young people showcased just how proud and concerned they are in the future.

MJF

hat is an MJF? Most will know, but for our newer members it is the acronym for Melvin Jones

Fellowships.

In 1973, in honour of our founder Melvin Jones, the Melvin Jones Fellowship programme was established to recognise and honour Lions and individuals, outstanding in Lions and the community, by bestowing on them an award named in honour of our Founder. The Fellowship is the Foundation's (LCIF) highest honour worldwide and represents humanitarian gualities such as generosity, compassion and concern for the less fortunate.

Melvin Jones Fellowships are funded by making appropriate donations to LCIF. When such donations are made, the said donated amount, in most cases qualifies as credits towards the purchase of an MJF at a later date. These credits are recorded in the name of the individual donating or in the case of a Club or District donating, with the recipient being named at a later date when the Club/District decides to make such a recognition. As District LCIF Coordinator I can advise individual Clubs of their credits if required. The actual cost of an MJF is \$US1,000.

As part of the Melvin Jones Fellowship programme, a Progressive MJF recognition can be presented to Lions who are already Melvin Jones Fellows but who continue to give outstanding service and who should be duly recognised for this.

All Lions individually are encouraged to become involved with the Lions Share Supporters programme by making personal donations to LCIF. All donations will be recorded in your name and receive credits towards an MJF, while 100% of your donation is used to support LCIF's humanitarian and grant programmes. Donations to the Lions Share Support Programme for which you will receive a special dated pin, range from \$NZ75 for a one-star pin, \$NZ150 for a two-star pin and \$NZ300 for a three-star pin. They plan to cater for a Bridge Tournament (for Camp Quality) and participate in annual events like the Dunedin Marathon (drink station), Lady Thorn Dell rhododendron garden's "Dell Day," a Seniors Mystery Bus Trip, and the local Artisan Market.

Overall, our zone clubs are actively involved in diverse projects, from fundraisers to community events, showcasing their commitment to service and community betterment.
