DG Garth's Greetings

ost clubs in our District produce a monthly bulletin to provide members with current information about what's happening in your club. I, along with other district officers, also receive a copy. I find them very stimulating to read and interesting to see what activities Lions are involved in. A few of our clubs do not produce a bulletin. Even if is only one or two pages it is a great way to inform members and share the message of what Lions do.

Scam Emails – Several Lions have received emails purporting to come from me as District Governor. They ask the receiver to do a job for me. They are definitely a scam and should be ignored. The "Lions address" shown is not my official DG email address. Any emails that I do send to Lions will usually come from my personal email address. Unfortunately, this scam is happening in all seven New Zealand Lions Districts. The same scam was out there about the same time last year.

Lions Clubs Cancer Trust – the Trust was formed in November 2021 with the purpose of establishing a mobile skin cancer service in New Zealand. It is intended that there be two vehicles, one in each Island, from which trained professional screeners can conduct screening

sessions. Fundraising is well underway with nearly \$100,000 raised so far. Each vehicle will cost approximately \$285,000 plus fit out. The trust requires \$168,000 by the end of the year so it can apply to LCIF for a matching grant of \$US100,000. The first vehicle will be based in the South Island because of the support received and also because the incidence of Melanoma is higher and more severe than the North.

Melvin Jones Fellowship Awarded

n Wednesday October 11, 2023, the Taieri Lions Club presented Kevin Moore with a Melvin Jones Fellowship for his instigation and committed dedication to the Berwick Outdoor Experience and as a person that is community minded.

Kevin, as a member of our club, came up with the idea of an eight-day outdoor course at Berwick Lodge on the Taieri Plains. It started with a dream in 1989 and the first course was held in 1991.

It is run completely by volunteers once a year and about 40 participants come from all walks of life, and range in age from the minimum age of 18 to a 76-year-old.

The 40 people are put into four groups (watches) and are given all sorts of challenges and team building activities that can be squeezed into eight days.

Over the years it has evolved into a very professional run course by outside volunteers with the skill required for a safe but challenging

course. It involves physical activities such as abseiling, climbing, tramping, kayaking, etc, as well as mentally challenging activities and team building exercises.

Kevin was a member of our club for fourteen years but carried on with this project after he (and his wife Glenys) moved to Twizel. He is still the driver behind it all and makes the pilgrimage to the Berwick Lodge year after year.

The benefits that the community gets from this project are immense; you only have to read the feedback we get from the participants and sponsors. For some it is life changing, for others they become great leaders.

For Kevin's commitment and for being a great community-minded person that lives by our motto: WE SERVE, the Lions Club wanted to acknowledge that by honouring Kevin with a Melvin Jones Fellowship.

Welcome to the first Membership Newsletter for the 23/24 Lions year.

International President Dr Patti Hill has challenged the Lions of the World to increase our membership over the next three years from 1.4m members to 1.5m members. This initiative is called "Mission 1.5"

The Council of Governors have agreed to take up this challenge by putting in place our own challenge of increasing membership in New Zealand by 10k over the next three years. "Mission 10k"

To achieve this goal all Clubs, Zones and Districts will need to work together - teamwork.

Firstly your District Governor will have appointed a Global Extension Chair who will work alongside the Global Membership and GMA Chairpersons.

Districts will be in the process of formulating a plan for the next three years which will have yearly targets they feel their District can meet. From there, clubs will be asked to look at their own membership, and work with their Zones and Districts to achieve their own goal of membership increase and new clubs or a club branch.

Why should every club in New Zealand look at increasing their membership.



Congratulations to those clubs who have already recognized their declining membership issues, and have started the process of increasing members and revitalizing their clubs.

MISSION 10k

One issue has been highlighted, and that is members who leave your club. Some choose to resign, and are recorded as being dropped. Some move away and therefore must be recorded as transferred and not dropped. Try and find out where they are going, and contact a Lions club in their new area so they can be followed up in the hopes of keeping them in the Lions family.

Marketing is an important part of letting people know who you are, and what your club does in the community. Some suggestions could be that clubs advertise in your local schools newsletters. Getting information out to new housing developments and advertising in retirement villages.

Membership Chairpersons are an integral part of every club's board of Directors.

Top priorities for every club membership chairperson

- 1. Develop a membership growth plan.
- Review the Just Ask! A Culture of Recruitment Guide with your club to help prepare them to identify and welcome new members.
- Make a list of prospective members and follow up to ensure that invitations are being made to join the club.
- 4. Ensure new members receive orientation.
- 5. Help create a positive club atmosphere.
- Ask your club to identify potential members, then repeat steps 1-5.
- Promote the club at service projects and events by working with the club marketing chairperson.
- 8. Participate in zone and district meetings.
- 9. Collaborate within your club, zone and district.
- Collaborate with your club marketing chairperson to create a Facebook page or build a club website using the e-clubhouse template available at lionsclubs.org.



Measuring success

- Conduct at least one more community membership drive than the previous year.
- Increase the number of new members over the previous year.
- Contact a minimum of two former members about returning to the club.
- Increase total membership over the previous Lions year.
- . Retain 85% of members.
- Hold a new member orientation and encourage new members to participate.

Remember the club membership Chairperson is only one member of a team, and they will need the support of all their club members, board of Directors, and District GAT team to achieve their membership goals.

Make our initiative Mission 10k a success. Without members our clubs cannot do the great work that we all know Lions are recognized for.


