nother month has passed and visiting clubs in the District has continued for FVDG Derek, SVDG Mike and me. Christine has accompanied me on many of the visits and we have been welcomed and impressed by the diverse range of activities being undertaken by our clubs. This means that our communities that we serve benefit from what we do.

It has also been a pleasure to induct several new Lions into clubs during my visits. During October the Lions Club of Oamaru celebrated its 60th year of service to its community. Looking back on its activities over this time it can be seen how the people of Oamaru and further afield have benefited from the activities of that club and its Lions.

At the time of writing this piece, we have had 24 new Lions join us so far this Lions year. Unfortunately, we have lost 25 members during this time. It's an area that we must address. At the District Cabinet meeting held on 11th November we discussed the MISSION 1.5 programme. For our Multiple District 202 our Mission NZ 10K aims for 10,000 Lions by 1 July 2027. We currently have 7,809 (This year added 281, lost 305).

Your Cabinet has agreed that our District MISSION will be to grow 202 J Lions to 1,300 by July 2027.

Entries for the annual Peace Poster competition closed on 31 October. One club, Dunedin Balmacewen, had four entrants. The club selected the poster of 11-year-old Arya Rupasinghe as the one to come forward to District Cabinet. Her entry will now go forward

to the Multiple District 202 competition. A copy of her poster, "Dare to Dream" is printed in this edition of J-Times.

I commend this competition to clubs for next year to involve and support a younger group of people.

e continue to receive enquiries about the transfer of funds from a Lions Club Charitable Trust, into a Club's Administration Account; the enquiry usually requests an indication of what percentage of trust funds can be transferred.

THE ANSWER IS ABSOLUTELY NONE AT ALL to shift funds in such a manner is fraud, fraud is
a crime, punishable in the fashion that all
fraudulent activities can be dealt with.
Furthermore, if trustees are guilty of interfering
with the proper governance of a trust - which
would be the case if they agreed to this tomfoolery - they risk breaching other sections of the
Crimes Act, notably Section 229. Again these
misdemeanours carry heavy penalties.

The only non-beneficiary movements from a charitable trust are genuine costs incurred in fundraising which includes third party costs and genuine, recorded, documented and non-inflated reimbursements, such records to be retained by the trustees. Those internal cost reimbursements can

only be claimed and paid to individual members and it is over to them whether or not they donate them to the club, but there is no obligation for them to do so.

Any club via its Administration Account has **NO CLAIM** on any charitable funds; expenses of a trust for which the club receives accounts must be paid by the trust to avoid other nasties such as conflict of interest accusations.

Crimes Act 1961 No 43 (as at 13 April 2023), Public Act 229 Criminal breach of trust – New Zealand Legislation

229 Criminal breach of trust

- (1) Everyone is guilty of a criminal breach of trust who, as a trustee of any trust, dishonestly and contrary to the terms of that trust, converts anything to any use not authorised by the trust.
- (2) Every trustee who commits a criminal breach of trust is liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 7 years.

Lake **O**hau Fire Restoration

n 4 November 2020 a devastating wildfire swept through the Ōhau Village destroying half of the one hundred houses in the village. A connection developed between Lions clubs, led by Waiareka Valley and Lake Tekapo Lions, and permanent residents of the village; at an initial meeting, on 22 November 2020, it was mooted to establish a Community Hub and plant propagation unit on a piece of Council land within the village as a memorial to the fire and to those who worked to combat it.

Plan one became plan two, with the Hub and Unit being sited on Department of Conservation land between the village and Lake Middleton.

When it was found that buildings could not be put on this land the focus shifted to making a series of pathways and planting trees in a three-hectare block of DOC land between the Ōhau Village and Lake Middleton. A number of the residents had been passionately involved in tree planting in the area in previous years, so this was seen as a being an appropriate compromise. The Lions Clubs' funding became available in time to enable Waiareka Valley and Lake Tekapo Lions to organise a two-day working bee in the last weekend in October 2023 – almost three years after the fire to further develop the pathways.



Both the village residents and the Lions club members have survived considerable frustration to get to this point, but the resilience and determination shown by the village residents encouraged the Lions to maintain focus on the project. The portion of the money raised by Lions that was not utilized on the pathways is dedicated to trees which will be planted in the reserve in the autumn of 2024. The trees are being sourced from local stock or raised from local seeds.

LIONS CLUBS OF NEW ZEALAND

Recognise the loss caused by the wildfire of October 4, 2020 – with 5000 hectares of land burnt, 48 houses destroyed, but no lives lost – along with the work of Fire and Emergency New Zealand and the Waitaki District Council before (particularly installing the alarm system, without which lives could have been lost), during and after it. Lions

Clubs, led by the Waiareka Valley ands Lake Tekapo Lions, have coordinated with Lake Ohau Community Hub Charitable Trust to further develop the pathways and provide trees in the Avoca Native Forest Project.

Thanks to Road Metals for sponsoring gravel for the pathways.

The Ōhau community has really taken to these paths - they get it - that it is about both renewal and the way forward after the wildfire, literally and symbolically. These paths at our community's doorstep also take us closer to nature - to the birds and native planting activities in Avoca Forest that everyone will enjoy for years to come. Whether it's walking dogs or seeing the grandkids run around the new forest paths safely away from the roads, everyone who experiences them loves them and shares them.

They hope Lions will return from time to time to see this Ōhau community forest grow around these paths.

or over 100 years Lions have been noted worldwide for their humanitarian efforts. Working together, Lions identify the world's most crucial unmet health and humanitarian needs and provide support from our Foundation (LCIF).

Between July 2022 and May 2023, LCIF awarded 726 humanitarian related grants totaling in excess of US\$14 million dollars throughout the world.

Some examples of these are as follows:

- USA US\$10,000 was granted for Buddy Bags for sick children.
- Canada US\$5,825 for the purchase of Kids vision screeners.
- Brazil received US\$43,930 for equipment for a blood bank.
- Mexico received US\$9,654 for wheelchairs and walking canes for disabled people.
- Argentina received US\$100,000 to build a school for the hearing impaired.
- Costa Rico received \$37,500 for a corneal topography machine.
- Italy Leos to raise awareness of HIV and Aids US\$1,850.
- England US\$27,559 to create a reflection garden at a Children's Hospital.
- Sweden US\$40,066 to establish a health centre in rural Somalia.
- Poland US\$17,200 to purchase an ambulance for a children's hospice.
- Switzerland US\$340,552 to provide for clean drinking water in Tajikistan.
- Republic of Korea US\$2,505 for heating gas for low-income elderly.
- India \$US83,333 to help equip a cardiac lab at a TB Hospital.
- Australia US\$12,580 to upgrade a mobile shower and laundry unit for the homeless.

AND here in New Zealand we received \$US43,277 to equip a hospital paediatric ICU Unit. It is through our humanitarian efforts that we can enhance the day-to-day lives around the world which is only made possible by Lions clubs and individual Lions donating to the Foundation on a regular basis.

On behalf of LCIF I extend to you a Merry Christmas and a big thank you to 202J Clubs and individuals that have donated to the Foundation in this Lions year. I would like to encourage those who haven't given as yet, to please consider making your donation in the New Year.
