



# **DG Garth's Greetings**

ith 2024 now upon us we have six months of the current Lions year left. One of the key projects launched early in the year is Mission NZ 10,000. This is the aim of Multiple District 202 to increase our Lions membership so that we can serve more people. It is, of course, part of our plan to increase our worldwide membership to 1.5 million Lions. At the moment our District membership remains static with 1155 Lions - one more than what started the year with. Unfortunately, we cannot say the same in respect of our Multiple District 202 with membership now 152 members less than what we started the year at. Membership growth is the responsibility of all of us.

# Rowing for Life Aotearoa 2023 – 2024

This major fundraiser is now underway with the aim of raising \$5 million for distribution equally to Surf Lifesaving NZ, Child Cancer, Starship Foundation and our own Lions Clubs NZ Cancer Trust. Follow progress on the row's website, <u>www.rowingforlife.nz</u>. The first stretch from Stewart Island to Bluff was completed in December and the row from Bluff north commences on 10<sup>th</sup> February. I commend this project to all clubs and Lions. Fundraising can take place anywhere at any time – not just places where the rowers come ashore. GST Coordinator Gerald Burgess and SVDG Mike Wingfield are currently organising our involvement. Please support them.

#### Lions Clubs NZ Cancer Trust

The Truist is now raising funds to get the first mobile screening unit established. As of

December four, of our District's clubs have donated to the Trust. Please consider this worthy national project when looking at causes to support. Once the Trust has raised \$NZ160,000 it will apply to the Lions Clubs International Foundation for a matching grant of \$US100,000.

## **Decorated Cake Competition....**

### for District 202 J Child Mobility Fund.

### 2024 theme: "The Diamond on the Plains"

#### Who can enter?

Any Lion or person with a connection to a Lion (is a relation of a Lion....wife, husband, mother, father-in-law, mother-in-law, aunt, uncle, cousin, brother, sister, son, daughter, daughter-in-law, son -in-law, grandparent. etc) through a sponsoring Lions club (clubs can sponsor more than one entry)

#### When?

Cakes to be displayed at the  $5^{th} - 7^{th}$  April Convention in Ashburton. Voting is done during the Saturday business session by placing a gold coin (or notes) in the container supplied for each cake.

#### How are donations made?

- Via gold coin (or notes)
- Via auction (how about clubs donating many \$\$\$\$ as their contribution instead of individuals bidding small amounts?) There is another trophy for the cake which sells at the highest \$ value

#### Suggested cake size?

Approximately the dimensions of a Lions Christmas cake (you can use one if you like)

#### Judging?

- Done on the decoration only, not the cake
- 50% from voting
- and 50% by an independent judge

#### Trophies?

- Best decorated cake
- Highest \$\$\$\$ amount at auction



### **Convention Voting.....**

- Clubs must be financial to vote all annual dues must have been paid in full at least 15 days before the start of Convention. Clubs & voting delegates must be in good standing.
- Voting delegates must be accredited by the close off time on the morning of the Business Session (6 April 2024).
- The standard club constitution states:

"... club shall be entitled to send its full quota of delegates to all such conventions and have power to pay the necessary expenses of such delegates attending such conventions. This club shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district ... to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in this club, or major fraction thereof, of this club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held... The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members."

- Therefore as at 1 March 2024 a club (with members at least a year & a day) of 16 will
  receive two votes as will one of 24 members, those votes being either the club
  appointed voting delegates or a club appointed substitute (the alternate) for an
  appointed delegate who has to withdraw.
- Any members joining after 28 February 2023 are not counted towards the club's eligible voting numbers.
- 202J Past International Directors have full delegate status independent of their club's delegate quota
- PDGs may be selected as delegates by their club but don't have a voting right by separate entitlement.
- The standard club constitution states: "Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote of his/her choice for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote of his/her choice on each question submitted to, the respective convention."

Therefore, voting decisions are the choice of the voting delegates during the Convention business session, not decided by the club.



## LIONS CLUB RE-REGISTRATION UNDER THE NEW INCORPORATED SOCIETIES ACT

Under the new legislation all incorporated societies need to re-register their Club. Re-registration is open until April 2026.

Our MD Legal Counsel Alan Knowsley is liaising with a club to pass what he considers are the appropriate changes and then file that as a **test case**.

Once that **test case** has gone through the registration process, he will let all clubs know the wording they will need to adopt for their club constitutions going forward.

Please hold off re-registration until you receive notification from your Multiple District.

Globally, of the 400,000 thousand children diagnosed with cancer each year, nine out of every 10 of those children live in low-income countries. Sadly only 30% of those children will survive the disease compared to children in the developed countries where the survival rate is 80%.

As Child Cancer is one of our Lions' major areas of focus, we have established partnerships which have enabled Lions to provide greater service for those diagnosed. One such partnership is with Global Hope, a programme at the Texas Children's Hospital, which helps address the huge discrepancies in outcomes from Child Cancer in

developing countries. While much work is still to be done to improve access to drugs, treatments etc, Global Hope is a transformational initiative that is improving the standard of care for children with cancer in Africa.

Since the inception of our partnerships thousands of children have been effectively treated and hundreds of health care professionals trained in the field of Paediatric Oncology.

All Lions and Lions clubs are asked to consider supporting such partnerships and our ongoing work at improving the outcomes for children with cancer worldwide, by donating to our Foundation, LCIF. Our support helps to relieve the pain and suffering of those innocent lives and helps to improve the quality of treatment for these children and provide support for their families.

From July 2022 to June 2023, LCIF awarded 23 childhood cancer related grants totaling US\$1.4 million.

- This has helped to provide equipment for a Brazilian Childhood cancer hospital.
- In Mexico a grant provided equipment to make oncology wigs.
- Chile received a grant to provide equipment for an oncology rehabilitation room.
- Paraguay constructed a hospital wing for children with cancer.
- Taiwan provided equipment for a children's brain tumor testing lab.
- In both India and Nepal funds received help construct a children's cancer support centre. *"Where there is a need, there is a Lion"*

uring the summer holidays, I was lucky enough to attend the NZ Lions International Youth Camp 23-24. The camp took place in Ngamuwahine Lodge in Tauranga from the 27th of December 2023 until the 6th of January 2024. I had never been to Tauranga before or flown on my own, which made the 10-day camp even more exciting.

The first few days felt quite long, with early starts, and late nights and because we were all strangers and trying to settle into the camp as well as getting to know everyone. This soon changed to the days flying by way too quickly and being too short!

Over the camp, we did so much! We participated in various teambuilding activities, and team sports, hiked Mount Maunganui, went on great road trips, went black water rafting, hiked the Ngamuwahine Track, found some eels, had guest speakers and much more.



On day two, we were split into three groups, green, orange and blue and did some team-building activities. I was in the green group and we had a competition of who can decorate their flag the best and with the best meaning behind it. Team Green won! And we got bragging rights for the day.





My favourite day was day three, the day trip to Rotorua. We explored the 3D Art Gallery, went bowling in an arcade, visited the Polynesian hot spa pools and I had my first hangi held at the Mitai Maori Village.

Before every meal at camp, we had the beautiful tradition of having one youth member say grace or a prayer of thanks for the food. I found this to be a lovely opportunity to learn about other people's religions and gods.

At the camp, we had 16 youth, including myself, aged 17-21. Even though I was one of the younger ones I personally never felt that age hindered any of the connections that I created on camp. Although it was a small group of us, it was lovely as we tried to get the time to get to know and understand each other.

Naturally going into camp I knew that I would connect faster with the other youths from New Zealand. This is why I made a conscious effort to get to know the international youth more. Getting to learn about different cultures from around the world was a definite camp highlight for me.

We had international youth from Brazil, Japan, Australia, Italy, and Germany. One of the international youth members, from Italy showed us how to make homemade Italian linguine pasta; it was stunning. The Japanese youth taught us how to make origami hearts and cranes and on New Year's I wore a white top and blue pants but for a reason. My new Brazilian friend taught me that in Brazilian culture if you wear certain colours on New Year's it will determine how your year will go. Wearing white meant that you would experience peace in the new year and blue would bring harmony.

Camp taught me so much about the world and also about myself. Alongside other youth on this camp, I learned to push myself to my limits, like by getting to the highest level of the flying fox. I am still so proud of myself for stepping out of my comfort zone and trying all of the opportunities given to us on camp. I was surprised at the amount of random things that I could relate to with the international youth. Little things like in the girls' bathroom on New Year's, two of the international girls, one from Brazil and the other from Japan and I were swapping and sharing each other's makeup.




