s mentioned last month the DG household is slap bang in the middle of Convention madness. Just two weeks ago we were at Silverstream Retreat, Lower Hutt, for District M's Convention. DG Anne started the weekend off with a Mayoral reception at the same venue as a yearlong Bodgies and Bogans exhibition. Simply fascinating, neither DG nor wife will own up to which genre they associate. Their keynote (Saturday night) speaker related his experience of taking part in an experimental T-cell cancer treatment project and the \$\$\$ cost to him as a participant.

Convention is just around the corner April 4-6. I reckon a rush of registrations will alleviate the nerves of the organizing committee.

I have been impressed with the enthusiasm of Lions in many parts of the North Island. However, they do not really match "J"; close yes, but not match. Lions seem to have a number of community services that are common to all Districts. Lions man gates/direct traffic at shows, or race meetings, do BBQs for crowds big and small; Bunnings appear to be one of the most popular sites M10 a close second. In fact, some clubs are at these venues six times a month. All Districts report their resources are being stretched with demands on time, manpower and financial assistance by struggling communities.

We struggle as well but **Be Proud District "J".** Proud of the service activities you undertake in our communities, proud of the causes you support and very proud of your membership gains.

Overall, we are on track to meet the 2024-25 net gain of 30 new members.

Some membership targets have moved a bit, the Mosgiel rebuild is now focused on members from the education sector allowing us to consider a specialty club. Like many places, new Leo clubs are not easy to get off the ground but an approach by an Ashburton school has great promise, needless to say a big push is underway. Ashburton Pakeke have offered to be the sponsoring club, thank you.





LCIF is committed to empowering Lions to undertake large-scale projects that pave the way for a sustainable and healthy future for generations to come. Convention Voting.....

- Clubs must be financial to vote all annual dues must have been paid in full at least 15 days before the start of Convention. Clubs & voting delegates must be in good standing.
- Voting delegates must be accredited by the close off time on the morning of the Business Session (5 April 2025).
- The standard club constitution states:

"Inasmuch as all district matters are presented and adopted at the district (single, suband multiple) conventions, this club shall be entitled to send its full quota of delegates to all such conventions and have power to pay the necessary expenses of such delegates attending such conventions. This club shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district (single or sub- and multiple) to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in this club, or major fraction thereof, of this club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held, provided, however, that this club shall be entitled to at least one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members."

- Therefore as at 1 March 2025 a club (with members at least a year & a day) of 16 will
 receive two votes as will one of 24 members, those votes being either the club
 appointed voting delegates or a club appointed substitute (the alternate) for an
 appointed delegate who has to withdraw.
- Any members joining after 28 February 2024 are not counted towards the club's eligible voting numbers.
- 202J Past International Directors have full delegate status independent of their club's delegate quota
- PDGs may be selected as delegates by their club but don't have a voting right by separate entitlement.
- The standard club constitution states: "Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote of his/her choice for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote of his/her choice on each question submitted to, the respective convention."

Therefore, voting decisions are the choice of the voting delegates during the Convention business session, not decided by the club.

Reminder

- Club board nominations are made in March and elections held in April.
- Board positions must be reported on the Lion Portal by 15 May.
