Following the Conventions:

I have written and spoken before about how much I enjoy **visiting clubs around the district** to see the variety of ways clubs are responding to the needs of their communities. But just as much, I have been pleased to be invited to **other Districts' Conventions**. I take seriously the opportunity to represent 202e District (that's all of you) in another district and, in the process, learn about even more really **worthwhile activities and projects** being undertaken by Lions throughout our Multiple Districts (New Zealand and the Pacific Islands.

It's a great opportunity, too, to discuss with fellow District Governors the **sort of issues that are arising** in our separate districts and look for common solutions to some of those issues.

One of the biggest issues at the moment, for example, is **finding members to take on roles** at club level (Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, Marcoms, Membership Chairs, Project Leaders, etc), as this is the time when roles continue on or change. The whole idea in any volunteer organisation is to **change those personnel regularly**, so that the load is shared and does not fall on the same person or people all the time. The ideal is to have each person in the club taking on **at least one area of responsibility**, however small that might be – that way **everyone has an investment** in the running of the club and knows that they are playing a part in making a difference in their community.

The same applies at District level – there are still roles to be taken on this coming year (ask District Governor Elect Bernie Walls), including the role of **Second Vice District Governor**, to work as part of the District Governor team and form a "line of succession" in leadership.

So if you can see someone in your club that you think would be good as a leader of some sort, **Just Ask** them to be nominated. And if you yourself are asked or nominated, please think seriously about it – there are **lots of ways we can serve as Lions**, so grab the opportunity when it comes up.

These roles in clubs are **not meant to be onerous**, and you don't need to be an "expert" to take one of them on – no-one comes "ready-made" for their role.

That's why we have **training available for all roles** within Lions. Elsewhere in this Bulletin, you will see the invitation to one of our **Club Leaders' Workshops** being held around the district so that there will one close enough for everyone to get to.

These workshops are **informal and interactive**, and they are a great way to hear shared ideas about the possibilities within each role – (Vice) President, Secretary, Treasurer, Membership person, Marketing person, Director, Projects Leader, etc.

So if you are a new, or continuing, club leader in this coming Lions year, come to a Workshop near you and be **energised**, **inspired**, **revitalised!!**

National Volunteer Week is 15 to 21 June. This is a time to celebrate and promote volunteering throughout New Zealand. Also in June is World Environment Day which is on 5 June-the theme this year is putting an end to plastic pollution. One of our global causes is to find ways to protect the environment.

The District Global Action Team would like to encourage all clubs to think about what environment project they could undertake in June. This could be a clean up of a beach, river, reserve, town centre or any other environment focused project. Please choose a date, start time and finish time that suits your club.

A recent Volunteering New Zealand survey uncovered that 25% of people nationally stated that they did not volunteer with an organisation either because they had not been asked to do so or because they did not know how to get involved. An environment project is a great way to get people involved and potentially find new members for your club.

Think about how you could attract people to volunteer their time to assist with your environment project. The event could be promoted using social media, local newspapers, community radio, community groups such as residents' associations, Conservation Volunteers New Zealand, school newsletters, and community notice boards in libraries, supermarkets etc. You might want to approach large local businesses to see if their staff want to help. Many businesses are community minded and provide their staff with time off for volunteering. It is up to each club to decide how much and what type of marketing they want to undertake.

Marketing should commence 3-4 weeks before the event. I recommend including an RSVP to a person in your club. This will give you an indication of how many people are likely to assist. If your environment project needs to be postponed due to adverse weather, you can contact everyone who sent an RSVP. Obtaining contact details also provides a data base of volunteers. This can be used to advise people of future projects your club would like help with.

You could run a free BBQ or provide a coffee at the end of your environment project. This is a great way to thank volunteers, tell them about Lions and invite them to upcoming projects or a club meeting.

There is likely to be a lot of advertising building up to National Volunteer Week including a national social media campaign run by Lions at Multiple District level. We want Lions to be top of mind as people think about who they want to volunteer for. Please contact me if anyone wants help organising or promoting an environment project.

Pride of Lions in Bangkok (2008)



NEN Marion McWha touched down on foreign soil it was to represent New Zealand at an international Lions convention. The retired schoolteacher travelled to Bangkok with her husband lan and 37 other representatives from Lions clubs around the country to attend the 91st international convention early this month. Mrs McWha, a member of the Wigram Lions Club, said it was the twelve convention she had attended. Around 30,000 Lions members from around the world met for the annual AGM, where a new international president was elected. Mrs McWha has had a lengthy involvement with the Lions after her husband first joined 35 years ago (52 now). Back then, women could not be Lions so a Lioness club was formed, which she joined. Later she joined the Riccarton Lions club and became a member of the district cabinet, which she governed in 2006 - 2007. Now at her Club, she helps recruit new members through her job as "tail twister". Mrs McWha said the couple's lengthly involvement with Lions had lead them to travel all over the world, including America, Australia and Hong Kong. "We just love it," she said. "It's what you can get out of it, like friends from all over the world and what you can give back."

In the Lions Club of Papaoeia, Palmerston North, I found a group dedicated to helping the community by cutting firewood, picking up pinecones, catering for events, and having fun together. In short, I found a tribe, or should it be a pride, to which I could belong.

When I moved to Kaikoura, I quickly searched for another club and found two Lions clubs, one for men and one for women. The Lions Club of Kaikoura Seaward welcomed me, and it was wonderful to join others committed to community service. Being a Lion has taught me that teamwork can accomplish great things. I've taken on roles I never imagined, organised events successfully, and gained experience and personal growth through leadership positions. I've been club president three times, edited the club's monthly bulletin now and many times over the years, and have recently taken on the role of secretary.

None of my achievements were done alone. In Lions, members always support each other. I've received help from experienced members who encourage everyone to try new roles. That's the essence of a community.

My first contact with Lions was in 2002 when I had my car stolen, and the president of Akaroa Lions asked me for a list of the school's cooking gear that was in my boot so they could replace it. He said that was the kind of thing the club did.

After we moved to Foxton three years later, I was invited to a meeting of the Foxton Te Awahau Lions by a lovely lady at Westpac bank. I felt honoured as I believed Lion's clubs to be something special, and shortly after became a member.

I took on the position of chairperson from 2008 - 2010. Firstly and on behalf of LCIF, our Congratulations to PDG Paul O'Connor and his Team on the recent 'unveiling' of the Mobile Skin Cancer Research bus, which was welcomed at the District's Cabinet meeting at Hanmer Springs in March.

LCIF are pleased to have contributed in excess of NZD100,000 towards the cost of this vehicle.

District E have another funding application in the pipeline, that being the supply of 3 water tanks in the Wakefield, Nelson area for emergency and especially for fire fighting use. Whilst LCIF on going seeks funding from our Clubs- they also continue to provide valuable monies to assist in Lions based community projects.

Clubs are invited to identify where Lions can assist within their communities with support of LCIF funding. In several recent projects, initial monies have been sought from our Lloyd Morgan Lions Clubs Charitable Trust, with LCIF also contributing.

For the financial year ended 30/6/24, our Constitutional Area received grants of USD543, 848 –albeit the smallest contribution made amongst out 8 Constitutional Areas.

A copy of LCIF's financial reports for the year ended 30/6/24 is available on line to view the balance sheet and Area grants and income donated.

Finally, and with only 3 months before our financial years ends, our District has only donated USD13377 of our Goal of USD30400. This is no doubt reflective in that less than 50% of our Clubs have donated towards our International Humanitarian Trust.



AG RECOVERY: This is a new project for us and looks like it will be a good fundraiser. President Kevin organised this event as one of the myriad of things he is currently undertaking for Amberley Lions. The project was two days a week over a 4-week period requiring 3 people on shift. Several of our members have been extremely helpful taking on several shifts to make this work. A big thanks to them.

This was a pilot project in North Canterbury collaborating with local partners to collect farm plastic at the designated drop off location at the Waipara Winehouse, previously Waipara Springs. A big thanks to Waipara Winery for hosting this event on their grounds.

We have just had some preliminary tonnages back for the bale wrap collected... just shy of 70 tonnes (69.14T) over the four weeks, in addition to the other plastic that was collected. Keeping this out of the landfill is a great result. It will be shipped overseas, cleaned, then made into pellets to be reused.

As this was a successful trial, it is likely that it will be done again here, and throughout the country.

(as an ex farmer, trying to be environmentally friendly with the huge tonnage of baleage/silage plastic we created - we were playing with environmental fire, burn it and the toxic fumes result, bury it and it was just hidden for another generation to find and deal with - what else could we do other than have starving animals in the winter?! - well done Amberley Lions.)

Ellesmere Lions Men's Health Night "A ROARING SUCCESS"



Ellesmere Lions hosted a Men's Health Night on 2 April at Ellesmere College, Leeston.

The event attracted an audience of close to 300, with attendees travelling from as far away as Methven and Rangiora. Our guests were treated to a diverse range of presentations spanning prostate health, cardiovascular disease, symptoms and treatment for bowel cancer, sleep and sleep apnoea, skin cancers and getting the most out of your GP. Speakers were delighted with the level of community engagement.

Memorable moments from the evening included a real time video demonstration of a heart valve replacement by Dr James Blake; upfront advice from Prof Frank Frizelle regarding symptoms of

bowel cancer – "Check your shit!" (for blood and consistency); and advice from Dr Sue Fowlie on how NOT to treat skin lesions (with an angle grinder). Ellesmere Lion, Geoff McClennan, provided an entertaining cameo with his real-life story of "How attending a Men's Health Night saved my life". Many attendees took the opportunity to try out the automated blood pressure monitor brought along by Dr Andrew Rawstron from the Leeston Medical Centre; and to explore the Lions skin cancer screening bus which was on display at the start of the evening. Key take home messages repeated through the evening included: Don't ignore/dismiss symptoms when they appear; Early recognition and treatment of disease has a much better outcome; A good relationship with your GP is the best first line of defence.



Attracting Younger Members to Lions:

Breaking Barriers & Building the Future.

My name is Hamish, and I have just completed **five years in Lions at only 27 years old**. Last year, I had the honour of serving as **Club President of Fitzherbert Lions Club PN**, and this year, I've stepped into the role of **Zone Chair for 202D**, a position I'll also hold next year. Lions has given me incredible opportunities for growth, leadership, and community impact, and it has now opened the doors to the world for me.

In April, I will be heading on my **first-ever international trip**, traveling to Brisbane to complete the **Faculty Development Institute (FDI) Course**. It's an exciting step in my Lions journey, and I hope to connect with more of you along the way. Barriers for Younger Members

Time Commitments – Expecting perfect attendance excludes busy people. Flexibility is key.

High Fees – Cost can be a barrier for young families. Clubs should consider payment options.

Too Much Tradition – Outdated customs can push younger members away. Balance tradition with new ideas.

Lack of Impact – Younger people want to see real results. Show measurable outcomes to keep them engaged.

Resistance to Change – Clubs must be open to new ideas or risk losing future members.

Not Family-Friendly – Many young members have kids. Include family-oriented activities.

How to Attract & Retain Younger Members

Make Meetings Flexible – Fewer meetings, more service-based involvement.

Give Them a Role - Small leadership tasks help new members feel included.

Highlight Impact – Show results so members see the difference they're making.

Encourage Open-Mindedness – Say "Let's try it" instead of "We've never done that".

Meet Them Where They Are – Ask: What do you care about? How can Lions help?

Create a Welcoming Culture – New members should feel valued, not like outsiders.

Face Reality – Without younger members, clubs will fold. Growth is essential.

Building a Stronger Future

Lions must **evolve** while staying true to our mission. Clubs that **embrace change**, **empower new voices**, **and focus** on impact will thrive. The best way to **preserve our legacy isn't holding onto the past—it's building for the future**. ♥ 💆
