I believe the **Volunteer (Service) Journey** is the answer to these important questions. **It is our MISSION STATEMENT IN ACTION**

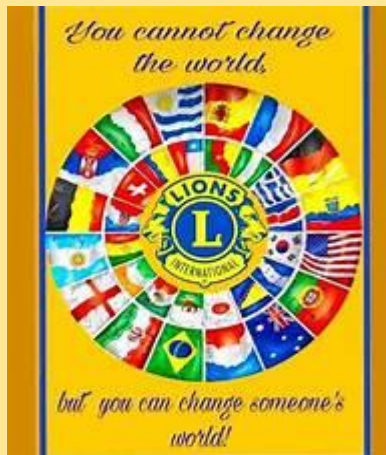
If I ask you all the question "What is Service?" I get varying responses. But if I ask the question "What is Volunteering?" this word is far more familiar and is easier to explain and talk about.

Progress Update No 4

Cromwell Lions Club are pleased to advise the concrete for the helipad has been laid.

The boxing and final site preparation for concrete was carried out by Fulton Hogan, Complete Reinforcing, MenzShed, S&B Civil and HeavyTrax.

Concrete placing was another team effort by J R Concrete Construction, Allied Concrete and Central Concrete Pumps.

The only work remaining is the installation of an illuminated windsock, fencing, signage, electrical and landscaping.

The project has been progressing very smoothly, with each stage as planned and on time, in a typical friendly Cromwell style.

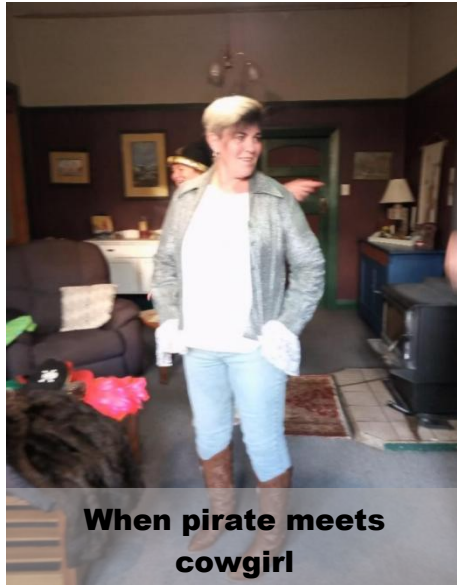

Winton Lions Project Helipad



New Winton helipad build set for takeoff

A "LIFE-SAVING" project in Winton is set to fly off thanks to the efforts of its community.

Construction of the new Central Southland helipad will begin on Monday after its members raised \$100,000 needed for the project.

Helipad Project Committee spokesman John McHugh was pleased and proud as the project would be off the ground about a year after its inception.

Winton Centennial Park or the rugby ground where the emergency helicopters land is not fit for purpose.

"The rugby ground gets very wet in winter and I was down there one night watching a transfer and they had to use two fire trucks to light up the area as well as our volunteer ambulance people to cart the patient across the wet field to meet the helicopter.

"And I thought 'well surely we can do something better than that'."

As a life member from the Lions Club, he decided to bring the project to the table, which was promptly accepted, and from that it took a whole community effort to raise the \$100,000 which included fundraisers, exhibitions and even a bike ride.

"The community absolutely got behind it. And we're lucky we've got a wonderful community in the area. And they've backed us to the tune that we are now in the situation where next Monday, hopefully we start digging."

The new helipad, which will cater for the whole Central Southland area, will be built on land next to the New World supermarket, owned by Southland District Council.

Mr McHugh said they would lease from the council for a "token fee".

The project involved digging the ground, refilling with solid material for the construction of the helipad, footpaths and access ways so appliances and the patients could have easy access to it.

It would also have lighting installed and a low security fence to secure the safety of the area, Mr McHugh said.

"There has been times that the ambulances had to take people to Invercargill to meet the helicopter, if it's too wet or anything like that and speaking with the Southland Rescue Helicopters, who will be the main people flying or providers for it, they believe that it will get busier.

"We all say we hope we never need it, but if we need it, it will be here and this project just proves that the community is so great — If the community believe in something, they will get behind you and back it."

The helipad is expected to be ready by April and an official opening is expected in May.

Thanks for reaching out! The LEO Club has had a productive start to Term 2, and we're excited to share what we've accomplished so far, along with a few upcoming initiatives currently in the works.

To kick things off, Team Kiwi ran a BBQ fundraiser on the 4th of April during our annual House Day at James Hargest College, which was a huge success. The event brought in a great crowd, created a lively atmosphere, and helped raise funds to support future LEO Club projects.

Looking ahead, we've got several exciting events on the horizon. Team Mohau is currently organising this year's Pink Shirt Day event, set for Friday, 16 May.
