KINDNESS MATTERS AWARD



Mental Health and Well-Being September 2025

One of the new Causes we now have is Mental Health and Well-Being and Awareness Month is September. In many ways, it is also one of the hardest Causes to talk about. The aim is for Lions and Leos to become a shining a light on mental health and well-being by raising awareness, serving their communities and advocating for positive change. What we want to do is to de-fuse the stigma and myths of Mental Health and Well-Being.

For many of us, when we talk about mental health we're really talking about mental illness or mental distress. But, like physical health, mental health is something we all have and we need to look after it. There is no health without mental health. Good mental health boosts our physical health, creates resilience, and helps us to feel happy, confident and secure. It doesn't mean we don't experience tough times – it doesn't even mean that we don't experience mental illness or distress! BUT with the right support and environments we can sustain lives worth living.

Mental health facts

Mental health is made up of a variety of factors, including our emotional, physical, psychological and social well-being. To best address the need for improved mental health, we must first understand the facts* — and challenges — surrounding mental health.

25% Increase in rates of anxiety and depression since 2020.

- ✓ Invest time in relationships. Connecting with people and investing in good relationships are important for a person's mental health and well-being. Keep in touch give them a call, send a text or organise a catch-up with them.
- Lions and Leos can promote the importance of mental health and well-being by providing meaningful opportunities for people to get involved in an organisation such as OURS.
- ✓ Doing things with others. Encouraging someone to volunteer as a Lion and get involved in our activities/projects as this can make a difference to how that person views their life. Think about their hobbies, their strengths and build up a rapport.

If we really want to make sure New Zealanders have lives worth living we need to make sure we all have opportunities to connect, grow, learn and build good mental health and wellbeing.

AED Support in Wyndham - A Community Effort Rooted in Compassion

In February 2025, a serious medical emergency unfolded at Menzies College in Wyndham when a young student collapsed during a school athletics event. Immediate CPR was performed, and the student was airlifted by the Otago Southland Rescue Helicopter to Dunedin Hospital, later transferred to Auckland for specialist care. The incident, covered by the Otago Daily Times on 2 May 2025, highlighted the critical importance of timely access to Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs).

A need was identified in the community, particularly by one of the club members who is the owner of the Four Square. Emma, who is also the current President of The Wyndham Pioneer Lions Club, played a pivotal role in driving this project forward Her leadership and dedication were instrumental in bringing the

vision to life. She took immediate action by offering 24/7 access to her store's AED. While generous, this still placed limitations on the family's freedom and peace of mind.

Bringing the matter to the Club's attention, she prompted a deeper discussion around AED accessibility in the Wyndham and Edendale areas. The Club reviewed local AED availability via the AED Locations App and conducted on-the-ground checks to verify access and identify service gaps. It was clear that more needed to be done—particularly for vulnerable individuals and families in high-risk situations.

The Directors of the Wyndham Pioneer Lions Club met formally and unanimously agreed to fund a portable AED unit for the family to use on a loan basis. This initiative was not only a timely response to an urgent need but also a broader investment in community safety and resilience.

To ensure the arrangement was both secure and legally sound, the Club secretary reached out to Liz Henry of Mee & Henry Law, who is well known in the region for her support of AED placements. Liz generously donated her time to draft a formal agreement that would protect both the family and the Club. She also offered expert advice on AED models, recommending an upgraded unit with enhanced memory and a durable protective case—ensuring longevity and reliability.

Mee & Henry Law went a step further by contributing funds to make the upgrade possible. Thanks to an existing credit with the NZ Red Cross, the device was swiftly procured, and the Club contributed \$2,400 toward its cost.

On 27 May 2025, three members of the Wyndham Pioneer Lions Club had the privilege of presenting the AED

directly to the family at their home. The exchange was deeply moving and heartfelt—a reminder of the true spirit behind our motto, "We Serve."

This project represents the very best of community collaboration: a local business owner's compassion, a club's determination to take meaningful action, and a legal professional's generous contribution of time and resources. It wasn't just about delivering a medical device—it was about restoring confidence, enhancing mobility, and demonstrating what can be achieved when we come together in service and care for one another.

This is kindness in action. This is Lions.

A new defibrillator will help a young man with a heart condition — which nearly killed him — to travel freely, after a generous donation by a community group.

Alden Cottrell, 13, has catecholeminergic polymorphic ventricular techycardia (CPVT), which caused him to have a cardiac arrest earlier in the year during a school event.

Alden was running the final leg of a relay race at Menzles College in February when he collegeed.

Quick work by school staff and emergency services kept him alive, followed by six weeks in hospital.

The Wyndham Ploneer Lions Club heard about the incident, and after a meeting of its committee, agreed to buy an automatic external defibriliator (AED) device for Alden and his family.

The AED cost about \$3500 but could be the difference between life and death, especially in rural communities.

Club president Emme Stuck seld for a family such as Alden's, who might need an AED at any time, the \$3500 purchase was a lifesaver.

"We've got a lot within the community, but none which are accessible 24/7.

"Bo with Aiden's need, they can have one with them, rather than find one on the go during an emergency."

Law firm Mee & Henry Law helped with getting the right model and fundralsing.

The device now sits with the family as extra security against a medical event.

Alden's mum JP Cattrell said it was a massive comfort, especially considering how remote the family was from immediate medical help.

"With living rural, if something were to happen at home, first responders are quick, but being able to administer a shock as soon as possible is one of the most comforting things for us," she said.

Mrs Cottrell, who also has CPVT, could not express her grathude to the club and the lew firm enough.

"There's no words, it's just such a massive gift and it means life, and so can mine.

"It's immeasurable




Honouring Excellence


Ian has maintained a Strong interest in Review and Evaluation of all projects Lions have been involved with.




This year's contributions included:

Melvin Jones Fellowship Awarded to Lion John Kidd




