Our district has a long history of service in our communities. Every club I has visited so far this year has clearly demonstrated this, and this flows into the communities we serve. Of course, this is where we get new members from. They see great service, they help out with the projects we do and they receive, first hand, the benefits to their communities. So far this year, we have gained 29 new members, but we have dropped 23. Sadly, members will leave our organisation for a variety of reasons. Death, leaving the area, to name a few. But the ones we could have saved, leave for the following reasons:

Time commitment did not meet expectations

This could be that the club asked someone to be TOO involved and the member was overwhelmed, or it may be the club just didn't do anything.

Not a good use of time

This could be attributed to the member feeling they didn't make an impact during their time with the club. This may be a club that does a lot of fundraising, and supporting others, but not really sharing the story of impact back to their members very well.

It could also be a member who has a passion for a certain type of service, and the club does something different.

Club conflict

This can be broken into 2 categories – conflict with officers, or "other conflict". Conflict with officers could be a member wanting to share ideas, but ideas are getting shot down by the officers, or just a disagreement on the direction the club should be going. "Other conflict" would be things where members didn't feel welcome or feel heard. It could also be meetings where there is arguing back and forth, which obviously would be something people would want to leave.

This is where Retention plays a very important role in all clubs. Emphasis needs to put on mentorship, club development workshops, recognition of member achievements and ensuring each Lion feels valued and engaged. There is a lot of good information and upskilling on "Learn" in the Portal.

Please take the time and avail yourselves of some great information so we can all try to stop the stem of members leaving.

Also, this shows how valuable Officer Workshops are. Please, make sure someone from your club attends the next one offered in your area of our district.

Lap The Map for DIABETES

It is predicted that within the next 20 years, the number of people with type 2 diabetes will increase by 70-90%.

This World Diabetes Month, November, we are calling all New Zealanders to 'Lap the Map' for diabetes prevention. Can you help us walk a combined distance surpassing the perimeter of the New Zealand coastline (15,000km). Lions Clubs across the country will be hosting family friendly walks and community events to promote a healthy lifestyle and raise awareness of diabetes in New Zealand. It doesn't matter how far you walk or run, it's about being involved, getting active and moving together. All funds raised will go towards diabetes awareness,

prevention and research. Diabetes New Zealand tell us New Zealand has a serious and growing type 2 diabetes problem.

Of these people Māori, Pacific and Asian will be worst affected. Allowing this to occur will have a hugely detrimental impact on the wellbeing of our people, but also on the sustainability of our health system and economy.



Operational Guidelines for Lions LAP The M

- Every club being encouraged to participate, either in their own community or combined Zones.
- Every club to report the length of their Walk and number of participants, with a combined distance travelled to exceed New Zealand's coastline perimeter (15,000 kms)
- Clubs encouraged to photograph or video their activity and post to Lions New Zealand Face Book, so that it gives the impression of a "relay around New Zealand"
- The "signature activity" will be a self-paced "low level" walk of varying distances as set in each location, but not exceeding 5 kms, with "time of day" also to suit local conditions where: o Families can push children in their stroller, kids can ride their bikes or skateboard etc.
- o Everyone can participate
- o Each participating Club or group to have its own "Baton or Mascot" to complete the journey (The opportunity to promote Fun plus Participation – maybe a prize for best theme).
- o All to Register before commencement, and to receive a simple 'Certificate of Achievement' on completion (format to be supplied) – PLUS all offered a complimentary "Diabetes Type 2 Self-Assessment Test"
- o Have "donation tins" firmly on display, with entry being a "Gold Coin" donation
- o Have a raffle (fresh fruit and vegie tray).
- o All funds raised on the day to be applied to Lions diabetes awareness
- o Encourage Clubs to seek donations/sponsorship before the event, and encourage Schools, Community Organisations, Sporting Clubs etc. to enter a Team
- o Partner with local Diabetes and other organisations/foundations to provide support/information booths/ healthy cooking demonstrations/nutritionists/Yoga/Tai Chi or other simple exercise regimes
- o Cold drinks (water or juice) for sale
- o Food available for sale sausage sizzle, snack pack of carrot & celery sticks AND MOST IMPORTANTLY Conduct a proactive Lions Awareness and Recruitment Display to attract and recruit new members. Let's all have a fun day promoting a healthy lifestyle

Many of you will know that the Kaikoura Club Lions Seats project was selected as the district 202E winner and Multiple District winner for the Top Club Service Project Award. This project was then submitted to Constitutional Area level. At the ANZI Forum on the Gold Coast, the Kaikoura

Club project was announced as runner up for the entire Constitutional Area. Congratulations to everyone who has been involved with this fantastic project.

The Kindness Matters Service Award recognises an outstanding Lion or Leo club service project that supports one or more of our global causes. The award is given to an innovative and creative service project that had a positive impact in the community. This year I received 6 nominations from clubs for the district award. They were all excellent projects. The winning project was the Kaikoura Seaward club Knitting for Newborns project. This involved knitting woollen garments such as singlets, beanies and cardigans. The garments were distributed to the Kaikoura birthing unit who gave them to the baby's mother. This project has been submitted to Multiple District as our district's nomination for the New Zealand Kindness Matters Service Award.

Kai Ora Fellow Lions. I would like to Introduce myself, my name is Andrew Cook and I'm part of the Rangiora Lions Club. I was born in Chch. Woman's Hospital, moved out to Rangiora Hospital. This Is What A Well Oiled Firewood Working Bee Looks Like! When Glenmark Lions get on the end of a Wood Splitter.

A mountain of 30tonnes of logs had been ringed up weeks before, waiting like a challenge only Glenmark Lions could tackle. Five wood splitters were lined up, and 18 hardy volunteers arrived for the 1:00pm kick - off. But before anyone could so much as pull a starter cord, there was the all important Health & Safety briefing - structured, clear, and delivered with the usual thoroughness. With boxes ticked, the real action began. (this is so well worth a read:)



The splitters roared into life, and so did the banter. Within the hour the first drinks break was called - 5 mins. only, just enough time to wet the whistle before heading back into the fray. By three there's already muttering about another o'clock, the word "smoko" had never sounded sweeter.





By 4:30pm, it was all over. Thirty tonnes of logs had been transformed into close to 50 c.m. of firewood, neatly stacked and ready to keep homes warm next winter. Eighteen tired but satisfied volunteers stood back, admired the pile, and hoped someone else would carry the aches tomorrow. There's already muttering of yet another splitting day later in the year to keep up with demand. If so, bring it on - because days like this are proof that with the right mix of teamwork, humour, and smoko, there's not much this club can't get through. Heather Pankhurst and her crew came to the rescue with pikelets, Wood Splitters' fruit loaf, and tea and coffee (... and use of the Pankhurst grounds.) It didn't take long before engines - both mechanical and human - were fuelled up and ready for the last push. (this has to be what one would call a good yarn over smoko.)

Do You Know What Cuddle Hearts Are?

One of Selwyn Lions Club regular projects is our monthly sewing bee for 'Cuddle Hearts'.

Cuddle Hearts were founded by Lisa Paget of Rolleston and the service touched OUR hearts.

NICU babies in incubators often cant be held or breastfed, missing out on important contact and bonding with Mother, Father and Whanau. Cuddle hearts allow Mum and baby to be together when physically separated. The Mum places one clean fabric heart inside her bra to absorb her unique scent. This is then placed under the baby in the incubator to help strengthen the bond with Mum.

Each new Mother gets a pack of 6 hearts, so a large number are constantly needed by NICU. Our members get tremendous pleasure coming together once a month with cutters cutting, sewing machines whirring and trimmers snipping to produce between 100 to 150 sweet little hearts for this worthy cause.



Privileged Membership

- an article by Tony Hanning PID 202J Constitution & By-Laws Chair.

This short piece about a very special category of membership - Privileged Membership.

Lions clubs have seven membership categories available to fit a range of different circumstances. They are set out in our Constitution and By-laws.

The category that most of us belong to is Active membership which entitles us to all the rights and privileges of membership of a Lions club, and places obligations on us too.

Sometimes our willingness and ability to keep up with the demands of Active membership is affected by age, failing ill-health, a diminished ability to attend meetings regularly, and take part in projects that require a reasonably high level of physical fitness. This is the very situation that Privileged membership is designed to address.

Unfortunately, some members feel guilty when they can n0 longer keep up with the pace of life and Lions, nor participate fully in the life of a Club, and think, therefore, that they should resign, or mistakenly request Member at Large status. This is a category intended for temporary situations such as transfer to another location, or short-term employment interruptions to attendance. It has to be reviewed by the Board every six-months.

When Active membership becomes a burden because of advanced age or ill-health, clubs are encouraged to offer Privileged membership to Lions who have provided long and good service to their club and community.

The official By-laws put it like this: "PRIVILEGED: A member of this club what has been a Lion fifteen or more years, who, because of illness, infirmities, advanced age or other legitimate reason, as determined by the board of directors of this club, must relinquish his/her active status. A Privileged member shall pay such dues as the local club may charge, which dues shall include district and international dues. He/she shall have the right to vote and be entitled to all other privileges of membership except the right to hold club, district or international office, This membership category shall be included in the club delegate formula calculation."

It is good to see some of our clubs recognising the availability of this category of membership and using it positively to retain the membership of valuable Lions who have, as a result of their long and dedicated experience, a wealth of knowledge and wisdom to share.

It is our privilege to have them as members, and it is their right to be offered Privileged membership as and when circumstances dictate.




