



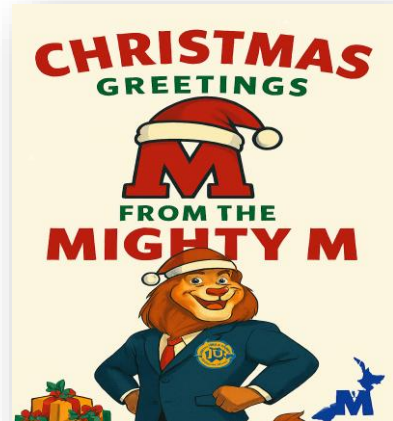

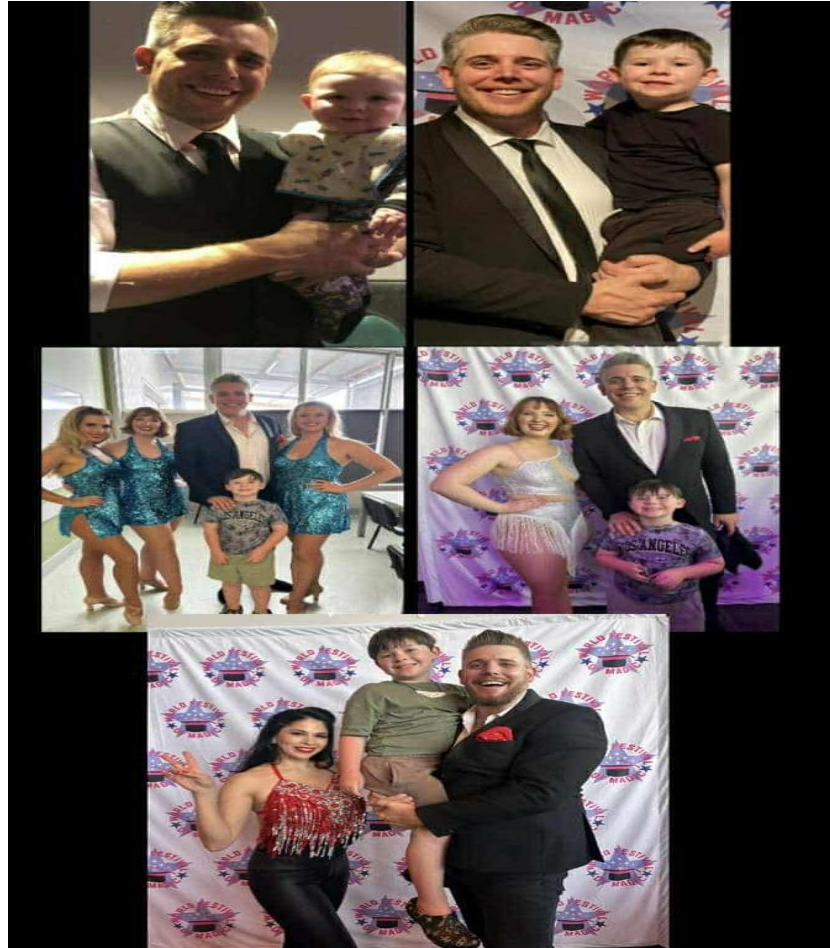
He is interested in medical imaging so we may see him back at Matai Research in the future.

Honouring Legacy of Service: Max Clark Awarded the Melvin Jones Fellowship

For more than four decades, the joyful whistle of the Lions Club of Aotea Railway miniature train has echoed through our community — a sound that represents not just fun and family, but also dedication, vision, and service. Behind that enduring legacy stands **Max Clark**, a Lions Clubs member whose tireless commitment has recently been recognised with one of the highest honours in Lionism: the **Melvin Jones Fellowship**.



A Journey That Began 45 Years Ago Forty-five years ago, when the idea of a miniature railway was just a dream, Max Clark rolled up his sleeves and began turning vision into reality. With characteristic humility and perseverance, he led the creation of what would become 'the train' of the **Lions Club of Aotea Railway** — a project built not for profit, but for the pure joy and benefit of the community.

What began as a modest local initiative has grown into a cherished attraction, bringing laughter to generations of families, sparking an interest in engineering and railways among young people, and serving as a beacon of Lions Club values: **service, fellowship, and community spirit.**

The Melvin Jones Fellowship: A Symbol of Exceptional Service The **Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF)**, named after the founder of Lions Clubs International, is one of the most prestigious recognitions a Lion can receive. By awarding Max Clark this fellowship, the Lions Club not only honours his personal contributions but also the countless hours, ingenuity, and leadership he invested into creating something lasting — something that continues to bring joy and connection to the people of Aotea and beyond.

A Legacy That Keeps on Rolling Even today, the Lions Club of Aotea Railway continues to operate thanks to volunteers inspired by Max's example. Each ride is a reminder of what can be achieved when one person's passion is matched with community support and the Lions' spirit of service. As the miniature train circles its track, carrying excited passengers of all ages, it also carries forward Max's legacy — a legacy now forever recognised through the Melvin Jones Fellowship.

Celebrating a True Lion, The Lions Club of Aotea Railway proudly celebrates **Max Clark**, a member whose dedication has left tracks that will never fade. His story reminds us that service doesn't just build communities — it builds memories, joy, and pride that last for generations.



Congratulations, Max, on this well-deserved honour, and thank you for showing us all what it means to live the Lions' creed: *"Where there's a need, there's a Lion."*

Golf for Good Paraparaumu opens at Mazengarb Reserve



Golf for Good Paraparaumu was officially opened on 29 November 2025 by Kapiti Mayor Janet Holborow, alongside the **Lions Clubs of Kapiti** and Rotary who spearheaded the project.

The opening ceremony at Mazengarb Reserve celebrated the launch of

the new 18-hole mini golf course, designed as a community enterprise where all profits go back into local initiatives. **(pictured Vic Hewson, Kapiti Rotary and PDG Rex Bullard, Waikanae Lions teeing off).**

Mayor Holborrow commented; ***"Eighteen months after Rotary and Lions first sought a site, Golf for Good opened today thanks to their efforts and strong community support."***

The course is run by Projects for Good Charitable Trust, which was established jointly by Rotary and Lions, and all ticket profits will be donated to charities in the Kāpiti community.

Kapiti Coast District Council provided the land for the course and supported the project in other ways, including lighting.

The establishment and facilities were fully funded by community sponsorship, with 18 individual hole sponsors and 35 local organisations donating services free of charge.

Lions and Rotary also raised funds through events such as a book fair and a charity auction night that brought in over \$30,000.

Altogether the project represents about \$800,000 in cash and in-kind contributions raised in a short time".

Camp Quality

Recently Camp Quality Wellington/Central Districts completed our training weekend. This only happens because of the countless hours that have been put in by staff and the training team to set up for these two days at Nga Tawa Diocese College Marton. All staff support staff and perspective companions are required to complete this yearly training.

The **2026 Summer Camp**, which is to be held from **7–12 January** at New Plymouth Boys High, is well under way with most activities and meals in place. We have contacted local Lions Clubs in 202D for some hands-on assistance.

From **12-14 September**, a group of senior campers came together at El Rancho in Waikanae for the Camp Quality Winter Camp. Twenty-one campers who attended were supported by a team of companions, staff and a nurse.

This camp provided an excellent opportunity for our senior campers to reconnect with old friends and make new ones and have fun trying out new activities together. El Rancho has many onsite activities, these were well received by all, also the reconnection time was great value too. Camp was over far too soon for everyone, but they have started the countdown until they see each other again at summer camp!

Mental Health and Wellbeing The newest Global Cause of Lions International

The fundraising project for sensory rooms and kits in Wellington Hospitals Foundation area has begun, led by the Silverstream Lions Club. We have had several Clubs commit to donating money and an account have been set up to keep this separate and traceable. The idea is still to put the money into a District account and, depending on the amount, apply for a matching grant to maximise our impact. Regular updates on the account balance and expenditures will be shared with all contributing Clubs.

Regular contact with the Wellington Hospital Foundation will be ongoing and plans to visit clubs and zone meetings are underway to promote this District project. Other things related to this mental health & wellness portfolio include a request from National Office to participate in a National Project created by our MD Marcom Team and the MD GST Coordinator:

'To help raise awareness, we'd love for members to record a short video (30–60 seconds) on one of the following topics that many people struggle with.'

All around us we are seeing examples of people experiencing mental health challenges, such as anxiety or depression. We all know someone that a kind word, a listening ear or a shared morning tea would help. Please support our district project to provide sensory modulations kits for out-patient's homes and mental health facility rooms.

Our funds began with a donation from the Wellington Club and will soon increase thanks to craft fair proceeds. Donations can be sent to our District Trust Accounts and as it builds, we will find ways to increase that fund.

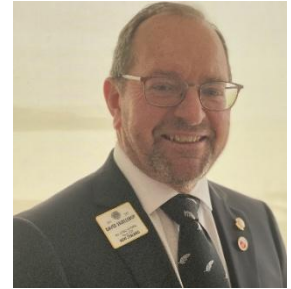
Find ways to help this project and restore purpose to those in need.
