FROM FIRST VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR DEBBIE

Reflections on My Journey as First Vice District Governor of Lions:
Including ANZI in Gold Coast

Personal insights from experiences so far this year.

The past few months have been a transformative time in my journey, stepping into the role of First Vice District Governor (FVDG) within the Lions organisation. From local club meetings to attending the ANZI (Australia, New Zealand, Indonesia, and Islands) Forum in Gold Coast, my experience thus far has been both challenging and deeply rewarding. I am honoured to share my personal reflections, key learnings, and memorable moments from this unique leadership role.

Assuming the responsibilities of FVDG was both an honour and a significant step up from my previous Lions' roles. The position required a balance of listening, and practical problem-solving. I quickly learned that leading at the district level meant not just overseeing club activities but also acting as a bridge between local members and the broader goals of Lions Clubs International.



One of the most rewarding aspects is connecting with the diverse Lions clubs within our district. Each club has its own strengths and distinctive culture. Visiting clubs, attending their meetings, and participating in service activities allowed us all to witness first-hand the passion and commitment Lions have for making a difference in their communities.

These visits also highlight the importance of open communication and supporting clubs in overcoming challenges, whether related to membership, project funding, or leadership development. This is why it is important for each club within our district to grab the opportunity to have cabinet members visit and not only take back concerns you all may have but share the amazing things you all are achieving in your communities.

The ANZI Forum in Gold Coast: A Highlight Among the many experiences, attending the ANZI Forum in Gold Coast stands out as a cornerstone event. The forum not only provided a platform for networking with fellow Lions from across Australia, New Zealand, Indonesia, and the Islands, but also offered enriching workshops and discussions on leadership, innovation, and service. I was inspired by the spirit of unity and collective purpose we all share. Hearing stories of projects from other districts not only helped my perspective but offered valuable insights that I aim to bring back to our own district.

Throughout my time so far, I have learned several important lessons:

- **Adaptability is Key:** Every club and region faces unique challenges, being flexible in our approach can help build trust and foster amazing collaboration.
- **Listening Matters:** Some of the best ideas and solutions have come from simply listening to members' experiences and concerns.
- **Learning:** The ANZI forum and other leadership training sessions have only show me how important the continuous learning, both for myself and those around me is.
- **Empowering Others:** True leadership lies in empowering others to step up and take ownership of their individual efforts; this helps with ensuring the long-term sustainability of our service efforts.

The journey has not been without its challenges. People are all different and we all have differing opinions working through these can sometimes be challenging but I have found that the training that I have had and resources that are available including those around you everything comes together in the end. I have found that transparency, regular communication, and celebrating small wins go a long way in overcoming obstacles and maintaining ones worth and the success of the clubs within our district.

As I continue in my role and look toward the future, I am energised by the opportunities to further strengthen our district's impact. The connections made at the ANZI forum in Gold Coast will serve as valuable networks for collaboration. I am committed to fostering an environment where every Lion feels valued and equipped to do the best they can, and where our collective efforts create lasting positive change.

Serving as First Vice District Governor so far has been a profound learning experience, filled with meaningful relationships, personal growth, and a deepened commitment to the values of Lions. The journey is ongoing, but I am immensely grateful for the trust placed in me and the support I have

received from fellow Lions at every level. I look forward to the challenges and triumphs that lie ahead, confident that together, we can continue to make a real difference.

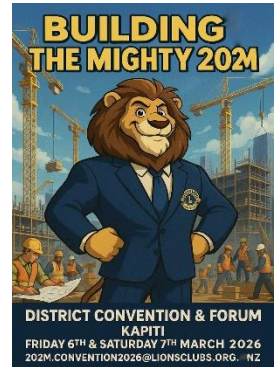

MARKETING 101 – IS YOUR CLUB KEEPING ITS SERVICE A SECRET?

It's up to your club to unlock itself to the community. It's up to you to share your Lions pride.

It takes 7 Contacts to get a new Customer:

In business it is a well-known fact that it can take up to seven contacts before gaining a new customer. This contact can take many different forms and so it is with Lions. Here are some simple methods that you can use to promote your lions' club to your community.

- Always wear your Lions Membership pin on your lapel or clothing.
- Have a Lions Club Emblem on your car rear windscreen
- Wear your club uniform when attending club meetings and on projects
- Fly a Lions Flag when on a project in the Community.
- Have a club brochure with details about your club activities that can be handed out to the public at stalls and events that your club runs.
- Design some simple business cards that members can hand out. Have a simple message on these and a who to contact. Include your Facebook or website address, or if you don't have one put the New Zealand Website www.lionsclubs.org.nz so interested parties can find out more about what we do.
- Create a Facebook Page that regularly promotes your club activities including guest speakers. Share your Facebook page to as many other community pages as you can find in your area.
- Follow the NZ Lions and our District 202M Facebook pages for ideas of items of interest to add to your club's page.
- Complete a club environmental project that is well noticed by members of the public and ask for volunteers to help tidy the area up or help with planting etc.
- Use the local Community Noticeboards to place well produced and noticeable signs about your club projects. Ensure that these signs have the Lions Logo prominently displayed with contact details.
- Use these same noticeboards to carry a simple message about Lions such as
Have Fun – Join our Lions Club
Make a Difference in our Community – Join our Lions Club
Make new friends - Join our Lions Club

Give the public a reason to join your lions club and do not expect them to know what Lions is all about – they don't.

- Have your club set a Marketing Budget of at least 10% of your income to promote your projects and what your club has achieved.

If we want to grow our membership, then we need to be promoting Lions, and what it means to be a Lion in everything that we do. Keeping your club a secret will not grow membership. Do not assume that the general members of the public know what the Lions organisation is or what we do. Many think that we are a bunch of grey-haired old men who belong to a secret hand-shake society – it is up to each and everyone of us to dispel that myth at every opportunity.

DISTRICT 202M ENVIRONMENTAL PHOTOGRAPHIC CONTEST RULES

District 202M Lions Clubs members may enter an original, unaltered, black and white or colour (without people) in the Environmental Photographic Contest. Photos must be taken within the 202M District area, and are to be entered under one of the following categories:

- Animal Life
- Plant Life
- Landscape (urban or rural), including ecological damage or restoration
- Weather phenomenon

The impartial judging of photos should focus on originality, artistic merit and portrayal of the environmental theme.

Photos should measure 20.3 x 25.4cm (8" x 10"). Photos can be cropped but not digitally enhanced.

The contestant's name, Lions Club, and the entry category must be entered on the back of each photo, in such a manner that the quality of the photo is not impacted.

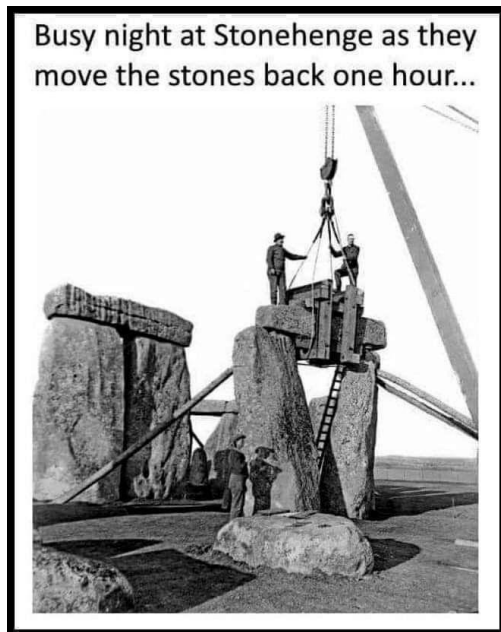
The contestant may include a title for the photo, however not compulsory.

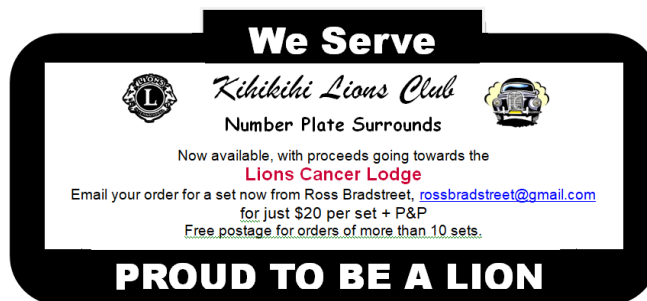

4. Each entry must be submitted to the Awards Chairperson via email rexbullard@xtra.co.nz by 30th September to be considered.
5. Entry should be submitted by email of up to 500 words describing the entry and additional supporting documents, information, photos, media reports etc. A presentation of all materials in a PowerPoint format is encouraged but not essential.
6. Supporting information is restricted to that which can be supplied by electronic means.
7. Information should be provided that demonstrates how the criteria for judging has been met.
8. The District Governor will appoint a judging panel to decide the District winners.
9. Awards and certificates for the winners will be presented at the District Convention.
10. Entry to the competition gives the District & Multiple District permission to use any of the information and photos contained in the entry for publicity purposes.
