Thank you to the clubs who completed applications for the Top Club Service Project Award. This Award recognises an innovative and inspiring club project completed by an individual Lions or Leos Club in this current Lions year or is an ongoing project.

A committee was formed to decide the winning project. I am pleased to announce that Selwyn Club's cuddle hearts project is the district winner. Cuddle hearts help babies and their parents have scent connection when they are apart. About 1000 families in the last 2 years have received cuddle hearts from Selwyn Club. This project was submitted to Multiple District as our district entry.

At the Multiple District convention, it was announced that cuddle hearts is the runner up project for New Zealand. Congratulations to Selwyn Club. The national winner is Winton club for their emergency service helipad project.

National Volunteer Week will be held during 14 to 20 June. This is a time to celebrate and promote volunteering throughout New Zealand. The theme this year is "your year to volunteer." We can take advantage of the media articles about Volunteer Week by inviting non-Lions to volunteer for a club project. I suggest deciding upon a project that would be suitable for additional people to join your club members. World Environment Day is on 5 June so you could organise an environment project. Your project can be advertised via social media, local newspapers, community notice boards etc to invite people to join in.

A recent Volunteering New Zealand survey said 25% of people do not volunteer because they had not been asked or because they did not know how to get involved. Asking people to assist with a project means more can be achieved, increases the Lions profile and could result in new members for your club. A free BBQ at the end of a project is a great way to thank volunteers, tell them about Lions and invite them to upcoming projects or a club meeting.

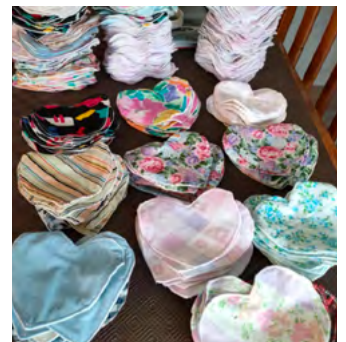


Lisa Paget - Founder of Cuddle Hearts for NICU, Christchurch was a guest speaker at a Selwyn Lions Social Meeting.



Approx. 1000 babies each year go through the Christchurch Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). Smell is one of the first senses to develop. Approx. 3,500-4,000 Cuddle Hearts are required annually to meet the need in Christchurch alone.

Cuddle Hearts are lovingly hand-made to share the smell between a parent and their pepi/baby. They help whanau feel close to each other when apart. They can provide a calming influence on the pepi, just like a hug from their whanau.



The Selwyn Lions members were so taken with this talk that they decided to help and almost two years later they are still helping with this project on the first Tuesday of every month. (a Slide snippet)



Why I Became a Lion

After 28 years serving my country - and finishing my Army career as the sixth Sergeant Major of the Army - I thought I knew what service meant. But on the day I hung up my uniform, a retired Colonel pulled me aside and said, "You should consider joining Lions." I had no idea what Lions did, but I trusted the man, so I went along to the Johnsonville Lions Club with him.

That single decision opened the door to a new chapter of service - this time, not to the nation, but to the community.

When my family and I moved back to Christchurch, I found the Halswell Lions and threw myself into what Lions do best: helping others. One of my first major projects was establishing the Halswell ANZAC Day Commemoration at the beautiful Halswell Memorial.

That project became my introduction to leading Lions initiatives, and it remains one of the things I'm most proud of.

Thirty - three years later, I'm still here - still serving, still leading, still believing in the power of community. I've served alongside fourteen District Governors, including my own term in 2020 – 2021, and I've lived by the motto that has guided me through both military and Lions life: **Lead by example.**

In 2019, at the New Zealand Multiple District Convention in Blenheim, the Australian Lions presented an idea they'd been running successfully in Western Australia for two decades: a **Mobile Free Skin Cancer Screening Service**. The challenged someone in New Zealand to pick it up and make it happen.

I stepped forward - not because it was easy, but because it mattered.

My military leadership and Lions experience had prepared me to build a team, navigate the sceptics, and push through the long haul of fundraising and planning. After six years of effort, the **Lions Clubs Cancer Trust** was born. Our first mobile screening vehicle launched in March 2025, and the second is already on its way for the North Island.

The results speak for themselves. In just 12 months, **996** people were screened. **275** were referred to their GP - a staggering 27% . Lions Clubs NZ are saving lives. If anyone ever asks why I'm a Lion, that's a pretty good answer.

But beyond the national projects and the big milestones, what keeps me grounded is my own community. Leading the Halswell ANZAC Day committee - working with the Residents Association, community leaders, and volunteers - reminds me every year why service matters. It's a privilege to stand with my community, honour our history, and help shape our future.

**That's why I became a Lion.
And that's why I'm still one.**

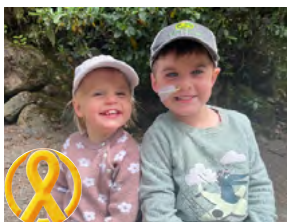

In a world of instant messages, Zoom calls, and meetings you can attend in your slippers, it's a fair question: Are Lions Conventions still important?

After all, for many years District Conventions have been a cornerstone of Lionism - part meeting, part reunion, part "I haven't seen you since last year but you haven't changed a bit!"

Yet, as we wrap up another convention, some may have noticed... the queues are a little shorter. The crowd a little lighter. The supper table perhaps slightly less competitive.

So - what's changed?

The Purpose (Still Going Strong)

At their heart, Conventions remain one of the few times Lions from across the district come together in one place - not just to meet, but to reconnect.

They're where friendships are strengthened, ideas are shared, and clubs realise they're part of something much bigger than their own patch.

Yes, there's business to be done - AGMs, discussions, decisions - the nuts and bolts that keep Lions moving forward. But there's also laughter, storytelling, and the occasional "remember when..." that goes slightly longer than scheduled.

The Real Question ...

Maybe the question isn't "Are Conventions still important?"

Because Conventions are more than agendas and minutes. They're a chance to recharge the batteries, swap ideas, celebrate wins, and remind ourselves why we joined in the first place.

They're where Lionism comes to life - not on a screen, but in handshakes, conversations, and shared purpose.

The Bottom Line:

At the end of the day, Conventions remind us of something simple but powerful.

We may serve in our own communities...

But we belong to something much bigger.

And that's still worth turning up for.

Key Preparation Strategies and Resources

Identify Future Leaders: Look for members, including new or younger Lions, who show potential and initiative. Involve them in committees or smaller roles (e.g., Lion Tamer) to build confidence and investment.

Emerging Lions Leadership Institute (ELLI): This 3-day institute prepares Lions who have not yet served as club president for future leadership roles. ELLI focuses on change management, mentoring, and strengthening club operations.

Succession Planning: Start early to identify and prepare new leaders.

A successful transition involves mentoring by the previous leader for at least 6 months to ensure continuity.

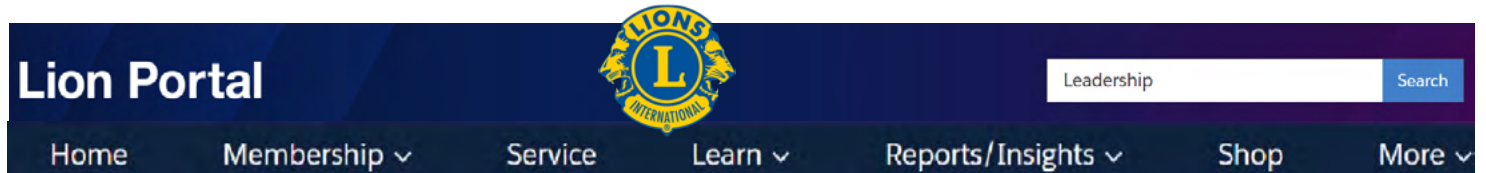
Lions Learning Center (LLC): Access online interactive courses for leadership development, including goal setting, conflict resolution, and meeting management.

Global Membership Approach (GMA): Utilize the 4-step process (Build a Team, Build a Vision, Build a Plan, Build Success) to create a strategic, sustainable club structure.

Club Officer Training: Incoming officers (President, Secretary, Treasurer) should **complete the blended** learning training—online modules followed by in-person instructor-led sessions.

Mentoring Program: Pair new leaders with experienced past presidents or active members to provide guidance, knowledge transfer, and encouragement.

Why Do Leos Have An Advisory Panel?

The LCI Leo Club Advisory Panel acts as the official liaison between Leo/Lion members and Lions Clubs International (LCI), focusing on enhancing the Leo Program through feedback, communication, and strategic planning.

The panel represents constitutional areas to improve Leo initiatives, advocate for growth, and mentor young leaders, with members hosting webinars and advising on international initiatives.

'The Leo Advisory Panellists (2) are selected from each Constitutional area annually, a year in advance. One Leo (either Alpha or Omega), and one Lion or Leo Lion' - Wayne Paulin.

Leo Clubs are youth organizations sponsored by Lions Clubs International for young people aged 12 to 30, focusing on Leadership, Experience, and Opportunity (LEO). Members, known as Leos, engage in community service, develop leadership skills, and gain professional experience, with Alpha clubs (ages 12-18) and Omega clubs (ages 18-30). Worldwide there are 7,700+ Leo Clubs - On a Mission to Serve.

What Leo Clubs Do:

Community Service: Actively serve their local communities through projects in health, education, and social issues.

Leadership Development: Develop skills through workshops, seminars, and running their own club activities.

Fundraising: Organize fundraising projects to support their initiatives.

Networking and Growth: Connect with other young people, gain professional experience, and build lifelong friendships.

Leos are considered "young Lions" and often work in partnership with their local, sponsoring Lions Club OR other clubs.

Malvern Lions Raise \$25,000 for the Sheffield Community Pool from their Annual Golf Tournament.

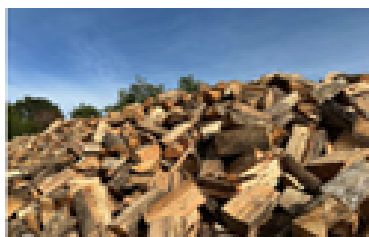
