Recognising Outstanding Service



As clubs start to plan for their change of officers it is an opportunity to recognise those lions who have given outstanding service to your club, district or community.

A Melvin Jones Fellow is the highest recognition that can be given to a Lion.

The **Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF)** is the backbone of our foundation.

In New Zealand a MJF is presented to those for whom a donation of US\$1,000 was made by others to LCIF, it's a tremendous contribution to humanity and to the legacy of our founder, Melvin Jones.

- There are more than 476,000 MJF recipients worldwide.
- There are more than 100,000 PMJF recipients worldwide.
- 100% of MJFs are invited to the annual luncheon held at our international convention.

Contributions for the MJF can be made by individuals (including non-Lions), clubs or districts. Donations may be in one sum or in installments. Melvin Jones Fellows receive a special lapel pin, a plaque, and a congratulatory letter.

If a club wishes to recognise a Lion who is already a Melvin Jones Fellow they can purchase a **Progressive Melvin Jones (PMJF)** pin which recognises additional service.

A number of clubs throughout our district already have sufficient credits to award a Melvin Jones Fellow at their next changeover night. Clubs should allow approximately three weeks for delivery of an MJF.

If you require any further information or would like to know who in your club has received an MJF or what funds you may have available, do not hesitate to contact me so that we can process your application in time for your change over.

3. To enable worthy youth activities to be recorded and made available for use by other clubs

202M - Public Relations & Communication Award

1. To recognise excellence, innovation and effectiveness in communications and Public Relations
2. To encourage clubs to use a range of medium to communicate with their members
3. To encourage clubs to use a range of medium to enhance public awareness and the reputation of Lions in the wider community

202M –Membership Growth, Retention & Extension Award

1. To encourage clubs to take responsibility for membership growth thus ensuring the future of Lions in District 202M and MD202
2. To encourage clubs to retain members by developing strategies that ensure existing members continue their membership
3. To encourage clubs to extend membership through chartering of new clubs and sponsoring of club branches Total Membership as recorded in the Lions Portal

Have you ever wondered about the origin of the Lloyd Morgan Lions Clubs Charitable Trust?

Lloyd Morgan OBE

It had been the custom, at the end of an International President's year, for his Multiple District to present him with the keys of a new car, usually a Cadillac.

International President Lloyd Morgan had always made it very clear that he did not want a gift.

When the Council Chairman of the day (1977-1978) Bob Collins was asked what Council were doing to recognise Lloyd's year as International President. Bob sought advice from the International Officers Support Committee (IOSC); the committee established to promote and support Lloyd Morgan's International President's campaign.

While driving to the Multiple District Convention in Dunedin, one of the committee members suggested that a Charitable Trust in Lloyd's name would be an appropriate way to recognise and honour Lloyd's year as International President.

There was general agreement, the concept was approved, and the Constitution and Rules of the Lloyd Morgan Lions Clubs Charitable Trust were drafted.

Then followed a huge fundraising campaign and Clubs around New Zealand collectively donated over \$36,000.

This was enough money to buy three Cadillacs and showed the huge support and high esteem the Lions of New Zealand had for Lloyd.

The \$36,000+ formed the initial capital and the Trust was presented to Lloyd Morgan at the final plenary session of the International Convention in Chicago in 1980.

Since 1980 the Trust has grown from the initial \$36,000 to over \$8.5 million and has distributed over \$6.5 million in grants. This has been achieved by the ongoing support of donations by clubs and the conservative management of the invested funds.

Last year 202M donated \$28,780 to the Lloyd Morgan Trust and received back \$77,000 in grants. I'd say that is an excellent return on our District's investment!

As of the end of April this year, our District has donated \$11,170 and received back **\$10,000 in grants.**

I am aware of a few potential grant applications and know clubs are sending in donations to receive recognitions to acknowledge their members at their Changeovers coming up in June and July.

Thank you for your ongoing support of the Lloyd Morgan Trust and please come to me for assistance in submitting grant applications to the Trust to support your projects.

Martinborough Lions

Success Is Measured In Many Ways Skyline Challenge Sets New Records

The Martinborough Lions Skyline Challenge ride, run and walk took place on Saturday 11 April 2026, one day before Cyclone Vaianu came our way.

"It was our biggest success again this year, no matter how you look at it," says one of the organisers from Martinborough Lions, Lee Quayle. "We raised more money than ever, beating this year's \$15,000 target to buy much-needed equipment for South Wairarapa Meals on Wheels. Timing was perfect; one day later and the cyclone would have forced us to cancel, whereas on Saturday we had ideal weather for some challenging exercise! And we went against the trend of many recent events by hosting our biggest ever number of participants, with over 300 attending for the very first time," adds Lee.

The new finishing chute and 'Challenge Badges' for everyone made finishing more satisfying for participants, with the new pedestrian area making things safer for them, their friends and family around the base camp.

We moved the date of the event this year so that it was held during school holidays and after Daylight Saving gave us a lighter start. "The lighter early-morning start definitely helped and we think that being in the school holidays made it easier for participants to bring their younger children," says Lee. "We will be looking to find a similar date next year," he adds.

Once again, the 10km walk attracted over a third of the total Skyline entries. This dedicated scenic walk took participants out the back of the historic Huangarua Station, dropping down through a bush section before climbing up to Camp David for a refreshing cool drink and wonderful views over the South Wairarapa and the vineyards in autumn bloom, before following the skyline ridge back to the start.

The 28km and 20km run/ride courses were again popular, and the 11km run/ride/walk attracted many people wanting a more modest challenge than the longer events provided.

This year all proceeds from the Skyline Challenge will be going to South Wairarapa Meals on Wheels Martinborough. "Meals on Wheels is a local charitable service, run by the Masonic Villages Trust from Wharekaka, providing meals to our elderly, disabled or rehabilitating residents in Featherston, Greytown and Martinborough," says Lee. "We're pleased to say that, because of the success of the fundraising for the event, we will be buying much-needed new kitchen and delivery equipment for Meals on Wheels," says Lee.

This community fundraising event organised by the Martinborough Lions would not be possible without the generous support of our principal sponsor, Green Jersey Explorer

Tours, and 20 other financial sponsors who have all contributed to this worthy cause and great event.

"And to all the other people who helped: not the least the over 30 volunteers and marshals who gave up their Saturday; suppliers of food, coffee, music and PA system, radio network, 4WD vehicles, the members of the committee: a huge THANK YOU all!" concludes Lee.

A company wishing to become a Benefactor can do so by donating NZ\$600. A Club or individual wishing to recognise an individual, family or Company as a Benefactor can do so by donating NZ\$300.



CLUBS

This recognition is available to all Lions, and Leo Clubs in M.D.202. A Club patch (as illustrated) is presented to clubs earning this award for the first time. Minimum donation is \$10.00 per Lion. In subsequent years on payment of \$10.00 per club member, a matching year tab is supplied to record continuing support for Your Trust.

FRIEND OF THE TRUST



Available to all Lions, a Lion's wife or partner, or those who wish to show their belief in the value of the Trust. A lapel pin is provided. This category (like the Honoured award) may be upgraded to higher honours which are recognised as soon as the minimum suggested donation is reached. Suggested donation for Friend NZ\$150.00.

HONOUR ROLL



The Honour Roll is maintained and is also displayed at M.D. conventions and electronically at District conventions, and is available to view on the Trust Website.

The Roll is open to all those who have been Lions, Leos or members of their families. The Roll of Honour perpetuates the memory of those who gave so much of themselves to their Club and to the welfare of others. When requested a framed certificate is presented. Suggested donation NZ\$100.00
