

# Cabinet Briefings.

At the time of writing this report there has been a considerable drop nationwide in the number of Grants requested in this Lions year which could be due to clubs having done their major legacy projects in the previous year or two. Only one club has made a request in this



District for funding and this was granted. New Plymouth Pakeke can now provide the much needed Ventilator costing over \$12,000 for Paramedics on 1<sup>st</sup> Response vehicle for St Johns Ambulance in New Plymouth. **Well done NP Pakeke.** 

When making applications clubs not only need to get the Application form and Criteria page from me, (by email or hard copy) but also need to have a discussion regarding the project and what information they are gathering. While our criteria states 9 copies need to be provided to me, I can also accept them by email provided everything is in order thus saving time and postage and can result in a more prompt response from the rest of the Grants Team.

Recognitions continue to generate funds and to date this year several new Friends of the Trust have been bestowed on members or partners, and there are more being processed right now, as well as Honoured and Life Membership. All clubs making their annual donations to The Trust can use these funds towards honouring their members, partners or any worthy member of the public, but only in the year the funds are donated. There are still clubs out there that are confused about this. Please call me if you need clarification.

Judging by the number of deceased Lions being recognised at District Conventions throughout NZ each year our Honour Roll ought to be filling up fast, but this is not the case. Clubs with deceased members should remember the number of years of service these Lions have given and not let them pass away without having their name recorded for posterity in the Honour Roll. Any additional donation to the Trust will ensure that this happens and a framed certificate can be made available for the club to present to family if required.. It has been a pleasure to have served as District Trustee for the last 4 years and I thank you for voting me in again for another 2 years. Mark and Neville, who have both been at the forefront of organising the ride for the whole 12 years, commented that running the event has been quite a buzz and the motorcyclists and local sponsors have all been most enthusiastic in supporting the Taranaki Community Rescue Helicopter.
