



MULTIPLE DISTRICT 202 59TH ANNUAL CONVENTION REPORT - 26 – 28TH APRIL 2019

With the convention being held in Blenheim it was a golden opportunity for many in 202E to attend. Last year it was in Palmerston North and next year it is in Whangarei.

This year saw some changes and a lot less formality. We attend for different reasons and experience things differently but overall it is hoped attendees will enjoy the fellowship, perhaps gain some new knowledge and feel empowered to recommitment and do better in their own communities.



Following a very short Maori welcome from Lion Bill Thomas, Friday night opened with the condensed memorial service honouring all Lions throughout New Zealand and the World, as well as partners who have passed in the last 12 months. A candle was lit for each District as well as Lions and partners worldwide. The candles remained lit all weekend which was a nice touch.

Following the obligatory VIP speakers, the Mayor and MP, local retired farmer and author Doug Avery ('The Resilient Farmer') spoke. A strong, humorous and entertaining speaker Doug had the audience totally engaged and shared some deep messages. Doug gave the analogy of the size of the front window in a car – how large and open to vision and possibilities it is compared with only rarely glancing back at the past in the much smaller rear vision mirror. Using the 4 C's - we need to be open and have the COURAGE to move forward, make the COMMITMENT to do so and through that build our CAPABILITY which ultimately will impact positively on our CONFIDENCE.

Saturday - started with the flag ceremony where 12 flags were paraded by local Leos which have a strong membership in Blenheim. Following a welcome by current Council Chairperson, Arvind Raman, it was announced that our own District Governor Helen Williams is the incoming Council Chair for 2019 – 2020. CC Arvind reminded us to develop an 'Attitude of Gratitude' towards each other, show kindness and following his theme to "Create Partnerships to Serve" within our communities.



The CA 7 International Director Juswan Tjoe, CC Litywati from Indonesia and CC Chris Howard from Australia also spoke over the weekend. A very informative speech was given by Jeff Arnett from LCIF. Similarly we heard addresses from 2 Australian Lions on their mobile free skin cancer screening van and a woman from the Southern Cochlear implant project.

In order to save costs the MD chairpersons' reports and financial statements were emailed to clubs earlier in March and not printed in the convention booklet. Unfortunately several delegates had not seen these reports so copies had to be hastily printed and shared.

The MD financial situation continues to be very tight with some carry over from previous years. However with very stringent controls, cut backs to programmes, and more being done at the office we should see a balanced result for the coming year. Unfortunately the printed word is expensive and hence the move to more digital forms of communication going forward. The remit to reinstate the Policy and Procedure manual (last updated 2002) was passed. Hence a lot of work is

needed to review before making this available through the new national website which is due to go live in June.

MD has to model its financial behaviour according to revenue base (membership dues) along with stringent control and monitoring processes. That said, membership is falling and is of grave concern. This year that meant a loss of \$100.000, 8 clubs closed, 377 new members were gained but there was a loss of 459 members to date. It was said we need to reinvent ourselves with new clubs, new members and new ideas.

The Plunket Foundation & Lions partnership raffle, which some of us may remember selling, had 100,000 tickets to sell, Lions sold 35,065 and all up only 43,678 tickets were sold. Plunket was very disappointed with our effort. Even so the Lions efforts netted \$100 thousand.




The selling of Lions Christmas Cakes is another potential money earner for clubs. Our convention bags all had a sizable hunk of cake which was enjoyed by all.

Sunday Seminars and Rededication Programme was enjoyed by many. Three clubs made presentations sharing how they increased their numbers in an informative interactive setting. The letter P is significant in the strategies shared: **Projects** (look for others to help), **Profile** (facebook



Personal hygiene, cooking and serving instructions

- If you have a cold, flu or diarrhoea within 48 hours of the BBQ or have sores or lesions on your hands, neck or head, contact your coordinator to organise/advise your replacement.
- Always use hand sanitiser before touching food, especially after going to the toilet, handling rubbish or touching animals.
- Use disposable gloves when handling food but remember disposable gloves don't stay clean so, if you are using them, change between activities e.g. after handling raw food and before handling cooked food.
- Do not touch any food if you are handling the money.
- Buy fresh food as close as possible to the time of the BBQ.
- Buy pre-cooked sausages and keep these in the chilly bin until ready for cooking.

LIONS CLUB OF PEGASUS TOWN

CHARITY FUN MUD RUN PROJECT

Sunday April 14th saw the culmination of 6 months planning come into effect when 119 entrants took part in the first mud run organised by the club.

Planning started on 6th August last year when a meeting with Greg Byrnes, General Manager of the Te Kohaka o Tuhaitara Trust resulted in the trust giving permission for the run to be built through the wetlands bordering along the Eastern edge of Pegasus.

A steering committee was set up, including members of the Lions Club of Rangiora. Applications to a number of Charitable Trusts and businesses saw most approaches turned down. However, we did obtain \$2,250 in cash donations, a months' advertising package worth \$800 and donations of services, so we had to ensure a close watch was kept on expenses.

The Te Kohaka o Tuhaitara Trust arranged for the course to be set out and 5 mud pits were dug. An obstacle using 8 x 3 metre long straw bales was also constructed.

It was found that Lions are not the only ones who leave registering for an event to the last moment. On Monday we only had 47 registrations but a rush of entries during the week saw us finish with 119 entries.

At 0730 members of the club and Rangiora Lions arrived and set up marquees for use as changing areas. The Lions Club of Woodend brought their BBQ trailer to cook sausages to give away. One of our members, who owns the Flat White Café, sent her mobile coffee van. Members of the Waikuku Surf Lifesaving Club arrived to act as course marshals and first aid personnel. Portable toilets arrived and we thought all was going well.

THE LIONS CLUB OF PEGASUS TOWN

Unfortunately, the low water table and lack of rain resulted in 2 of the mud pits being dry, rain on Friday and Saturday had drained away. Not to be beaten the Waikuku Volunteer Fire Brigade, who had organised water trucks for open air showers (decontamination units) went through and pumped water into the pits.

A number of entrants asked if it was to be an annual event which we hope it will be. The event raised around \$1,500 which will be used to help the Te Kohaka o Tutaihara Trust enhance the wetlands, the Waikuku Volunteer Fire Brigade, Waikuku Surf Lifesaving Club and St. John. A good effort on the part of a club with only 6 members.

This SPECIALTY Club is the newly formed NZ MOTORHOMING LIONS CLUB. Currently the Club is a branch of the Lions Club of Blenheim but will be looking to charter in the 2019/2020 Lions year.

There are many current and past members who have taken to the road either permanently or semi permanently. Being an "active" member of a Club can mean that you have to go at large if you are taking long periods off and most of us don't want to do this. We still want to be active Lions.

This is where the idea of the NZMLC came about. No matter where in the country you are you can belong to this Club and still be involved in serving your community.

The idea is that all members communicate via the internet. There are no formal meetings but you are kept informed of projects that might require some extra manpower and you would have the opportunity to participate.

How is this done? Well briefly

A Lions Club identifies that they are going to require additional help with a project or activity

They go online and complete a Request Form. This form will outline the project/activity; the number of additional people required; whether or not parking is available for a van/camper etc

The form goes to the NZMLC Secretary who will then advise all its members of the request.

Members who are in the area then have the opportunity to volunteer to assist

The volunteer hours are recorded with NZMLC

The last thing we want to do is to take current Lions away from their Clubs. What we do want to do though is retain members who would otherwise leave Lions, as well as recruiting new members from the vast number of motorhomers out there.

Specialty Clubs are a great way to get new members as these are people from similar backgrounds, occupations and interests who band together under the banner of Lions to serve their communities.

Remember that even though we are currently a branch of the Lions Club of Blenheim this Club is a national Club so anyone from anywhere in the country is welcome to join.

Health Tip for the Month:

Coping after a traumatic event. Courtesy of Seaward Lions Recommendations from the Health Department of New Zealand. Available on MOH web site.



After a traumatic event it is normal to feel distressed and to experience symptoms of stress e.g. trouble sleeping, feeling tense or irritable, repetitive thoughts of the event, feeling jumpy or easily startled, headaches, muscle pain or a pounding heart.

Dos:

- Spend time in places that feel safe and comfortable as much as possible
- Tell yourself that how you are feeling is a normal reaction and will pass
- Reach out to family, friends, workmates, sharing how we feel, offering support to others, is important for recovery.
- Keep to usual routines, i.e. Mealtimes, bedtime, exercise.
- Keep active going to work, usual leisure activities, seeing friends can help distract us from distressing feeling.
- If distress persists get help, start with G.P. or call or text 1737 free, 24/7 counsellor service.

Don'ts:

- Talking about details of traumatic event repeatedly increases distress.
- Being constantly reminded of the event in Media can increase distress. Keep news broadcasts and Facebook to a minimum. Do something else relaxing and enjoyable.
- Major life decisions and best not made at a time of distress. Wait till you have recovered.
