

However, we have just received this week from the Reserve Bank 38 bags of mainly foreign coin. This has been accumulated over several years. We will be able to report on this our largest ever delivery in the July report.

This month we have made a number of sales from the counting room:

- \$500.00 of current currency to Westpac Bank
- \$920.00 of foreign bank notes to John Eccles
- \$5,269.30 of copper coins to Macaulay Metals
- \$5,400.00 of old decimal coins to the Reserve Bank
- We have also despatched 500kg of foreign coin to Australia for processing. Funds from these are expected around September.

M.B.C. LEOS HELP THE KAREAREA – (NATIVE FALCONS)

Our breeding aviary in Marlborough aims to be an advocate for this threatened native bird, especially in the South Island. The aviary has been established to sustain a breeding programme with birds that have been injured and unable to fend for themselves in the wild – currently we have seven breeding pairs. During recent seasons up to twelve birds have been released into the wild. Two permanent part time employees manage the aviary for the Marlborough Falcon Conservation Trust along with many supporters.

Another aim of the centre is to care for injured birds – during the last six months we have received bird from Southland, South Canterbury and Mid Canterbury with broken bones and health concerns.

This has created a need for more space and the MBC Leos have come to the rescue. Nets have been clipped to the ceiling of a new cage to provide a safe environment for these birds and loads of gravel needed for the floor.

The Leos assistance is appreciated by the Falcon Trust and everyone who wants to see a future for the 'karearea'. It is estimated that only 5000 are left in the wild because of introduced pests and less wild space for them to thrive.

The Lions of District 202E, including Clubs on the West Coast, as well as North Canterbury, and the wider Christchurch area, have been associated with this Festival for well over 20 years.

Although the Festival costs about \$200,000 to run each year, with only part of this coming from the sale of tickets, for the many years of our sponsorship we have been asked to contribute only \$7000. With the return to the Christchurch Town Hall for a four night festival this year, in order to retain our naming rights, we have been asked to contribute a minimum of \$10,000. Thank you to the many Clubs who have already made their donations, in most cases increasing the usual \$250, but we are still short of the total. Can I ask Clubs that have not yet made their annual payment, to consider organising this as soon as possible, as the invoice from the Festival Association must now be paid.

Club Donations in 202E to LCIF are up again for the 2018-19 Lions Year. The percentage of donor clubs is lower than our target with 79% of clubs plus 2 Lioness clubs donating to LCIF. 10 clubs did not contribute to enable the great work of our foundation to continue. DG John and I would like to see 100% of clubs contribute this year even if it is only a small donation.

I hear comments from Lions that "we want our funds to remain locally". I ask you to reflect on what Lions Clubs International Foundation has contributed to District 202E.

In the past 10 years this district has received 4 times the dollar value of donations from the district. Your club may not have directly received a grant or disaster relief from LCIF but it is a great insurance policy to have funding immediately available in the event of a disaster or you need a funding top up for a large project. Please encourage and support LCIF when the request is made to your club. Without your support LCIF cannot continue its work with Disaster assistance, Club project assistance, Diabetes, Measles, Sight problems, Youth projects and Childhood Cancer. Diabetes and Childhood Cancer are major Health problems in NZ and assistance is available for this project. Very few Lions would not know of neighbours or family members suffering from these worldwide diseases.
