In this instance LCIF awarded a \$100000 Major Catastrophe grant to local Lions to support relief efforts in the Bahamas, where Hurricane Dorian devastated the Islands of Grand Bahama and Abaco. Thousands of people have lost their homes. The Category 5 hurricane struck the Bahamas with 185 MPH winds, tying the record as the strongest Atlantic hurricane to make landfall. LCIF stands at the ready to support Lions efforts with funding through global disaster relief programs. This grant is intended to be used for shelter (tents, blankets, cooking facilities, toilets etc.). This will be an ongoing project in the same way as Christchurch was for New Zealand. We appreciate every club who decides to donate towards disaster relief.

The next generation's ability to thrive is closely tied to the support of the local community. Lloyd Morgan Lions Clubs Charitable Trust update

The year is flying by and we are already into September.

I just wanted to pass on a big thanks to those Lions clubs in our District that made donations to the trust in the last lions year. We reached 94% of our clubs within the District making a donation, which was the highest percentage making donations within all Districts in New Zealand. So now, of course, we are into the new Lions year, lets see if we can increase the percentage of clubs making donations.

Last month I attended the New Zealand LMLCCT meeting and AGM which was held in Wellington. Here are some of the items that were covered off over the weekend.

Brian Watt has resigned from the Trust after giving 31 years as administration officer. The number of grants that clubs have been applying for has dropped. This includes our District 202F, where there were none. Lets see if we can process some grants this year.

A reminder that donations that are made to the Trust are not held in credit for clubs from year to year. Only donations made in the current year can be used for recognition.

A reminder that clubs can utilise the Honour roll when a member passes away. Donations to the Trust can be placed so the deceased Lion's name can be placed on the Honour roll. Any amount can be donated and it can be a District, club or personal donation.

With the drop in interest rates, it is predicted that the Trust will incur a significant drop in income. Mike McBride has retired as Chair of the Grants and Loans committee and PDG Joyce Raven will be taking over the position.

A reminder to clubs that projects where they are applying for grants, must be for the public benefit. A new LMLCCT logo has been agreed to and you will start seeing it shortly on correspondence and promotional material.

The club recognition letter (yellow letter) is being redrafted and clubs will be asked if they want the banner strip or not. The clubs criteria checklist form is also being revamped. The new form will encourage electronic copies and do away with having to produce 9 complete copies of paper based applications

The application form is to be set up in PDF writable format.

Toi Tois Tokanui Lions Club 2019----a RUBY year



Saturday, 3rd of August didn't necessarily dawn fine but a warm friendly environment there was that evening in the Tokanui hall. Celebrating and commemorating 40 years of service to the southern southland community and beyond.

With DG Dave Saunders & Ann in attendance, eventually!!!, and hosting some 80 + fellow Lions including partners to a 2 course meal ably prepared and presented by Food Affair, Gore, and washed down by a 'product' of your choice.

Invercargill East Lions club sponsored the chartering of a club at Tokanui to be called Toi Tois Lions club [#37379] on the 27 June 1979 with 27 members.

The name was subsequently changed to Toi Tois Tokanui [Feb/09] apparently to define the base because, believe it or not, some didn't know where Toi Tois actually was!! Dumb b......, not you eh!!

We were fortunate to have the charter president in Ray Manley and charter members, Chris Restall, Ken McWilliam, Terry Buckingham, Murray Stratford and still active in our club, Brian Dermody in attendance.

During the evening we were enlightened to what this club has contributed in cash and in kind to their community over 4 decades. Some of the 'stats' are eye watering. Today there are 42 members with an average age of 65 and to date have served their community for a total of 559 years, averaging 13 years / member, not bad eh! We were further regaled with stories and anecdotes from those formative years by Lions Brian Dermody and Ken Buckingham, again eyes watering, halcyon times indeed.

Early this century [02-03] the club morphed from the standard men only and invited the ladies of the district to join them. Subsequently, Dawn Riddell and Iris Everett led the charge, breaking down any 'barriers'. Today, 2 of the 3 at the top table are of the 'fairer' sex and have been for a while, obviously doing a fine job, ably supported by all around them.

The Clubs greatest achievement in Lionism to date was then Toi Tois Lion Ian Keelty reaching the pinnacle, DG-96/97 followed by MD202 Chairman-97/98, Well done Sir, we say. For your enlightenment, in that era last century, apparently the DG et al were responsible for some 54 clubs as far north as Timaru.

Who's moaning about completing their visits now, eh?

Acknowledging fundraising in those earlier days, how 'basic' things were. No H&S, the 'law' was in the club, pungas were accessible and sold off [no DOC], housie, gate keeping, recycling fencing materials, slink skins, wool, Steptoe auctions et al. Today, our predominant sources of funding are a cattle scheme, baleage auction, wool pack sales and chip wagon, always popular as it comes with complimentary meal, among others.

We are certainly blessed by the support from the Southern Southland community, easily acknowledged by deeds accomplished, for all to see. We head into our 5th decade in a position of strength, enthusiasm, leadership and camaraderie, gosh this sounds like what it might have been like in '79!!!

Enjoying the freedom of camp: Reef's story

Reef Smith (6) was first diagnosed with leukaemia at 20 months old in October 2014. His mum Rosie thought he was just teething as he seemed grizzly, had a slight temperature, and was off his food. But two visits to doctors in one day and two quick blood tests later quickly confirmed their worst nightmare.

"We went from teething to cancer in a matter of hours," says Rosie. "Then it was up to Starship where we spent a month with him admitted on the ward. Reef had a really bad

infection the second week we were in Starship. We nearly lost him, so we had to stay in hospital another couple of weeks once he was moved out of ICU. It was terrifying."

Reef spent many of his early years in and out of hospital as his particular type of leukaemia made him very susceptible to bugs, meaning regular infections and multi-week stays at the hospital.

Luckily, for the past 12 months Reef has been much more settled, and last year he finished his chemotherapy treatment. The family was introduced to Camp Quality through the Child Cancer Foundation, and last year he was old enough to attend a two night winter camp, then the longer five night summer camp earlier this year.

"Reef was the youngest member on camp, but he absolutely loved it," shares Rosie. "I was worried he would really miss me as he is young and we have a close bond having spent so much time together in a hospital room over the years. But he didn't miss me a bit! He was too busy having fun, which is amazing."

"Reef had an incredible companion called Bryce, who he loved. He also enjoyed all the freedom he experienced on camp. Normally he is told 'no' a lot, because of all he's been through and his compromised immune system. But on camp, they say yes to everything – it's set up in such a way that he can have fun and take part in everything," says Rosie.

"It was such a joy to him and to us. The kids are encouraged to be themselves and to feel as normal as possible, which is exactly what these kids need."

A Tribute to our Youth Exchange Students' Host Families

This year we have had students from Finland and Japan being hosted by families in the 202F District. A huge thank you must go to Judy Mason and John Goodwin, Julie and Colin Brown, Michelle and Gary Fraser and their children Olivia, Jayden and Corbin, Anne Dougherty, Sandra and John Carmichael and Janet and Lloyd Humphries. I would like to reflect and acknowledge the Host Families, who without their commitment to this programme we would not have students coming our way.

It is the little things that matter that make the students' visits so memorable:

- · Host Families giving so freely of their time and becoming Mum, Dad, sister, brother or Grandma, being their friend, their mentor, their travelling companion and their confidante
- . One of the girls came out of her bedroom to say she couldn't sleep in there as there was a bug on the light shade and she provided a photo of this bug on her cell phone which was a house-fly. The problem was soon resolved with the man of the house dealing with the offending bug
- Two of our students celebrated their birthdays and both Host Mum's produced a birthday cake which went down a treat
- Students feeling at home and helping themselves to food out of the kitchen cupboards
- Host Mums and Dads learning some basic words of the students language
- One of the girls showing photos of her family from home only to discover that her own Grandma and her Host "Grandma" were the same age but culturally so different in their outlook and attitude to life
- . The girls not wanting to leaving their Host Families and promising they will be back
- · Parents of the girls sending emails to the Host Families thanking them for opening up their homes and their hearts to their daughters
- The girls being so appreciative and fitting in so well with their NZ families
- Host Families' extended families being part of the New Zealand experience and welcoming the girls. To see the expression of delight on a 3 year old at the Invercargill Airport when he saw his "Japanese friends" and their responsiveness to him summed up what friendship is all about
- Those Cookie Time biscuits are a real must for the Japanese students to take back to their homeland and the hunt was on to buy up in bulk and then try and get their suitcase shut

From the time it was confirmed that Youth Exchange Students were coming, Host Families wrote a letter to introduce themselves. Emails then continued between the families which helped to break down the barriers but more importantly, the Students felt they knew their Host Families and certainly recognised their Hosts on arrival at the airport.

Giving the Students the opportunity to be part of family life in NZ, to experience first-hand, living the NZ culture, eating our food and enjoying our scenery are memories that will last a lifetime. To all the Host Families, not only in 2019, I have had the privilege to get to know but also over the past three years, I am so appreciative to your commitment to the Youth Exchange Student Programme.
