Now there is a push from Diabetes New Zealand for clubs and individuals to hold screenings for their fellow Lions, also this test can be offered to the public when a club has a community project on. There would have to be some training by individuals on the administering the test. The test which involves a simple prick on the finger a small amount of blood is gathered on a test strip, then analyzed in a machine this whole process only takes approximately 30 seconds, the test is not full proof but will alert the individual to contact their doctor for further investigation. This is another tool for Lions to consider for the promotion of Diabetes Awareness in their communities.

GLASS TABLE

During 2018 The Lions Club of Invercargill Club was seeking a very unique significant community activity/event to recognise the Centenary of Lions Clubs International. We wanted something practicable that the community of Invercargill and Southland could enjoy, and at the same time record for posterity, the 100 years of Lions Clubs International worldwide.

Our Lions Club agreed to have manufactured and installed, a glass table to be situated beside one of the seats in Queens Park – Invercargill's wonderful scenic Park and Gardens – which is visited by hundreds if not thousands of people daily.

Negotiations began with the Invercargill City Council Parks and Reserves Department to gain approval to install the celebration table.

After nearly a year of negotiating approval came through, the Council installed the concrete plinth and the table installed.

We are very pleased with the final outcome and have received many accolades from our community who use this table when enjoying their lunch or relaxation in our world-class park.

Some lowlife ratbag or ratbags have apparently taken to the glass table with a hammer, possibly a sledgehammer, over the weekend 13/14 October 2019 and split the 50mm table top in half, plus damaged many of the glass rings in the upstand. The table is irrepairable. The top is virtually bullet-proof so it would have taken a lot of pounding to fracture it like it has been.

The Invercargill City Council Parks and Reserves Division have salvaged the broken remains of this beautiful table, which has only been in place a number of months, and are reporting the matter to the Police. We have received dozens if not hundreds of accolades from people seeing the table and they appreciated the gesture of



our Lion Club to supply this table. Even today when I visited the Park for my midday walk (and found the table gone) people, some who were visitors to the town, came up to me asking where the table was as they had been told by friends to visit the Park and view the wonderful gesture of Lions .
