
International President **Dr. Jung-Yul Choi**

In 1977, when Dr Jung-Yul Choi of Busan, Republic of Korea joined Busan Jae il Lions Club as a member, he would have never expected later to be elected as the first vice president of Lions Club International at the association's 101st International Convention, held in Las Vegas, Nevada USA. Although it would not have come as much of a surprise to those who knew the service he has rendered for almost half a decade. Needless to say that as a Lion, he has been bestowed upon the highest honor as an Ambassador of Good Will Awards in addition to the numerous othe awards such as the Humanitarian Partnership, Senior Master Key Award, 100% District Governor Award, International President's Leadership Awards, International President's Awards.

Dr. Choi believes in uniting people through embracing diversity. He adheres to his unique style of leadership which commences with "How can I help you?"; a leadership that gave importance to all and promoted unity through acceptance of diversity.

However, the life of Dr. Choi in general is not different from his life as a Lion. He feeds approximately 600 people weekly through his foundations, donates to foundations, establishes scholarships and makes homes for elderly; because for Dr. Choi providing financial aid is equally important as volunteering.

Dr Choi in a nutshell is a beloved husband, a dear father, a loved grandfather but above all he is a brave Lion who stepped up to the international platform to address global issues, support global foundation; LCIF, inspire kindness through service stories and empower Lions club to serve the world.



My working life started as a Turner and Fitter trainee in Hamilton. On moving to Auckland after getting married to Vicky I took on a job as Trainee Distiller for Seagar Evans at Te Atatu where we built our first house. As I approached the grand old age of 30 I though I had better look at something new or stay in the booze trade. Being the now Head Distiller I worked very closely with Customs.

I was told one day they were looking for new staff to train as ship searchers to combat the influx of cannabis by the Mr Asia syndicate. I thought I might give it a try. For three years I was a member of the Rummage team. Then There was an opening in the newly formed Dog Section for a Dog Handler.

It had been a childhood dream of mine to be a Police Dog Handler, but having sight in only one eye stopped me dead. I applied for the Customs position and got the job. In two years, I was the top handler both operational and trailing between the Police and Customs. I remained one of the top handlers with my two dogs Toi & Tim until I retired along with Tim from the section in 1994.

I spent the rest of my Customs service mainly in the waterfront section servicing the entering and clearing of commercial and cruise ships. But also during this time I served as a crew member on the Customs launch when required, plus the running of enforcement operations. I served over40 years on the front-line.

We moved from Te Atatu to Waimauku in 1999 and joined the Huapai-Kumeu Lions in Dec 2000. The rest is History in the making.


HIKURANGI MOUNTAIN LIONS WELCOMED 100-YEAR-OLD KNOCKER WELLS

Out going President Colin Twyman welcomed the guests at thebeginning evening however inviting long




PDG Robyn Walker was present to conduct the Change of Officers ceremony.


The Comedians. Tony Lyall

SOME QUOTES FROM HIS 2017 BOOK

(KNOCKERS NOSTALGIA)

- In 1963 as Chairman of the Hikurangi
 Businessmens Association he was
 approached to attend a Lions meeting
 in Whangarei, and decided a Lions Club
 was just what Hikurangi needed.
- He attended the International school for Governors in Dallas with one peanut farmer from the USA who he wasn't impressed with but however went on be President of the USA one Jimmy Carter.
- "I'm often asked why it that Lions do not have the profile or the attraction of yesteryear. In 1969 the Auckland club had 140 members. In 2007 they had only 6. Times have certainly changed and society and values are different now from those of twenty years ago. Those that joined lodges, the Lions and rotary Clubs in the 1960s and the 1970s did so, not for just camaraderie, but give something back to their communities. The fact we had fun doing it was just secondary to the ojective."

He then called a meeting of businessmen, got a good response and formed a club with 30 members, while being elected Charter President.

- As DG he was responsible for all clubs north of Mercer including Fiji, Samoa and New Caledonia.
- He notes that when the NZ Governors flew into Dallas for the training they bought a dozen bottles of Black Label whiskey to be consumed at the new Zealand Hospitality as part of the social side. However they did not know that Dallas was full of Baptists. So he had to do something to dispose of the upopened bottles, he spoke to someone in Lions Administration who promptly organised a cheque, obviously having no qualms about considering the items legitimite expenses!


