Each year, more than 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer globally. This means that a child is diagnosed with cancer every 2 minutes. Globally, 37% of children with cancer survive, but survival rates vary widely by region.

In 2018, the World Health Organization launched the Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer with the goal of reaching at least 60% survival rate for children with cancer by 2030. The Initiative brings together stakeholders from around the world and across sectors towards the common goal. LCIF has begun working with the Initiative to explore new ways in which Lions can help children with cancer in their communities.

Many thanks to all the 202F Lions Clubs who contributed over the past 14 years to the Dialysis Caravan project .

In March prior to the Covid-19 Lock down period the SDHB decommissioned the caravan to be used by dialysis patients. The caravan was then used by the Catlins Medical Centre as an isolation unit/room for the Covid testing of patient, but it is no longer required.

Our directors decided that now is the time to sell the caravan.

The caravan which has new vinyl flooring, been freshly painted inside and out, comes with the water pump and a large storage box at the front, has a TV and DVD player, a comfortable reclining chair and footstool and the caravan is registered and comes with a WOF ready to go. The Owaka Lions Directors have suggested a price of \$7000.

It is set up for an individual to put in their own dialysis machine and filtering system and they can then take their own holiday wherever and whenever they wish.

The Directors wish to give "first option to purchase" the caravan to anyone from the 202F clubs. May be your Lions Club knows or has a connection to someone who would need or want this caravan.

- And for some status



Magic yarn wigs are inspired by beloved Disney characters, and invite children back to the world of play and daydreaming. They are a beacon of fun, laughter, and play during a scary time.

Due to the popularity of these wigs, The Magic Yarn Project was born, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. Since our founding, The Magic Yarn Project has received coverage by hundreds of internet media sources, magazines, and local news stations; shipped tens of thousands of wigs to every state and over 50 countries; and organized over 120,000 hours of volunteer service. And the demand for magic grows daily! Every year, roughly 83,000 young girls, ages 2-10, are diagnosed with cancer (including over 5,000 in the US).



Peace Poster Contest Deadlines

Students ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15 are eligible to participate in the International Peace Poster Contest. Entries not meeting the following deadlines will be disqualified.

January 15: Kits go on sale from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.

October 1: Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.

November 15: Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the District Governor.

December 1: Postmark deadline for a district governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.

December 1: Postmark deadline for a district governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.

December 1: Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.



- jersey fabrics have too much space between knit stitches which makes them less effective in filtering germs.
- · if using a fabric with any pattern, orient it horizontally.


